



Sidesaddle's Ten Year Anniversary Party Rescheduled and Ready to Go



JD's Bluegrass Kitchen

Howdy, Howdy, Howdy!

I've often wondered how many of us in and around Bluegrass music have copied that opening statement from Bill Monroe over the years? He's probably one of the most copied (or imitated) men in the world. We as a whole are a testament to that fact, I would say. I've also often wondered what I would've named this column if Bill and Lester, and Earl hadn't of got together in 1946. J.D.'s Old Time Pickin Kitchen? Or how about, J.D.'s Electric Top 40 Country Music Kitchen?... Those just don't seem to evoke the memories of long summer days in the mountains with family and friends around, the way the word Bluegrass does. When I hear the word Bluegrass, my ears pick up, the old pulse goes up about ten notches and a ton of good memories are recalled instantly. As Bill would say: "My, what a powerful word Bluegrass is!"

If you've been reading this column for any length of time you know by now that I am hopelessly hooked on good biscuits. One of my favorite memories as a small boy in Arkansas is that of my mother taking a big cast iron skillet of hot biscuits out of the oven of our wood burning kitchen stove. I'll swear that you could see a little halo over each one as it floated gently about a quarter of an inch above the bottom of the skillet. Talk about your light biscuits! In fact all of the old timers from back then differentiated between corn bread which was the everyday fare, and biscuits. They called biscuits or any baked white bread, "Light Bread". My uncle Pee Wee to this day calls any bread other than corn bread "Light Bread". On the other end of the spectrum my buddy Sonny Hammond of Portland, Oregon bakes "Heavy Bread". One bit of his corn bread confirms that! (I thought you folks would enjoy knowing a little mountain "Biscuit Lore".)

One of the ways that I learned to cook biscuits from my mother is one that you hardly ever see used today. Most everyone thinks that you have to use an oven of some sort to bake good biscuits. Well I'm here to tell you that it 'tain't so! All you need is a stove or fire of some sort, be it wood, gas, charcoal, etc., and a good heavy cast iron skillet. Put your skillet on to heat over as low to medium fire. Make up your biscuits like you normally would,

using the recipe of your choice.

When your biscuits are ready grease 'em good on both sides with butter, cooking oil, bear grease, goose grease, or whatever you prefer, but you do have to grease 'em. Not real heavy, a light coat is all that is needed. Also grease the skillet too, then pop your biscuits in and cover with a lid. Keep a close eye on the bottoms so's they don't burn. A low fire is best and it won't burn 'em, just get 'em a good crunchy brown, and take just a few minutes to cook.

When they're done on one side, turn 'em over and cook till done. There you have good old Fashioned Arkansas stove top biscuits! Compared to one of these gastronomical delights, all of the commercially available stove top conglomerations of preservatives taste like road patching compound. When I used to cook up a



batch of these for breakfast in our hunting camp, I never had to gather the fire wood or fetch water from the creek. In fact, all I had to do was cook and them boys done all the rest, as long as I kept them biscuits comin! While we're on the subject of biscuits here's a recipe that Sue Shelasky Walters gave me. I promised to feature it for her so here it is. Sue calls these:

Golden Biscuits

1 1/2 cup unbleached flour

1/2 cup raw wheat germ

2 1/2 tsp double acting baking powder

3/4 tsp salt

3 Tbsp shortening

3/4 cup milk

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. *Add wheat germ, and work in shortening with a large fork. Add milk and mix good. Roll out 1/2" thick and cut your biscuits. Bake at 400° to 425° for about 20 minutes or until golden brown. Yummy, Yummy!

Boy, a batch of these with butter and honey on a cold winter morning along with a good pot of coffee is all one needs for a good hearty breakfast. Thank you, Sue for sharing your favorite biscuit recipe with all f us. I know

the folks will enjoy this one for years to come.

One of my favorites to barbecue are Cornish Game Hens. They're just the right size for individual servings, they're easy to prepare and cook, and plus they're tasty lil' suckers.

You can prepare them ahead of time and keep them chilled good until you need 'em, and then take them out at least an hour before you need 'em and put 'em on the barbecue to cook.

There's several different ways to cook these tasty little morsels, but here's one of my favorite ways. These are best when cooked on a barbecue that has a cover to retain the heat. I call this recipe:

Festival Game Hens

Olive oil
Sage (ground)
Rosemary (ground)
Salt
Fresh ground pepper
1/4 orange per bird
apple cider vinegar
1 or 2 birds per person

Rub the game hen good all over with Olive Oil. Salt and pepper inside and out to taste. Sprinkle cavity and exterior with Sage and Rosemary, lightly. Add a dash of Apple Cider Vinegar to the cavity... just a little bit does it. Stuff the quartered orange in the cavity and wrap with heavy foil. Place on Barbecue and cook for 1 1/2 hours

over medium coals. When done, unwrap and serve right in the foil.

A word of caution here. These will cause command performances — and become habit forming with all of your family and friends. In fact I think I" whip up a batch of these this weekend!

