

The Country Gentlemen, one of America's premier Bluegrass bands played their first show in 1957 with an appearance in a Virginia night club. Since then they have performed at festivals, college campuses and clubs throughout the United States and around the world.

Charlie Waller, the band's founder still anchors the group. Charlie is the emcee, lead singer and guitarist. He was born in Texas, lived many years in the Washington D.C. area, and now resides in Gordonsville, Virginia.

Norman Wright currently of Falls Church, Virginia, plays mandolin and guitar and sings lead, tenor and baritone. He has worked with some excellent bands including the Bluegrass Cardinals, Bill Harrel and the Virginians and Harvest.

Kevin Church, from Manassas, Virginia is a second generation Country Gentlemen. His dad, Porter Church, was also the banjo player with the group many years ago. Like his father, Kevin is a dynamic, hard driving, picker in the "Scruggs" style.

Jimmy Bowen, from North Carolina, is the Bass player for the Gentlemen. He is the newest addition to the band, replacing long time band member Bill Yates.



Those of you who are dyed-in-the wool, 100% hardcore, BLUEGRASS FANS just skip this article. Or read on, if you would like to learn something a little different.

I had an opportunity this year in June at Grass Valley to talk to Grady Keystone and Anne Boykin, of Mendocino County. They are long-time CBA members who perform their music all year long, and jam with the best at every festival.

Anne and Grady play music which is not necessarily Bluegrass, but perhaps more folk or country oriented. They write much of their own material; Grady plays guitar and harmonica, and Anne plays fiddle and

mandolin and both of them sing.

I wrote a little bit in the July / August issue about some of the "alternative music" that they are performing, and thought that you (the readers) might be interested in hearing a little more about them. Grady Keystone wrote the following paragraphs which explain their music far better than I can.

Our first album, Night Hawk, is a collection of 12 songs inspired by nature. The songs reflect our reactions to, and love for the wilderness areas we have lived in and visited. We have songs for rivers, canyons, mountains, deserts, wild coastal areas, forests, and meadows, and the animals and birds that inhabit these areas. We are currently working our our 2nd album which will be a continuation of these themes. some of our "original" songs seem to come to us directly from nature. It is almost as if we "find" them rather than "make them up"

One of the most inspiring natural areas on our planet is the Grand Canyon of Colorado. Here is a place where you can go back 2 billion years in geological history and come close to the very heart of the Earth. A week or two in the Canyon gives you a sense of timelessness and a sense of conectedness with the life of this planet. The exposed rock formations, the Indian ruins and pictographs, the unusual plants and animals, the incredible beauty and colors, the sounds and smells of land and water, the clarity of the rest of the universe in the clear desert skies at night, and excitement, power and peace of the river make a rafting trip through the Grand Canyon a highlight of a lifetime.

In October we will be entertaining on a 17 day trip with O.A.R.S. (partial trips, from 5 days are available). There are some amazing natural theaters along the river and up side canyons, and music in camp by campfire or starlight enhances the day's experiences. With hundreds of original songs and hundreds of country and bluegrass standards there is opportunity for listening and participating in the music.

These rafting trips are a way for anyone to experience the wilderness without the rigors of backpacking, but with plenty of opportunities to hike of you so desire. The rapids are exciting but the majority of the river is peaceful. And there is lots of good

Creek Campgrounds. She was right in the big middle of all of the jamming... playing and singing. Barbara has a

wonderful warm, deep alto sort of voice, and knows an incredible number of songs.

We have listened to or jammed with Barbara during the last three CBA festivals, and this year in June my husband, Don, had an opportunity to talk

to her in depth about her music. She is more active musically then ever; is now playing with David Rengers, and they are collectively called "Mandolin Squeeze".

David plays mandolin and guitar and does vocals, while Barbara plays accordion and guitar and lead vocals. Their recently released cassette <u>Through the Years</u>, is a joy to listen to.

Songs included on the tape are: Ciribiribin; Cherry Pink and Apply Blossom White; Bonaparte's Retreat; Dancing With The Angels; Cuckoo's Nest; Rock the Cradle, Joe; La Golondrina; L'Histoire D'Amour; Amelia; Jesse Polka; When You And I Were Young, Maggie; New River Train; La Vie En Rose; and Ash Grove.

You can tell from the titles that these are not Monroestyle Bluegrass tunes.... but for something a little different, this is a wonderful tape. A lot of the songs are traditional folk tunes from Italy, England, Wales, Mexico and America, and all of them provide easy listening pleasure.

Barbara's voice blends well with David's and the mixture of Accordion, mandolin and guitar provides variety and a pleasant sound.

He has been one of the co-hosts of KCSM Bay Area Bluegrass, broadcast from San Mateo every Sunday afternoon for more than a year. Jim says that "I am very glad to see the improvements in the CBA of late and hope to be able to be a part of it."

