

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Bluegrass Folks -- Barry and Jan Willis

Not many years ago some really good musicians came onto the bluegrass scene and that set the stage. Among the first to realize the value of this music were the college students. Along with more wide acceptance, many colleges and universities, and even Carnegie Hall rolled out the welcome mat.

The "Hillbilly" perception has been a tough one to overcome, but better musicians, a larger variety of songs, more impressive appearance on stage, more professionalism, better sound systems and many other factors have been of assistance. No longer is one who plays or even listens to bluegrass music deemed "most unlikely to succeed". As a result, today we meet many impressive people who are bluegrass folks. Here are two more of them.

Meet Barry and Jan Willis. Barry was born in Chicago. His father was a career navy officer, a captain at the time of his retirement. Consequently, Barry says he has one time or another, lived in almost every state in the U.S. of A. He describes his family as being "not at all musical". But Barry had a mind of his own, and somehow at a very young age, he developed a liking of bluegrass and old-time music.

He noticed this type of music being used as fill-ins by radio and

TV stations between programming. For example, before and after the news. He was inspired to the point that he bought a ukulele and was learning to play it when he became overwhelmed by the sound of the five string banjo. So, he bought a five string banjo. He was only having limited success with it, as he was tuning it like a ukulele until he discovered how it should be tuned. His learning of the banjo was interrupted though, when he volunteered for the Air Force as an enlisted man. Being interested in airplanes, Barry began learning all he could about them. It wasn't long until he became a crew chief.

Then, later he was living in Sunnyvale and commuting to the Ordinance Test Facility in California's Santa Cruz Mountains. Ever aware of what was going on in the music world, he began spending Friday and Saturday nights in a nearby pizza parlor, listening to The Over Easy Band. Band members at that time were: Aric Leavitt, Todd Phillips, and the Canote Brothers. He says it was about that time that he thought "pizza, beer and bluegrass" were all one word. He even began taking banjo lessons from Aric, but a discharge from the Air Force and a move to Alaska put an end to that.

Barry took private flying lessons during college and for quite some time afterward, and became a qualified instrument-rated pilot. He had put in an application for a job as a pilot with United Airlines, but he knew that wth so much keen competition, and with so few hours in the air, he hadn't much chance of

getting the job. So, he moved to Alaska and went to work as a bush pilot, a great experience, but not without a great danger factor.

In Alaska he flew natives, tourists, loggers and forest service personnel, mostly in pontoon equipped planes all over the giant state. About ten years and 2200 additional flying hours later, the fuel crisis not only forced him to leave Alaska, but made it nearly impossible to get another pilot's job even with his qualifications.

He decided to move to Oregon, where he had various flying jobs including flying freight out of Vancouver. It was also during that time that he had more time to devote to music. He started a bluegrass show on commercial radio, circulating from two stations. He also put on two bluegrass festivals in Oregon, hiring the talent, advertising and conducting most of the related business. His free time also allowed him to get real serious with the banjo, or begin writing a book he'd been visualizing which he planned would be like none other ever written on the subject of bluegrass music. He opted for the latter of the two overwhelming jobs.

He had become a veteran pilot with over 7,000 flying hours, but he was still a relatively young man and still had no substantial job. Barry started looking for a pilot's job in all the western states. He sent out 150 resumes in as many airports, with little or no response. Things just weren't going well right then. Shortly after that, lo and behold, United Airlines called! They had finally come through for him after all those years. So he went and took their training, and was soon making regular trips across the country as a copilot. Some time back he was

promoted to his present position of

This job has given him a real advantage, too, enabling him to go to bluegrass festivals all over the country. It has also enabled him to go wherever necessary to obtain interviews with bluegrass artists, and anyone else while he was writing his recently published book titled, "America's Music, BLUE-GRASS". The book contains many rare photos, goes back to the beginning of the genre, and continues up to the present. It has been called the "most comprehensive coverage of bluegrass music", and is definitely the best reference book anywhere on the subject.

Enter Jan. She was working in a booth at a bluegrass festival in Colorado when they met. At that time, and for several more years, she was a member of an all girls bluegrass band called "Ladies' Choice". Jan wasn't only "Ladies' Choice" either, and after a while Barry placed a ring on her finger. She was the mandolin player in the band and assisted with the vocals. The band is no longer active, but when it was, played rather extensively, primarily in Colorado, the state in which she and Barry make their home.