I'm writing this particular edition of the Bluegrass Kitchen the night after the big earthquake in the Bay Area. As all or most of you folks know, I've talked of preventive maintenance on a regular basis on all of your camping gear. If for nothing else it will be ready to use in such an emergency like the one we have all witnessed and maybe even been in this week. You should always have your stove and lanterns in tip top shape with at least one spare generator for each one along with 6 to 12 spare mantles for your lantern. I always keep at least 2 gallons of stove and lantern fuel and if you can afford it 5 gallons. It doesn't go bad if kept correctly stored and could be your only source of light and heat in such an emergency. I always keep my water cans full, and I change the water every month or so. (We used these for two days last winter when we had a blizzard here in the mountains where I live and everything froze up.)

It's also a good idea to have about a weeks worth of canned goods stored up too. They don't take up much space, don't spoil or require refrigeration and as long as you rotate your supplies they stay fresh. I'm sure that a lot of those folks that I saw on TV tonight sleeping in the parks around the bay area would've given anything for just the basic camping gear. I'd like fo all of you out there to check your gear this week and make sure everything is

in tip top shape and stored safely. Living here in California is fun and I'd like to keep it that way for all of us, but we should be ready to help ourselves and others if the need should arise. Remember, 6.9 earthquakes don't exactly call and let you know that they're on their way!

As you know, from time to time I let all of you good folks know about a good place to eat. For you folks who travel up highway 88 and go through Jackson, California, you can have a good old fashioned meal at the Wells

Fargo Restaurant in downtown Jackson.

It's not one of your fancy, new glitzy franchise types, and it's real easy to find, and it's worth the trip just to eat there. All of their soups are home made and are excellent. I especially love their Chili Bean Soup. Another of my favorites is the Rib Steak Dinner. You get soup, salad, with all the condiments, fresh french bread, crackers, etc. With your steak there is always mashed potatoes and gravy and two vegetables. All for \$9.80. And this ain't no little steak that you can read a newspaper through either!

Stop in and have one of the better "store bought" meals you'll ever have and say howdy to Danny the owner and my favorite waitress, Margot. The coffee is great ans so's the people and food.

Why is it called the "Wells Fargo"? Because it is in the old Wells Fargo bank building, that's why! No use

changing an established name, is there?

Well, my friends, that's it for this month, so until next time keep on pickin that good old Bluegrass and may God grant you all peace and health.



Results of the 1989 Election



Friday night, November 10, in Sacramento the CBA produced its first concert in a few years, featuring the Country Gentlemen and California Quickstep. I'm happy to report that not only was the music great... the concert was a sell-out!

The 24th Street theatre, a 296 person capacity house, in the Sierra 2 Performing Arts Center on 24th Street in Sacramento was the concert site. The theatre was recently refurbished, and is a great place for an acoustic music concert.

The sound system was set-up and run by Allen Hendricks and his helpers, and was really great! The acoustics of the theatre helped, but Allen's system allowed everyone in the audience to hear without being overpowering or shrill.

Éric Rice of KVMR Radio in Nevada City was the emcee for the concert. Eric does an excellent job each year in broadcasting the Grass Valley Festival, and demon-

strated that he is equally at home on stage.

California Quickstep, a Sacramento favorite, opened the show with a great Bluegrass set. Multitalented musician, Ted Smith, played mandolin, fiddle and "tract-tar" with equal dexterity and finesse. Other members of the group include, Allen Hendricks on banjo, Tim Prior, on bass, and Thom Bentley, on guitar. All of the group (except Allen) sing... and do it beautifully.

Although Quickstep is better known for its novelty numbers i.e. "Mama Don't Allow" which features Ted on the newspaper... they have marvelous voices, handle their instruments very well, and can play great traditional bluegrass with the best of them.

After a brief intermission the Country Gentlemen took center stage and proceeded to knock the sox off of

the audience. Charlie Waller has another winning combination in this band. Through the years he has had some wonderful musicians in the Gentlemen, including Doyle Lawson, John Duffy, Porter Church, and Eddie Adcock to name a few, however, I felt that the three fellows who appeared with him in Sacramento were about the best combination so far.

Kevin Church, on banjo, following in his father's footsteps, is a hard-driving picker who can sing like a bird. Jimmy Bowen, on acoustic bass, has one of the most beautiful tenor voices I have ever heard... crisp, clear and a joy to listen to. Norman Wright, mandolin, guitar and vocals performed some wonderful breaks, sang, and played a couple of his own compositions. And Charlie Waller, the leader, founder and driving force behind the Country Gentlemen, gave a wonderful performance spiced with old favorites and some great new material.

One of the crowd's favorites was *The Rebel Soldier*, which nearly brought tears to my eyes, and I'm a Yankee from Minnesota! Other great numbers were: *Fox on the Run, In a Land Where No Cabins Fall*, and Charlie's Hank Snow impersonation plus a great "Frog Song".

I, for one, would welcome both of these groups to play anytime! If you did not have a chance to see them in concert in Sacramento, you really missed something