Harold Crawford - Harold was born and raised in Washington County, Tennessee and has been involved in Bluegrass music for most of his life, since he was born into an old time and Bluegrass family. His father had a band and played throughout east Tennessee, western North Carolina, and southern Virginia. He also played on WCYB Bristol-Farm and Fun Time, Knox Knoxville-Cass Walker Show. Harold joined his father's band when he was quite young and played later around the Washington D.C. area.

Harold, who is 55 years old, was an operations manager for a dental equipment manufacturer for 10 years. After that he was division manager for Mencal Packaging Company and for the past five years has worked in Dental equipment sales and installation. Harold says of his candidacy for the CBA Board: "I have continued to support Bluegrass and hope to get a chance to bring that support and get involved as a member of the CBA Board.

M.D. Culpepper - M.D. "Pepper" Culpepper, 66, a CBA member for nine years, has been an active volunteer and organizer at every festival since. Pepper is a native of several states; Illinois, Tennessee, Wyoming, and for the last forty plus years, California. He is a retired iron worker and has a lot of spare time to devote to the CBA.

If he is elected to the Board, Pepper promises to do his utmost to represent the wishes of the Bluegrass fans and his hundreds of friends.

Don Denison (incumbent) - Don has served on the CBA Board for the past year as Activities Vice President and ticket sales coordinator for the past June Festival. Don is a life-long California resident, an amateur musician, and is active in two fiddle clubs. He is a facilities maintenance mechanic (jack of all trades) at General Electric Company in San Jose and has often been a volunteer set-up worker/carpenter at past CBA festivals.

As activities vice president this past year Don was able to organize a successful and enjoyable campout last May and is trying to get a fall/winter campout put

together.

If he is re-elected to the board he says he would like to: "promote more events in areas were we have large concentrations of members, like the Bay Area and the Central Valley." Other areas of concern for Don are to make the CBA financially solvent and provide better member services.

Lolan Ellis (incumbent) - A resident of Alameda County, Lolan first attended a CBA sponsored festival in 1976. Born in Kermit, Texas, he learned to play music with his twin brother, Nolan, at an early age. He is an electrician for the City of Oakland and an active members of the Northern California Songwriters Association. He plays with the "Raintree County" Band. Lolan has served on the CBA Board for the past year, working with Activities planning and ticket sales at the festival. He has been a volunteer on the festival crews for many years.

Lolan and his family have introduced many new members to Bluegrass music and the CBA and actively support the music. If re-elected, Lolan would like to see more activities throughout the year, especially in the Bay Area.

Allison Fisher - Allison states that her "purpose in running is to increase Bay Area membership and involvement in the CBA, and to promote more bluegrass events in the Bay Area. I also will push for CBA representation at the annual International Bluegrass Music Convention in Kentucky. I went on my own in 1988 and plan to attend again in 1989 to promote California bands and help tie California to the rest of the bluegrass world."

For the last three years she has booked and publicized the Forest Meadows Bluegrass Festival in Marin County, and hopes to institute similar events in the East Bay in the future. As manager and booker for the Freight and Salvage for five years, Allison consistently presented all the local bluegrass bands as well as touring bands such as the Nashville Bluegrass Band, J.D. Crowe, Tony Tishka, Eddy Adcock, Peter Rowan and Phil Salazar. She concludes: "a vote for me will guarantee an active voice

from the Bay Area on the Board of the CBA."

Hank Gibson - Hank has been a member of the CBA for many years and has attended all of the festival except the first one. He has been active in promoting Bluegrass music in the Napa area for many years and is the originator of a weekly jam which has been going strong for years. He is the bass player for "Snowy River Boys", a band which has played local Napa area dates for quite some time, and played at the Gold Country Festival this year.

This past year Hank volunteered to run the CBA ice concession booth at the June festival. He recruited and organized a crew of workers, set up the booth, provided a canopy, and his band enlivened the concession at various times during the festival. Hank recently retired from the Sheriff's Department and is willing to devote his time to working for the CBA and promoting Bluegrass music. He would appreciate your vote.

Mark Hogan (incumbent) - Mark has been a member of the CBA Board for several years and served as President for the 1988-89 year. He said that he feels "over the past three years the Board can count among its accomplishments the introduction of very good, if not, big name bluegrass bands from inside and outside California, our ticket prices have remained the lowest of any major California festival."

Mark has been active in the CBA since 1977 as a musician, volunteer, various times on the Board and has been the festival coordinator for the past three years. He plays bluegrass banjo in the Cotati based band - "Rhythm

Rasslers."

Mike Kemp - Mike is a 50 year old Labor Relations Representative who has resided in the City of Stockton since moving there eleven years ago from Carson City, Nevada. He was raised in the Orange County area of Southern California during an era when bluegrass and country music was not "cool". During these early years he describes himself as a "closet cowboy".