At one time, Jan was President of the Colorado Bluegrass Music Society. Something you won't hear her say, (nor did I), but Barry told me she is a heroine. Once she was hiking I the mountains with Slim Richey, a record company executive from Houston, when he severely injured one of his feet so badly that it was impossible for him to walk. Jan supported and practically carried him for several miles until they got to a place where he could receive first air. Richey gives





Good Old Fashioned Bluegrass Festival set for July 10-12 in Hollister

SANTA CRUZ, CA — The Good Old Fashioned Bluegrass Festival will be held Friday - Sunday, July 10-12, 1998 at Bolado Park near Hollister, California. The 5th annual event is a benefit for the Santa Cruz Bluegrass Society.

The best of California's acoustic Bluegrass bands will perform on the festival's main stage. Meanwhile, all around the grounds, professional and amateur musicians will be making their own music all day long (and well into the night) in small jam sessions.

Several big changes are instore for this year's festival in Grass Valley at the Nevada County Fairgrounds July 31 through August 2. What most folks are excited about is the relocation of the stage to the middle of the campground where the old CBA and Midsummer stages were. This allows camping closer to the stage and an easier walk to the seating area. The new stage will face into the trees to provide shaded seating!

I asked Barry if he'd like to add anything. "Yes," he said, "I wish to thank all of the many individuals I interviewed and who cooperated to make this book possible. I was a complete stranger to many of them, and there I was sticking a microphone in their faces, and without much warning, asking them to talk and answer my questions. They were all just great and without them I couldn't have done this."

Barry and Jan will have a book with copies of "America's Music, BLUEGRASS" for sale at the CBA Festival in Grass Valley this month. They would welcome anyone who came by to say hello.

Come Celebrate America's Independence Day in Colfax



The sounds of bluegrass and old-time music conjure up images of mountain folk back in Appalachia singing their hearts and souls out while playing acoustic instruments. Standard subjects sung about are lost love, being poor, working in the mines, and praying on Sundays. One of the last places you would expect to see some fine old-time music being sung is in the hills of one of the most expensive cities in the country. San Francisco is where you will find the bluegrass/ old-time band The Crooked Jades and their new CD "Going To The

Since the closing of Paul's Saloon, the longtime home to bluegrass in SF, in 1991, bluegrass music has been hard to find in this urban jungle. Fortunately for us fans a little café in the Mission District called Radio Valencia began featuring bluegrass a few years back on Sunday nights, and that is where The Crooked Jades can be found performing once a month. Even though they are young and based in the big city they've got old-time mountain music flowing through their veins.

The Jades are led by guitarist/ lead singer/songwriter Jeff Kazor who grew up in the Santa Cruz area. The band really wanted to go for an authentic old-time sound, so they recorded Going To The Races like they did in the old days - live in the studio and in two days time. The end result is a fine new recording of old and new songs that harkens back to a bygone era.

The first song, Visits, about yearning to go back and see old friends, jumps out of the starting gate like a bucking bronco. The pace is reined in a bit with Those Six Years, a Kazor original about a failed love affair. They learned Train On The Island, a traditional song, from Bruce Molsky, and it features just Lisa Berman's Weissenborn and some fine guitar playing by guest artist and veteran Bay Area bluegrass musician Steve Pottier.

The race is on again with the next four songs. Black Eyed Susie is sung by bassman Dan Lynn, and 44 Gun, a song from the 1920s by original Coon Creek Girl Lily Mae Ledford, is sung by dobro player Berman and guitarist Kazor. LUGs and BUGs is an original instrumental composition by banjo player Tom Lucas, who also sings lead on the next song, Sail Away Ladies.

The song Texas is on the CD twice. The first one is a short and pretty tri-fiddle version, and the latter is a driving full-band take that displays the "crooked" style of fiddle playing, from where the band gets part of its name. Medicine Springs is a Bill Grant and Ralph Stanley song that is sung as a duet by Berman and guest Sue Sandlin, and they conjure up images of a younger Hazel and Alice.

Little Dortie is a high-energy original by Kazor that is a tribute to his mother, followed by the Carter Stanley title cut Going To The Races, a slow, haunting duet by Kazor and Berman with only voices, guitar and dobro. The race finally winds down with the gospel-like Going Up Home To Live In Green Pastures that features just a guitar and the voices of the band.

