

And what is with bluegrass and chili cook-offs? It's happening more and more lately. First there was beer and pizza and now chili. I'm waiting for the day when bluegrass will be associated with steak, seafood, or health food, just for the chance for a new image... * * *

You asked for it, so we're working on ita CBA-sponsored contest for banjo, fiddle, guitar, mandolin, and maybe some other categories like clogging. Tentatively, it is scheduled for late July/early August. Prizes will be low key- gift certificates, pies, etc., in hopes of keeping it friendly. Hopefully, it will give a lot of amateur pickers a chance to polish some tunes and present them on stage. Full details will be in the next issue of the BGBD.

Bill White asked me to mention that he will be holding a harmonica workshop at Grass Valley this June. It's about time that someone figure out what that amazing guy is doing! There will be plenty of workshops in June, as it worked swell in September.

Speaking of workshops, lots of pickers showed up at the Fairfield mini-festival and participated in them. I would like to see them become more of a regular feature of our events. We had another good show of bands, with excellent performances by Round Oak and the Overlook Mtn. Boys. Plenty of bands showed up to play a set, including Grant St. String Band, Boot Hill, Bill White, Walt Beck, and Redwood Hill. The highlight of the mini-festival came when Carl Pagter presented a plaque to Jay Quesenberry in recognition for his work in the CBA. Carl also told Jay that he had been awarded an Honorary Lifetime Membership to the CBA by the Board of Directors! It was one - maybe the only - time I've seen Jay speechless! Jay has done a lot to promote

bluegrass in this area, and I expect he'll be doing more of the same from his new home in Kentucky. He has promised to write and let us know what's up back there. But first he plans to get a band and do some pickin'...

Steve & Gwen and their Bluegrass Band have a new record out entitled "Golden Mansions" which will be available at their personal appearances or by sending them \$7 plus \$1 postage and handling to the address listed in the Field Guide. They plan to begin recording their second album the week of June 9-14, sandwiching the studio between their heavy touring schedule. They also plan to take time off for their wedding aniversary on July 5.

Spring brings the new crop of California bluegrass records, including Frank Wakefield "End of the Rainbow," Lost Highway "Hard Road to Travel," Damascus Road "Going Up," and Barry Solomon "Southland Sketches." Also, the Vern Williams Band has been in the studio recording a long-overdue album for Rounder. Lost Highway's effort is all original material- a pretty good feat for a debut album! Frank is also supposed to have another album out on the Takoma label soon.

Kathy Kallick and Laurie Lewis recorded a television show for Marin 11 consisting of all original material. Appearing with them was Doug Corrigan on drums, Beth Weil on bass, Paul Shelasky playing fiddle and banjo, and Gene Tortora playing dobro. The show was aired on Marin cable TV the first week of April, but don't despair, it will be aired on San Francisco cable TV as a rerun Thursday June 19 at 8:30 pm and again Saturday June 21 at 7 pm. (It's a long way to "I Love Lucy," but I think it's great that they'll be rerun!)

Done Gone has aquired the rights to fiddle player Elliott Stewart. Actually, Elliott has been their fiddle player for the last several months, but now it's official. The decision was reached the same week that guitar player Don Humphries got his old D-28 Martin out of hock. Congrats to both!

Bluegrass Down South by David Dickey

Spring has arrived in sunny Southern California bringing with it the promise of new beginnings, better weather, and more musical activity.

The 16th GOLDEN WEST BLUEGRASS FESTIVAL is slated for April 25-27. Jim & Jesse and the Virginia Boys will headline, and the Bay Area's own High Country will make an appearance too. This festival will occur after press deadline, so I will give the highlights next column.

Knott's Berry Farm ushered in the season with their annual "Country Fair Days" which incorporate a lot of bluegrass music into their activities. Bodie Mtn. Express and T.J. & the Bear appeared daily around town and a bluegrass band contest was held on the final day. The High Window Boys won 1st place and \$500. The band consists of Bill Carter (no relation to Jimmy) on guitar; Allison Brown (no relation to Jerry) on banjo; Stuart Duncan (no relation to Tommy) on fiddle; Terry Reed (no relation to Donna) on bass; and Walden Dahl (no relation to Barbie) on mandolin.

