"Hull's Victory" Dakota Dave Hull Flying Fish 294

Side One: Steel Guitar Rag; Blackberry Blossom; Shavin' The Cat; St. Anne's Reel-Hull's Victory; I Don't Love Nobody; Festival Waltz; Bill Cheatham. Side Two: Ragtime Annie; Midnight On The Water; Don Lohr's Coffee; Maiden's Prayer; Whiskey Before Breakfast; New Camptown Races.

Plenty of top quality acoustic, stringed music is available on this

album featuring Dakota Dave Hull, Sean Blackburn, Peter Ostrousko, Mike Cass, Doc Watson, Bob Douglas, Butch Thompson and more.

While many of the numbers are innovative and closer to jazz that bluegrass (traditional, that is), the technical work of all the performers is outstanding. You sit in awe of the continued brilliance of Doc Watson's guitar work, Peter Ostroushko's guitar, mandolin and fiddle. Harmonies flow from each player and, in cases, fairly sparkle.

Hull's work is tremendous. Alone he wouldhave been superb, but with these sidemen - what can you say.

For purists, some disappointment, but don't neglect this record because it doesn't fit the mold. It is a pure pleasure to listen to and dream about actually seeing these artists perform live.

Dear Ben:

The Breakdown comes out six times a year, so we are really talking about only one or two extra publications a year. Postage: about \$45 each issue for 2-4 8½x11 pages; Reproduction: About \$100-150 each issue, time and expenses: \$50 per issue. Labels and computer service: \$75 per issue. So we are talking about \$275. per issue for this type of publication. The other factor is that all of the work is volunteer and is dependant on someone getting the news and dates to the volunteer.






Repair Workshop:

Regluing Loose Ribs on Fiddle and Basses

(Ken Donnell has been building and repairing stringed instruments for 11 years. His workshop is located at Marriott's Music, 392 Elm Avenue, Auburn, CA 95603, (916) 823-8404. Ken is also known as the "travelling luthier", having been the resident luthier at several California music festivals.)

As I mentioned in last month's article, the hide glue used in violins (and upright basses) will eventually fail. The most common place for this to occur is where the ribs (sides) are joined to the top or back of the instrument. It's easy to repair loose ribs if the problem hasn't grown too large. But if the glue failure is excessive, it will be necessary to remove and reglue the entire plate. The latter can be difficult and expensive, and should be avoided unless major internal repairs are necessary.



Violin Spool Clamps


The tools needed for these repairs are: spool clamps and some hide glue.




Spool clamps can be bought from luthier supply companies, but it's easy to make your own. Cut the spools from any soft wood with a 1" hole saw and glue cork to the faces meeting the instrument. Drive a ¼" by 3½" carraige bolt (12" for basses) into one of the spools, slip the other spool past the threaded end, and add a flat washer and wing nut to complete the clamp. Carriage bolts are normally threaded 1" down from the end. If you need more "throw" on your clamp, cut longer threads onto the bolt with a machinist's

die (probably a 1/4" by 20 threads per inch).

Unless you've had experience working with ground hide glue, it would be best to use the liquid hide glue marketed by the Franklin Company (available at Sears). Its slower setting time will help to relieve the time pressure from your work. Allow the glue to dry 48 hours in warm, dry weather, and twice that long in cold, wet weather.

Discography The Country Gentlemen

Since their formation in 1957, the Country Gentlemen have been creating some of the most exciting sounds to be heard in bluegrass music. What started out as a basically traditional group later became the leading force in the field of contemporary bluegrass. Singer-guitarist Charlie Waller is the only musician to stay with the group throughout its entire career, and his presence has kept the group's sound intact. He is an exceptional singer, and although his voice is quite different from that of other bluegrass singers, it is a pleasure to listen to. The inimitable John Duffey, playing mandolin and singing tenor vocal, was also one of the group's founding members. In 1959 banjoist Eddie Adcock joined the group, followed one year later by bassist Tom Gray. It is this combination of musicians that most bluegrass fans think of as the "original" Country Gentlemen.