There is nothing crooked or jaded about the relatively new urban old-time bluegrass band The Crooked Jades. This is a straightforward gem of a recording that sounds like a cross between the Freight Hoppers and The Carter Family. If you're Going To The Races here's a hot tip - spend some greenbacks on this can't-miss CD. Odds are you will come out a winner and you'll have a real grand old-time.

Lonesome River **Tributaries**

It has been two years since One Step Forward, the last Lonesome River Band (LRB) recording, and you may have been wondering what the boys have been up to. Besides playing live shows, it turns out they have been very busy with solo recording projects - three of which are reviewed here - as well as working on a new LRB CD that will be out this summer. And for those of you wondering where lead singer and bassman Ronnie Bowman's CD is, well, it's coming soon.

LRB is one of the most popular contemporary bands in bluegrass. Their CD Carrying The Tradition won the IBMA's Album of the Year award in 1992 and Ronnie Bowman's solo recording Cold Virginia Night won the same prize in 1995, and he also won Male Vocalist of the Year that same year. And Sammy Shelor has won Best Instrumentalist of the Year for banjo the last three years in a row. With accomplishments like these it is no surprise that these guys sound so

Sammy Shelor doesn't sing very much but he doesn't have to as he lets his fingers do the talking for him on Leading Roll. Seven of the twelve songs are instrumentals, and he has some stellar sideman on his CD: guitarist Tony Rice, dobro deity Jerry Douglas, mandolinist Dan Tyminski (formerly of LRB) of Alison Krauss and Union Station, Ronnie Simpkins of the Seldom Scene on bass, and LRB bandmates Kenny Smith and Ronnie Bowman, to name a few. On the five songs that feature vocals there are five different guest singers. But as you might imagine, the banjo is the star here, with Sammy taking the Leading Roll, both figuratively and literally, with this supporting cast of bluegrass

Kenny Smith, the big man with the sweet high lonesome voice, flatpicks like there is no tomorrow. Like Shelor's CD, seven of the songs on Studebaker are instrumentals. Kenny sings lead on four of the tunes, and his wife Amanda Smith sings the remaining song, a real pretty piece called Lay This Broken Heart To Rest, a song that could easily be out there on the country charts. Besides being assisted by his LRB bandmates, Smith gotable help from former LRB member Adam Steffey on mandolin and Barry Bales on bass. Both of these guys are from the Union Station band. Studebaker hums along like a well-tuned vintage automobile.

Mandolin player Don Rigsby has A Vision, which is an album consisting entirely of gospel songs and he got lots of help by some of the players already mentioned as well as others, such as Ricky Skaggs,

Ralph Stanley, J.D. Crowe, David Parmley, and others. Unlike Shelor and Smith's CDs there are no instrumentals here and Rigsby sings lead on 11 of the 13 cuts, deferring to Dr. Ralph on the remaining two. Close your eyes while listening to Don Rigsby on A Vision and you'll swear you see/hear visions of Vince Gill or Ricky Skaggs, two of the finer country/bluegrass singers around, both of whom Rigsby has played with and learned from.

There aren't too many bluegrass bands out there with each member taking one step forward with their own projects. Each one of these CDs is different than the other vet with a lot of the same people playing throughout. The Lonesome River Band's strength is the sum of its parts, but if you can't wait for the new LRB album or lead singer Ronnie Bowman's CD you can't go wrong with any of these three LRB members who are carrying the tradition to newer and higher

You know, over the past few years I have heard many folks say that the contemporary bluegrass groups of today have lost touch with the sound of traditional bluegrass music. That they have abandoned the heart and soul of what the music is all about.

Well, that's not exactly true, and I think you will agree once you have heard this latest project by IIIrd Tyme Out, titled "Live At The MAC" (Mountain Arts Center in

Prestonburg, Kentucky). This is their first "Live" recording, and it is full of some of the best traditional bluegrass music that has ever been recorded.

On this CD the guys do classic stuff by the likes of Bill Monroe, Flatt & Scruggs, as well as many other outstanding song writers. They deliver songs like "White House Blues", "Blue Moon Of Kentucky" and "Tennessee Waltz" as only they can do. The gospel tunes, "He Said If I Be Lifted Up", "It's A Lonesome Road" and "Lord Protect My Soul", presents some of the best quartet singing that you'll hear anywhere. The harmonies are so smooth and clean, a pure joy to listen to.