Mike's real interest in Bluegrass music, however, did not really blossom until he was exposed to clog dancing. After seeing a demonstration of clog dancing by Foggy Mountain Cloggers, Mike said to himself, "I have to learn how to do that". After many hard hours of practice, a group known as the Mule Shu Clogging Company was formed approximately 8 1/2 years ago. Mike has been the leader, choreographer and even coordinator for the Mule Shu Cloggers since its formation, bringing them to the CBA Bluegrass Festival twice.

Since clogging gets into the very depths of the rhythm of the music, Mike has since become interested in the upright bass and is presently teaching himself to become a bass player. Mike, who is single, has worked over 15 years in the labor relations field and is well-versed in organizational structures, committee formations, event coordination and membership representation. He feels that with his background in labor relations and organizations, his association with bluegrass music with

the Mule Shu Clogging Company, his desire to become a bass player (hopefully with a band) and undying love of Bluegrass music that he would be a good director for the California Bluegrass Association. He indicated he will commit to any and all meetings and other duties as required from a board member. Mike says: "On that note (b-flat) I urge you to vote for Mike Kemp for CBA Board of Directors."

Russell Loop - Russell has lived in California since July of 1982. It did not take him long to find the Santa Cruz Bluegrass Association and the California Bluegrass Association. After joining both groups he became a promoter to "all that I came across." Russell says that "having done so (promoted CBA), several other CBA members have suggested for the last two years that perhaps I should use my efforts for the benefit of the CBA and run for a position on the board."

Russell feels that he has the organizational skills needed to bring new life and ideas to the association. He has been responsible for making sure that Bill White - Harmonica has been to the festival and gigs for the past five years. Bill has been a great influence to Russell and "countless others" for many years. Russell says: "I hope that we can continue to work together to make the CBA bigger and better. I would appreciate your vote."

Carl Pagter (incumbent) - Carl was among the founders of the CBA in late 1974 and has been active in its affairs and on the Board for many years. He has been Chairman of the Board for the past five years. He and his wife Judie are members of "Country Ham", a nationally known old-time string band. Carl is a consultant with Kaiser Cement Corporation and resides in Walnut Creek. His goals for the CBA include: 1) solvency and financial health; 2) preservation and continuing improvement of the June Grass Valley Festival; 3) expansion of CBA events and activities; and 4) promotion of bluegrass and old-time music in California.

David Putnam - David has been in Bluegrass music for 18 years now and he says he loves it more than ever. David says: "My intentions deep in my heart are that this music we love so much continue in the traditions from which it came, and at the same time our festivals feature the best in new talent as well as the tried and true headliners."

David's qualifications come from his direct experience in playing with many Bluegrass bands, not to mention hundreds of hours of jamming with friends and neighbors through the years. He is currently a member of the newly formed band "Tenbrooks", which is playing dates around the bay area.

As a Board member, David says that his desire is "to maintain the highest quality of festival life for everyone and keep the association running smoothly. Thank you for voting for me."

Mary Runge (incumbent) - Mary has been a member of

the CBA board since she was appointed to fill a vacancy nearly two years ago. She serves as the Membership Vice President and has worked with the ticket sales committee, gate ticket sales at the festivals, and has spent many volunteer hours as part of the gate crew at past festivals. In addition, Mary is one of the best cooks at the festivals, and has fed many a hungry musician.



Bob Thomas - Bob lives in Orangevale, California, however, his ancestors are from Bathe County, Kentucky and he has enjoyed Bluegrass music for many years. He says he is "not a good musician, but play my guitar in jam sessions and accompany my two sons who are learning mandolin and fiddle." He has worked at the last three Midsummer festivals and at the CBA festival this year as a ticket seller and part of the festival crew.

Bob has five years professional experience in nonprofit association management (Executive Director, California Employer Council). He feels that organizing volunteers and building membership are some of his best skills. He says: "I will gladly give my time and effort to foster the growth of the California Bluegrass Association and work to provide more services for its members."

I am offering for your review a synopsis of our Preliminary Financial Statement from this years

festival.



Dave Pomeroy. Who in the heck, (but I wasn't thinking heck,) is Dave Mallett? This was the question I was asking myself as I looked at this album cover. "Not another country album to review, "I was saying to myself. Now under-stand, I'm not totally against country music, but I'd rather be listening to some good old traditional bluegrass.