The group's first recordings were two songs for the Dixie label: "Goin' the the Races" and "Heavenward Bound." The latter song is available on a four-record set entitled 70 Song Original Bluegrass Collection (Rebel 1473-76), along with three other early CG songs: "Blue Man," "Patty on the Turnpike" and "White Rose." The group then started to record on the Starday label and the Folkways label. Some of the Starday material is presently unavailable, but much of it can be found on various sources. "Hey Little Girl" can be found on 16 Greatest Original Bluegrass Hits (Starday SD-3015). "Hills and Home" is available on Hills and Home, Thirty Years of Bluegrass (NW 225). "Orange Blossom Fiddle" is found on Banjo in the Hills (Starday SLP 104). "Helen" is available on (Rebel-2201). See the book entitled "The Country Gentlemen, 25th Anniversary 1957-1982" for details on the unavailable Starday recordings.

Bluegrass at Carnegie Hall (GT-0102) is a recent release by Gusto Records of some of the best Starday material. Its fourteen songs include "Two Little Boys," "Sunrise" and "Red Rocking Chair." It is not a live album, as is suggested by the title, but it is a must for every bluegrass fan!



Country Songs Old and New (FA2409) is the CG's first Folkways album. This is a great collection of sixteen songs. An insert with information on the group and the songs, as well as words to all the songs, is also included. Super picking and singing!

Folk Songs & Bluegrass (FA 2410) is another Folkways release with sixteen more songs and a similar insert. The songs include "The Fields have Turned Brown," "Victim to the Tomb" and "Come All Ye Tender Hearted."

On The Road (FA 2411) contains excerpts from two live concerts. Live recordings by the early CG are worth checking out because of their crazy performances. Charlie shows off his voice by imitating a duck, a frog, and a girl on "Ain't Got a Home." You can hear the whole group sing with an English accent on "Blue Ridge Mountain Home." The album also contains an insert with notes.

Bluegrass Country (Pickwick JS-6156) is the latest reissue of an album originally entitled **Hootnanny**. It features ten fine songs done by Waller, Duffey, Adcock and Gray including "Pallet on the Floor," "East Virginia Blues," "500 Miles" and "You Left Me Alone." Pick up a copy of this album if it is still available.

Folk Session Inside (Mercury SR 60858, MG 20858), is a much sought after collector's item. Although out of print, all but three of its twelve songs, ("Girl Behind the Bar," "The Schoolhouse Fire" and

"Nightwalk") have been reissued on various Rebel albums.

The Best of the Country Gentlemen (Rebel 1498) is a reissue of twelve of the early CG's best songs, including seven songs from the Mercury album — "Heartaches" and "This Morning at Nine" among them.

Going Back to the Blue Ridge Mountains (Folkways FTS 31031) is yet another live album on the Folkways label. Sixteen songs, recorded with excellent sound quality, are featured. This is a very good live album.

The Country Gentlemen Sing Bluegrass (ZAP 101) is a long out-of-print album. The sound quality on this live album is poor.

Christmas Time Back Home (Rebel 1600) is a fine bluegrass Christmas album which includes three songs by the early CG: "Christmas Time Back Home," "Jingle Bells" and "Silent Night."

Bringing Mary Home (Rebel 1478) is the first of a long series of albums for Rebel Records as well as the debut of Ed Ferris as bassist. Along with the classic title song are eleven fine songs, including "Brown Mountain Light," "This World's No Place to Live" and "Let the Light Shine Down."

The Traveler (Rebel 1481) features twelve more recordings, including "Baby Blue," the classic "Matterhorn," "Amelia Earhart" and "Dark as a Dungeon."

Play it Like it Is (Rebel 1486) marks the last recordings of John Duffey with the CG. The album's twelve songs include "He Was a Friend of Mine," the instrumental "El Dedo" and "Mary Dear." I don't like it as much as the previous two albums, but it is still a very good album.

New Look, New Sound (Rebel 1490) marks Eddie Adcock's last recordings and Jimmy Gaudreau's debut as mandolinist and tenor singer. It includes the songs "Where I'm Bound," "Roger Young" and "Ramblin' Boy." The sound of the group was changing, but the music is still of high quality.

One Wide River to Cross (Rebel 1497) is the group's first all-gospel album. The addition of Bill Yates on bass and Bill

Emerson changes the sound of the group even more. The album's twelve fine songs include "Sunny Side of Life," "I Am a Pilgrim" and "He Will Set Your Fields on Fire."

