

April News Briefs

• April Tour Cancelled - notice was received in early March that due to unforeseen circumstances the April tour for Bill Grant and Delia Bell in Northern California has been cancelled. Only four of the dates published in the March Breakdown were firm, and Bill and Delia decided they could not come for only four dates. We apologize to our members for the misinformation... however, the best laid plans etc.

Bill and Delia will be here for the June Grass Valley CBA Bluegrass Festival and we are looking forward to

hearing them then.

• No campsite reservations - Mark Hogan, CBA President, and long-time Festival Coordinator, has asked that this announcement be made. There are no campsite reservations for the June Grass Valley CBA Bluegrass Festival. He has been receiving calls and letters asking for hook-up sites and other reserved spots. This may be a policy at some other festivals, however, <u>CBA does not reserve campsites</u>.

Since California Bluegrass Association is a volunteer, non-profit organization, all of the people who plan the June festival, set up for camping, concessions, stage etc. are volunteers. There is a small paid crew that builds the stage and the clogging stage and takes care of the restrooms and garbage... but on the whole, all other

workers are volunteers.

If you have some medical disability which would necessitate power hook-up arrangements can be made with Mark for that need. All other campers are first-come first-served. We sincerely hope that you can understand why this policy is necessary.

May Campout to be held at Grass Valley Fairgrounds

Last month I promised that we would find a new campsite for our May 12, 13 and 14 campout which was originally planned for New Hogan Lake. I am happy to report that we have made arrangements to hold the event at the Nevada County Fairgrounds at Grass Valley (the same site as the June CBA Festival).

Those of you who have not been to Grass Valley to camp, be advised to bring your own chairs, tables and camping gear. I am trying to arrange for enough picnic tables for our potluck picnic/dinner on Saturday afternoon. The fee for camping is \$7.50 per night if you use water and electricity or \$5.00 if you use no hookups.

There are restrooms and showers available as well as a dump station for RV's. The Fairgrounds requires that each camper show proof of liability insurance on their rig (car, truck, motor home etc.) Please be ready to provide that information when you enter the fairgrounds.

Half Moon Bay Bluegrass Festival Slated for May 6

Bluegrass Grows on the Coast on Saturday, May 6, 1989 the First Annual Half Moon Bay Bluegrass Festival will be held just 4 miles north of Half Moon Bay, California,

at the Princeton harbor in Princeton.

This one-day event is funded by the Rotary Club of Half Moon Bay and will be hosted by Snakes in the Grass. Featured bands include: Laurie Lewis and Grant Street, Weary Hearts, and the Fog City Ramblers. The festival will begin at 11:00 a.m. and end at 7:00 p.m. Food and Drink will be available.

The weather on he coast in May is difficult to predict, however, it is advisable to dress for cool weather (unlike Grass Valley in July). Tickets may be purchased in advance at Gryphon Stringed Instruments in Palo Alto or by calling (415) 726-4460 or writing Rotary Bluegrass at 326

Advance tickets are \$10 and gate prices are \$12. The purpose of this event is two-fold: One, as Rotary International is a service club, all monies made by the festival will go back into both local community projects and international Rotary projects; and Two - to produce a high quality festival that will attract Bluegrass listeners throughout Northern California and establish a strong, sound festival that will continue to grow in the years to come.



Emily Post I am not, however, etiquette... specifically Bluegrass Festival etiquette is the subject of this article. In order to make our upcoming June Grass Valley Festival a happy, comfortable experience for everyone, here are a few things to remember:

•No pets - we are sure that you love your dog, cat, birds, fish, etc... however, they do not belong at Grass Valley. Your festival neighbors, and those folks who live around the fairgrounds do not appreciate having to deal with your pets when they misbehave. Please leave

folks... most people come to Bluegrass Music Festivals to enjoy the music - acoustic music. Let's all have some consideration for our neighbors... and if you must run your generator or play loud music all night... may you be

plagued with locusts!

*No Video Cameras in the stage areathis rule will probably make some folks very unhappy! However, I will try to explain it to you. Most of us would like to enjoy watching the performers on stage as well as hearing them. If you set up your video equipment in the front row... or in front of low-back chairs, etc. you will block the view of everyone behind you for at least 10 feet. This makes for very unhappy neighbors! Please - see Mark Hogan and ask him where you can video-tape... this can be worked out so that everyone is happy... or at least we hope so.

Ok, now that I have stirred up a hornet's nest... let's all just come to the June Festival and enjoy the music! I love Bluegrass music, the people I meet, the jams (even late at night)... I like to sing, to bask in the sun, and eat the great concession food, and I am sure you do too. Be kind to your neighbors this year and we can all enjoy the

festival!