The only instrumental on this album is the tune "Little Rabbit". On this tune Steve Dilling and Mike Hartgrove do a banjo and fiddle duet. These types of duets were very popular in the Flatt & Scruggs

In my opinion, this is one of the finest albums that IIIrd Tyme Out has produced to date. I have always like this group and I was glad to see them show the world that they have not lost touch with the roots of bluegrass music.

The guys have taken these classic tunes and presented them the way they are supposed to sound, and yet they have given them; a refreshing new beginning.

This is one that I highly recommend that you add to your collec-





"Friends For A Lifetime" is the latest release on Rounder Records by the talented Claire Lynch.

I have to say up front, this is not hard-core traditional bluegrass. Claire describes herself as a "progressive" bluegrass singer.

Most of the songs on this CD are gospel songs. Claire put her heart and soul into her music. I have always enjoyed listening to her sing. She has a very powerful voice, a voice that is easily recognizable once you have heard her sing.

The songs on this CD are a mixture of a touch of bluegrass and country. Claire assembled some very top musicians to put this project together. When you read the names of the artists appearing on the CD, you just know the instrumental work is going to be nothing other than first rate. But it's Claire's distinctive voice that stands out on this recording. The vocal harmonies are clean and well blended, and are a joy to listen to.

Claire wrote, or co-wrote four of the songs that are presented here. She wrote "Lead Me On" and "Somewhere Above". She co-wrote "Go On And Do The Same" with Pamela Brown Hayes and "Friends For A Lifetime" with Susan Stewart.

Even though my musical taste leans more toward the traditional bluegrass sound, I found that I enjoyed listening to this album.

So, if your taste goes beyond hard-core traditional bluegrass, I think you will find this CD very enjoyable.

"Spirited" is the latest release by Eddie and Martha Adcock on the Pinecastle label. The first thing I would have to say about this recording is that it is not straight ahead bluegrass. Eddie has long been recognized as a pioneer of "new acoustic music". His music is a fusion of elements of bluegrass with jazz, folk and a bit of rockabilly. He and Martha have been performing together for a couple of decades. They have worked in band settings and as a duo.

If your musical taste goes beyond traditional bluegrass, you're sure to enjoy this one. The magic of over dubbing gives this trio of Eddie, Martha and Missya full group sound. The instrumental work on this album is first rate. The vocals are solid and well blended. There are 6 original tunes on this project. Eddie wrote "The Narrow Road", "What Love Can't Do", "Spirited", "Living Waters" and "Rainbow". Martha wrote the gospel tune "Gonna Get There Soon". They have included three instrumental tunes on this CD. "Narrow Road", "Spirited" and "Rainbow" show off the picking talents of this group.

"On Fire" is the latest recording by the Larry Stephenson Band on the Pinecastle label. This is Larry's tenth release on the Pinecastle since he started with them ten years ago.

Larry has worked with such notable bands as Bill Harrell & The Virginians and the Bluegrass Cardinals. He sites his early influences as the Osborne Brothers and the Country Gentlemen. He is one of the best high/lead tenors in the business today. The title cut "On Fire", a song that Larry wrote, is a tribute to the Osborne Brothers.

I have been a Larry Stephenson fan ever since I first saw him perform on TV with the Bluegrass Cardinals on a show called "Fire On The Mountain" hosted by David Holt. His high clear tenor voice just blew me away.

As you listen to this CD, you're going to hear some very solid bluegrass music. The picking is hot and the vocals are pristine. The picking of these fine musicians can best be appreciated when you listen to the only instrumental on this project. Their lively rendition of "My Wild Irish Rose" is full of drive and energy.

The driving banjo of Kristin Scott should put a stop to those critics who say women don't belong in bluegrass music. You guitar pickers are in for a treat as you listen to the clean picking of Booie Beach. Larry provides some hot mandolin picking on this CD, and Mickey Harris anchors it all with his solid bass playing.

There is a good selection of songs on this project. I especially enjoyed "On Fire" and "My Wild Irish Rose". But, I must add that there was not a song on the album that I didn't enjoy.

"Our Point Of View" is the latest release by The New Coon Creek Girls on the Pinecastle Label.