Sound Off (Rebel 1501) is Gaudreau's last album with the group before leaving to play with other groups. The album features hot pickin' by both Emerson and Gaudreau, as well as some fine singing. The songs include "Sea of Heartbreak," "Orange Blossom Mandolin," "Teach Your Children" and "Fox on the Run."

The Award-Winning Country Gentlemen (Rebel 1506) is a great album containing many CG favorites. This album marks Doyle Lawson's debut as mandolinist and tenor singer for the group. Included are "Legend of the Rebel Soldier," "Redwood Hill," "Little Bessie" and "Secrets of the Waterfall." A super album!



The Country Gentlemen (VSD 79331) is the first of two albums recorded on the Vanguard label. The album's songs include "Traveling Kind," "One Morning in May," "Casey's Last Ride" and "House of the Rising Sun." Mike Auldridge and Ricky Skaggs join in on this one.

Remembrances and Forecasts (VSD 79349) is another excellent album on the Vanguard label, with the songs "Delta Queen," "The Little Grave" and "Lord, Protect My Soul."

Live at McClure! (Rebel SLP-1554-1555) is a live two-album set with Ralph Stanley and various other artists. The CG appear on two songs: "Matterhorn" and "Legend of the Rebel Soldier." This was recorded during Doyle Lawson's stay with the group. Bill Holden is on banjo.

Joe's Last Train (Rebel 1559) includes the songs "Ages and Ages Ago," "Pamela Brown" and "Cryin' Holy." This return to Rebel Records is another success in a series of fine albums.

Calling My Children Home (Rebel 1574), the group's second gospel album, is one of the best bluegrass gospel albums

ever recorded. It features twelve beautiful songs including two a cappella numbers. This album is essential.

Yesterday & Today, Volume One (Rebel 1521)

Without going into the background of all the songs on these albums, I would like to say that these three albums, despite their unattractive covers, are important additions to your Country Gentlemen collection. Each record contains twelve songs, most of which were previously unreleased or out of print and some that were recorded live. There are a few repeats from other albums, but this is basically material that is unavailable elsewhere. Songs are included from various stages of the group's career.



Twenty-fifth Anniversary (Rebel 2201) is the title of a double-album set commemorating the Gent's silver anniversary. This is a very handsomely packaged collection. The best thing about this album is the time-line inside the album cover. Four lines representing the guitar. mandolin, banjo, and bass extend across the jacket covering the years 1957 to 1982. Every person who has ever played with the group is listed on this graph which will be helpful to fans wanting to know more about the group. The songs presented on the album are not all necessarily among the group's best, and the order in which they are presented is questionable, but this is still a very important album for CG fans. Six songs previously unavailable are also included.

Sit Down Young Stranger (SH 3712) is the group's first album on the Sugar Hill label, for which they still record. Kent Dowell, banjo, and Rick Allred, mandolin, are present on some of the cuts. Highlights

include "Come Sit By the River," "Love and Wealth," "It's Just Like Heaven" and "For the First Time."

River Bottom (SH 3723) is the group's second to last album. The songs include "Riverboat Fantasy," "Coal Black Gold" and "Things In Life."



Bluegrass — Greatest Show on Earth (SH 2201) is a great live double-album set featuring the Seldom Scene, J.D. Crowe, the Country Gentlemen, and a regrouping of the "original" Country Gentlemen. This is a super collection, full of fantastic music, and well worth buying.;

Good as Gold (SH 3734) is the group's latest installment in a long series of excellent recordings. Jimmy Gaudreau is now back with the group on mandolin. Dick Smith is the current banjo player. Along with Charlie Waller and Bill Yates they make up today's Country Gentlemen.

I have not listed any singles recorded by the group or any albums or live recordings released exclusively in Japan. For more information on these consult the book I mentioned earlier. One point I would like to mention is that Rebel Records is currently discontinuing certain albums from its catalog. Among these are Rebel 1481, 1486, and 1527. You may want to pick copies of these albums if they are not already sold out. My opinion is that you can't go wrong when buying a Country Gentlemen album. Whereas most other major bluegrass bands have had albums that were flops, the Country Gentlemen have consistently produced albums of superior quality. I haven't told you anything about the history of this fine group, but a simple listen to the previously mentioned recordings will tell you all that you need to know. The Country Gentlemen have earned their place in the world of bluegrass music.