The only country musician that I've cared to listen to recently is Don Williams, I really enjoy the smooth, laid back style Don projects. So imagine my surprise when I put the record on the turntable, and began to listen to what this Mr. Mallett had to offer. Dave has a voice and a delivery style that is similar to, but not a copy of, the great Don Williams, and, as far as listening enjoyment, I like him just about as much. This was one of the most relaxed, easy listening records that I have heard in quite some time. The vocal and

instrumental work on this album is outstanding. It's

clean, smooth, simple, and best of all, It's not over produced. I didn't think that anyone could come near Don Williams and his mellow, easy style in putting a song across. But after listening to this album by Dave Mallett, I have definitely changed my mind.



Of the records that I was asked to review, this one turned out to be the best in pure listening enjoyment. This is not a bluegrass album, but for anyone who likes Don Williams, I think you will enjoy this effort by Dave Mallett equally well.

Being an early Dillard's fan, I have to admit that I had made my mind up before I even listened to this album that I probably wasn't going to like it. After all it wasn't the "Original Dillard's" therefore it couldn't possibly be any good. How could Doug Dillard think he could even come close to the exciting sound produced by the original group when they were playing the clubs and appearing on the Andy Griffith Show as part of the Darling Family? Was I ever wrong.

The DOUG DILLARD BAND, with Doug Dillard and

vocalist Ginger Boatwright, fuses country,

bluegrass, rock, and folk into a blend of enjoyable listening pleasure. I think that even some of the die-hard traditionalist, of which I'm one, will find some of the cuts on this album enjoyable. I really enjoyed the vocal harmonies on this album, and of course, old Doug hasn't lost any of his banjo skills over the years and this fact is

especially noted in the tunes "Banjo On The Mountain" and "G-String Boogie." Having a passing interest in the guitar myself, I really enjoyed the clean sounding lead guitar provided by David Grier throughout this album. Though Doug, Ginger, and Roger shared the lead vocal work on this recording, I Think that Ginger provided the strongest lead vocal on the album. She has a unique voice and a style that is her own. Even though this album is not the traditional work that the early Dillard fans would hope to be hearing, it is, nonetheless, a very enjoyable album. So if you like the hard driving sound of the banjo as only Doug can play it, good harmony, clean guitar work, and some solid fiddle and mandolin, I highly recommend that you check this album out.

If you're one of the many who like old time country and western swing, you might want to give this record a spin on you turntable and take a trip back to when

country music was pure and simple.

This is not a bluegrass album. It is primarily a country and western swing combination with so many different musicians performing on it that I won't try to list them all. There are a couple of songs, "Follow The Leader," and "Don't Let Your Deal Go Down," that have a bluegrass flavor to them. All of the banjo fans out there will probably be disappointed in this recording because there are only two cuts on the entire album that have a banjo on them. There is, however some nice dobro, fiddle, and mandolin work on the album.

A lot of the fiddle work on this album was done by Rocky Stone, an old time fiddler who recorded and performed with such greats as Tex Ritter, Gene Autry, Spade Cooley and Tex Williams. I will admit that I was impressed with the musical talents of Roger Bellow, There were two instrumental selections, "Follow The Leader" and "Stealin' Home", where Roger, (thanks to the miracle of multi-track recording.), played all the instruments on the recordings, including the guitar, fiddle, banjo, mandolin, dobro and bass.

The vocals on this recording are not as strong as I would like, but there is some nice harmony work done. The country and western swing selections on this recording are done in an honest traditional fashion and are a reminder of the styles of Bob Wills, and others of

that genre.

Despite what we hardcore bluegrass fans believe, there are other forms of good music to be listened to. So if you like country and western swing music, done in a straightforward style, check out the effort put out by Roger Bellow and the Drifting Troubadours.

Cattle in the Cane - A Traditional Old-time Fiddle Tune In A Challenging Arrangement for Guitar by Steve Pottier

Our music for this month is a fine fiddle tune arranged for guitar. This is a piece of music that will prove challenging for all but the most experienced player. Even though this arrangement is not easy to learn, it is worth the effort required. I'm not sure of the history of this tune, only that it is reported to be Irish in origin, and has been part of our traditional music for some time. It has been a popular piece in fiddle contests, allowing a good musician to show off his/her abilities.

This arrangement was provided by Steve Pottier. Most have us have seen and heard Steve perform many times as both a bassist, and featured guitarist with High Country. Steve has also played with the Done Gone band, and with the Squids. He is a fine guitarist, and has been willing to give advice and share his knowledge

with fellow musicians.

Steve has asked me to give credit to Barry Soloman, though this is Steve's break, he says that it was Barry who first had the idea to play the tune this way.

Steve told me he likes to play the A major part first and the A minor section second. It sounds great this way but be advised that most old time fiddlers play the A

minor part first.

I've retained Steve's method for writing rests in the tableture. He has used X for the beat with no note played (rest). It is easy to write and easy to read. If any of you have trouble reading this notation let me know, I'll go back to the standard method. I hope you have fun with this tune. Next month we will have something aimed at the beginning to intermediate player.