Ontario Motor Speedway, site of Cal Jams 1 & 2 is trying something a little different. The night before the Datsun twin zoo will feature a bluegrass show with Pacific.ly Bluegrass, Damascus Road, High Window Boys, Cheyenne, Lucy Johnson Cloggers, and Lost Highway. If the response is good there will be more in the future. It would be exciting if bluegrass could get a foothold in that area.

Upcoming on the festival list is the CALICO GHOST TWON SPRING FESTIVAL May 10 & 11 featuring Damascus Road, Lucy Johnson Cloggers John Hoyt Bowers, Riverside Citrus Belters, JACK RAMSEY'S PORTERVILLE FESTIVAL will be held May 31 & June 1 at Chuck's Hidden Lake. Two long awaited albums by Southern California bands will be just released as this issue goes to press. The first is "Going Up" by <u>Damascus Road</u> and is their second album. (The following comment/question was included on one of the questionaires I received. It was carefully unsigned.)

"In the issue that contained this questionaire were printed the Directors Meetings minutes summary for January 1980. One item

said 'Bands applying to play for charity organizations through the CBA will be picked by the band selection committee to avoid conflict of interest.'

I have some questions about that item. 1. Why should bands 'applying to play for charity organizations' have to apply through the CBA? 2. Why should bands 'applying to play,

etc.' have to be picked by the band selection committee to avoid conflict of interest?

3. Is the implication of the item in the minute's summary that the CBA is going to pay bands to play for charity organizations?

4. If it is the intention of the Board to pay bands for playing for charity organizations, just why is the Board authorized to authorize the expenditure of my money (and the money of the other dues-paying members) for organizations not connected in any way with the CBA? 5. If the Board intends to authorize payment of bands to play for charity organizations, how can that expenditure be authorized without publicizing the event and making it open to attendance to the CBA members?

Everything else in the summary seems to deal with CBA-related problems and solutions, except this item. We'd appreciate you clarifing what the item means in regard to our questions in a near-future issue of the BGBD."

(First of all, I want to answer the questions as a director, rather than as editor of the BGBD, and I have to add that I can only speak for my own viewpoint. Second, I'm mildly surprised that the sharp-eyed reader didn't mention the \$100 contribution to KPFA-FM or the \$100 contribution to the retarded children's program of the Nevada County Community Workshop both of which were mentioned in the Financial Statement. Thirdly, I don't much care to get annonymous letters. However, suspecting that you are indeed a card-carrying, dues-paying member, I'll answer the best I can.

Those of you who have not yet sent in the questionaire from last issue - it's not too late!! The more people who send it in, the more accurate it will be. I hope to run an analysis in one of the next two issues. The results so far have been pretty entertaining and informative. One comment that was mentioned by several people was about the BGBD coming out late in the month. To be specific: "Please try to get the breakdowns out on time! Why the hell must they always be late? This one arrived March 14." I guess I better explain. I don't want to get the BGBD to anyone on time because I would rather have them mad at me. Actually, I take it by "on time" that most people expect to get their issue on or before the 1st of the month. I try to arrange the production so that the mailing takes place on or near the first Saturday of the month. The post office usually takes a week to 10 days to de-

liver (the BGBD is second class mail). If the printer screws up (like last issue), it may cost 5 days to a week. Normally, I expect members to receive their issue during the second week of the month. I include events in the first week on the off-chance that everything will go right and some members will get them early. Now, to accomodate the people who are sore at me for this arrangement, I have several options: 1) Rename the issue. This is perhaps the easiest solution, and everyone will think they are getting their issue a month in advance and send me lots of money for doing such a wonderful job. 2)Delete all dates up to the 15th of the month. This way members won't know what they missed, and as we all know, "ignorance is bliss." 3) Move my production schedule back two weeks, planning to have the issue arrive on the 1st. This, would seem like a pretty good move, but in reality, it only shifts the original problem back two weeks. 4) Get more help. Which reminds me. Why the hell aren't you doing this? Which leads me to another subject.