This talented group of ladies have been pleasing bluegrass fans since 1980. I had the pleasure of seeing this group perform at Owensboro, Kentucky in 1993. I was totally impressed with the vocals of Dale Ann Bradley. She has a pure and unique voice that is full of emotion and energy. As you listen to Dale Ann, and think to yourself it can't get any better than this, she is joined by Ramona Church Taylor and Vicki Simmons to produce some of the most beautiful harmony singing that you're going to hear.

These young ladies are more than just a group of pretty voices. They are very accomplished instrumentalists. A fact that they amply prove with the first cut on this CD. The instrumental "On Fire" allows the gals to really show off their instrumental skills. On this selection you are going to hear some mighty fine banjo, fiddle, mandolin and guitar picking, all done at a very brisk pace.

As good as their instrumental work is, it's their vocals that impressed me the most. Their harmonies are tight and the way their voices blend, I'll tell you folks, it's hard to beat.

On this CD, the group has included nine original songs, as well as two instrumentals and two other traditional tunes, for a total of thirteen tunes for your listening enjoyment.







The California Bluegrass Association welcomes you to our 23rd Annual Father's Day Weekend Bluegrass Festival. We hope that you will enjoy your weekend with us at the beautiful Nevada County Fairgrounds in Grass Valley, the Bluegrass Capitol of California.

Grass Valley is located approximately 45 miles from California's Capitol, Sacramento, on Highway 49. From Sacramento head east on Highway 80 (toward Reno, Nevada). Take the Auburn Highway 49 exit (second exit), and head North (left) for approximately 28 miles. Exit in Grass Valley at the second exit or Empire Street Exit, turn left (West) and take the first right exit. At the Mill Street stop sign, make a right and go under the freeway; then make another right at the McCourtney Road stop sign. Follow McCourney Road up the nill and enter the Fairgrounds at Gate 4. Use Gate 1 for single day auto

The Nevada County Fairgrounds is within easy driving distance from a shopping center with a large Raley's store, a K-Mart, other chain stores, fast-food outlets, and hardware stores. Downtown Grass Valley is about a mile away and can be reached via Mill Street. The historic downtown features antique stores, a movie theater, a music store, grocery, hardware and clothing stores, and a glimpse of life in the days of the California Gold Rush.

Your Hosts

The California Bluegrass Association is a non-profit, volunteer organization which was founded in 1975 to preserve and promote Bluegrass, Old Time, and Gospel Music in California. We presently have over 2450 voting members in California and eighteen other states. Membership in the CBA includes a

parking on Saturday and Sunday yearly subscription to the monthly publication The Bluegrass Breakdown, a magazine which includes information on upcoming musical events, where to find acoustic music performances, bands and upcoming gigs, fiddler's and other organizations where you can play and hear acoustic music, recording reviews, and articles on musicians and festivals.

> Membership in the Association is \$15.00 for a single membership, and \$17.50 for a couple. There are discounts offered to members on concert tickets, and special early and advance purchase discounts and information for our yearly Bluegrass Festival. Senior Citizen members (over 65) and teen-aged members (13-18) are entitled to an additional discount on advance tickets.

Things You Need To Know The audience area for musical performances is a large, grassy lawn

area with some shade and no fixed seating. You need to bring chairs, blankets or tarps to sit on. There is no restriction on chair height for the festival - bring a chair in which you can comfortably sit, but please be considerate of your neighbors, and do not take up an excessive amount of room.

For your convenience, there is an ice concession and a variety of food and soft drink concessions on the grounds. No alcohol is sold on the grounds. Ice chests and picnic lunches are allowed in the audi-

We would like all of the members in the audience area to be comfortable, relax and enjoy the musical entertainment on the stage. There is no smoking in the audience seating area. You may smoke on the grounds and cigarette butt cans will be placed on the perimeter of the audience area for your use. Mother nature has provided a

beautiful setting and we ask that you help us leave it as clean as we found it - please pick up your litter and deposit it in the cans that are on the edges of the audience area.

Items lost or found should be taken to the Festival Headquarters, which is located near the fence which separates the audience area from the camping area. Festival Headquarters will be identified by a large banner.