Working on a flat table with a towel or pad underneath the instrument, begin by de-tuning the instrument one whole step. Insert the feeler gauge into the joint and use light to moderate pressure in determining the area needed to be glued. Don't be alarmed if the crack grows during this probing.

Now insert a 2" long strip (and however wide is possible) of sandpaper into the loose joint in order to clean off the old glue. When cleaning the rib, pull the sandpaper straight out. When cleaning the top or back, pull the paper slightly downwards so that the overhang is not touched. Two pulls of the sandpaper in each position should be sufficient.

Put some glue on the feeler gauge and insert it into the joint. Open and close the joint several times with finger pressure to help spread the glue. Use only enough glue so that a small bead appears along the entire length of the joint when pressure is applied, and wipe this off with a damp cloth.

Install the clamps and bring them to moderate pressure. After 2-4 hours, carefully remove the clamps, clean off any remaining glue, and replace the clamps until the joint has fully dried. You can then permanently remove the clamps, tune to pitch, and "play 'til you

fingers burn."

Book Review

The Fiddle Series Book I by Greg Baker

Reviewed by Hollis Taylor

Beginning fiddling books usually disappoint me in several ways--they leave out important information on technique; the tunes are all at one level rather than progressing in difficulty; they are sloppy in areas of bowings, fingerings, and other notations; and, in general, they lack an intelligent approach. Greg Baker has satisfied all my objections to beginning fiddle books in his Book I of *The Fiddle Series*. He has had the patience to set down what beginning fiddlers need to and ought to know in the clearest way I've seen.

Designed for self, private, or group instruction, Book I of the series begins by offering points on overall technique and how to get started with helpful illustrations. Baker has taken what he considers the best from many different methods, including Suzuki and other classical approaches to the instrument. He offers, in addition to regular music notation, a unique tablature for fiddle which is very easy for the beginner to comprehend.

Baker's intelligent approach and sense of detail surfaces everywhere, such as his bowing directions, which are

designed with repeats in mind. Each tune has an informative introduction, and he doesn't miss a chance to nudge the student with tips and explanations.

At the end of the book are the words to the songs he has presented, a rhythm review, and an explanation of how to play backup. The backup information is particularly useful, and this backup theme is followed all the way through this book and the ones to come (Baker has an eight-book series in the works). I think this is the book's strongest point--giving the beginning a sense of how a tune might be varied, an understanding of basic chords, and an encouragement to explore simple backup right from the start. He takes away the mystique, for he is not just teaching fiddle tunes but fiddle performing.

A book is no substitute for a private instructor, who can correct, encourage and guide. As teachers, we must train ears and not fingers. Nevertheless, the accompanying tape goes a long way towards spanning that gap. A 60 minute cassette with tunes recorded at slow or moderate speeds in stereo with guitar on the left channel and fiddle on the right enables students to turn off the fiddle channel and practice along. Baker brings his own fiddle and guitar skills to bear here, with the assistance of another local musician, Chick Rose. Happy fiddling!

Record Review

The Bluegrass Cardinals

Home Is Where The Heart Is (Sugar Hill SH-3741)

Those of you who have been reading my record reviews over the past several years will have noted that my preferences run toward traditional rather than modern or "progressive" bluegrass. Still, there are some progressive groups that are so outstanding, that I usually buy all their albums sight unseen (I guess that should be "sound unheard"). The Bluegrass Cardinals is one of these groups.

With the recent release of *Home Is Where The Heart Is*, the Cardinals have again proved that progressive bluegrass doesn't have to all be in 7th or augmented chords, nor does the singing have to be so scrubbed and polished as to sound like something you could punch into your Sony Squawk Box or whatever they call those computerized music-like instruments. Indeed, this album gets off to a rousing start with a "top-hit" type song, that should please all bluegrassers (check out the excellent guitar break). Next is a rather unexciting ballad and then a couple of up-dates of old well-known favorites. By the time we get to Wicked Path of Sin, we are ready for what the Cardinals do best: sing gospel.