The CBA is facing a critical shortage of help. What we need are volunteers to help run the organization: directors, co-ordinators, officers, people who will take the initiative to help. We need more than someone who will volunteer to post ten flyers (and we need them too!), but hopefully some people who will decide what needs to be done, and carry it out. Of course there are people in the organization already who can get new people started, so it's not as if you would have to start from . scratch. But we do need active participants. Please don't sit back and think "I belong to the CBA, and they will bring me bluegrass." YOU are "they" and the alternative to no volunteers will be scaled down CBA events, perhaps none for awhile. Some very fine help has already passed through our hands for lack of support. To help, show up at a director's meeting. We can ease you into it.



The directors voted, in an earlier meeting, to allot \$300 in the coming year to pay bands \$75 to play at charitable events up to four times a year. Bands could apply for this on a sign-up basis. Actually, I was not at that meeting, but would have voted for it had I been there. At the next meeting it was brought up that there may be a conflict of interest in that the people who voted to spend the money might be in a band that signed up, implying that they might have voted some money for themselves. To a-

void this, bands could sign up, and then the band committee would select bands from the list. The band selection committee operates on the principle that they cannot select a band if that band has a member on the committee. This avoids a conflict of interest (you can't choose your own band to play a job). I believe that answers questions 2 and 3. The answer to question 1 is: bands don't have to apply to the CBA to play for charity organizations. They can do it for free by calling one up.

Camming

In a way, jamming is the highest form of music. It is spontaneous, alive, and unfettered by perfection. One person following, complementing, countering another. And it is as good with 5 as it is with 50 as it is with one partner.

I've been jamming about 3 years and to me the big breakthrough was learning to listen to everyone else. Yes, folks, I had to learn the practice and technique of shutting up! Backing someone else can be as rewarding as playing the most sizzling lick, if you do it well. Or if you are just mediocre, plunking along, and you can listen, enjoying what the others have to offer. Transcending your instrument so you can listen. It's commonplace. "...it compares with two people conversing," said Scruggs. "If they had the same story to tell, they would not try to tell the story together. One would tell the story, and the other, who perhaps might know the story word for

word, would only fill in a few details, not to take from, but to make the story a little more attractive and interesting." It's what Earl just did to my article.

This is the sort of jamming I love to take part in. No one is hot-dogging or showing off, but their music blends and comes out beautifully. It seems to flow through the group like a wind, affecting all of us. Sometimes you magically come up with a new way to play the song, but often you are involved in how good it sounds to try anything.

And later, practising alone, you can hear the others...

The answers to questions 4 & 5 are a little more involved. Let me quote from the CBA's Articles of Incorporation:

"The purpose for which this corporation is

formed...are:

1)To promote, encourage, foster and cultivate the preservation, appreciation, understanding, enjoyment, support, and performance of bluegrass, old-time, gospel, and traditional instrumental and vocal music of the United States.

2)To conduct...educational and promotional activities, including sponsoring or supporting....presentations, exhibits, and performances, and to provide information relating to...bluegrass, old-time, gospel and traditional music.

3)...and to use the funds of this corporation for any of the purposes for which this

corporation is formed

8) To carry on any activity whatsoever... which may be calculated directly or indirectly to promote the interests of this corporation..."

Further down in the Articles, this responsibility is entrusted to the directors.

I feel that my first responsibility is to bluegrass (old-time, etc.)music, and second to the membership community in particular. So the answer to question 4 is that the Articles of Incorporation authorize the board of directors to authorize expenditure of CBA funds for the purposes set forth, which may or may not directly benefit a given CBA member. That also would answer question 5, but I would like to clarify it by saying that the funds would be encouraging performance, promoting the music, and further the understanding and appreciation, not to mention the enjoyment of bluegrass music. That is what I think the CBA is all about- Steve Pottier, Chairman of the Board.

(Another comment on a questionaire:)

Maybe CBA should look into ways to get more publicity for bluegrass. How about CBA finding bands to play for handicapped, elderly, shut-ins?

"A G7 double stop will help you into a C chord, and that would be appropriate, but a seventh played without the corresponding chord change would probably be inappropriate. There are times, though, when even that would work, if it enhances the overall sound. There are certain sounds you can listen for: 4ths and 5ths tend to give a raspy, biting sound; 3rds and 6ths will give a sweeter sound. The classic biting sound is the one you hear when the tenor goes up to a B note against a C chord in the chorus of "Can't You Hear Me Calling." (These are the I & III notes of the I chord, sung against a IV chord which crerates the dissonance.)... (Our appologies to Ed Neff - Ed.)