Camping is in the rough - this means that we have a large fairgrounds area with trees and some grass, and a limited amount of electrical and water hookups. Plan to bring battery or gas lanterns, extra drinking water, and enjoy roughing it. If you have a handicapped condition, please make advance reservations with the Coordinator, Bill Downs at (707) 552-6934 by June 5, 1998 to reserve a camping spot that will better suit your needs. We cannot promise sites with hookups and a view of the stage, however, we will do our best to meet your basic needs.

A separate area is set aside for tent campers only to the right of Gate 4 between the McCourtney Road fence and the water ditch, except for the area between the fence and the perimeter road by the Maintenance Shop. All other camping areas are on a first-come firstserved basis. There are no reserved areas except for handicapped campers with advance reservations only.

Advance camping is available from Monday, June 15th through Wednesday, June 17, 1998 for \$15 per night, per unit. Camping from Thursday, June 18th through Sunday, June 21st is included in 3 and 4 day tickets. Campers who wish to remain on the grounds through Monday morning, June 22nd should be prepared to leave the fairgrounds by 9 a.m. Festival volunteers are required to clean the fairgrounds, remove all garbage and check out with the Fairgrounds Manager on Monday before they can go home. We ask your cooperation in insuring that this is accomplished as soon as possible. In addition, we ask that you place all garbage in the cans provided by 8:30 a.m. on Monday so that the clean-up crew can collect it and finish their week-long

Welcome to the 23rd Annual CBA Father's Day Weekend Bluegrass Festival. We hope that you will enjoy your stay at the Nevada County Fairgrounds in Grass Valley.

All festival attendees with 4day or 3-day tickets are entitled to camping privileges. Camping is on a first-come-first-served basis.

The area to the right of Gate 4 between the water ditch and up to the dirt road by the green metal fairgrounds maintenance building

is reserved for tent campers only. Please observe the signs.

All other areas of the grounds are available for RV and Tent camping. The former stage/audience area and concessions area have the most power and water outlets available. There are other water and power outlets throughout the grounds.

We ask that you share with your neighbors -- do not hook up your rig to the water faucet unless you install a "Y" so others can use it. Campers with handicapping conditions with advance reservations will be parked in designated handicapped areas. Those with out advance reservations will be parked in handicapped camping spaces on a space-available basis.

Non-campers should park in the paved parking lot and enter Gate 5 to the audience area. On Saturday, Gate 1 will be open for one-day ticket holders. Day parking is available in the lot by the fairgrounds office. Gate 1 will close at midnight on Saturday.

Workshop areas are marked on the map below, and there will be signs posted at the sites. All Children's activities will take place on or near the Bluegrass Kids Stage, as will the Sunday morning Bluegrass Chapel.



The weather can be hot during the days, and cool during the evening and nights, so dress appropriately. Sunscreen and hats or visors help keep you from burning during the heat of the day and a jacket or sweater can be very comforting during the evening performances and for jamming afterward.

Bring your acoustic instruments and join in the fun. A large part of the enjoyment of our festival is the spontaneous jam sessions which spring up throughout the fairgrounds during the festival. It is a chance to meet new people, share some music, and make new friends.

Parents are responsible for their children at all times. Please be sure you know where your children are and what they are doing. There is an organized children's program with scheduled times listed in the program, however, this is not a day care service. Parents must either remain with their child(ren) or return to pick them up at the conclusion of the program and at lunch breaks. There is a water ditch which runs through the grounds that is a drinking water source for the local community. Please make sure that your children stay out of it.

Main Stage performances will begin on Thursday, June 18th at 10:00 a.m. and continue until 11 p.m., and the same schedule applies for both Friday and Saturday. On Sunday, June 21st, the morning will begin at 8:00 a.m. with a non-denominational Chapel on the stage in the Children's Program area and the Gospel Show will begin on the main stage at 10:00 a.m. The music on Sunday will end at 7:00 p.m.

There will be workshops during the lunch and dinner breaks with topics ranging from Flat-pick guitar to Banjo set-up, Clogging, and other music-related topics. The workshops are included in your ticket price and afford you an opportunity to ask questions and talk with the professional musicians in an intimate setting. Plan to bring your instrument along or just sit back and learn new techniques and watch the experts work "up close and personal".

Volunteers

All of the festival planners and promoters are volunteers, from the Festival Coordinator to the ice and information booth staff; from the roaming security people to the mercantile personnel. Even the construction crew that sets up the main stage, the children's program workers, and the concessions coordinator are donating their vacation time to present this festival.

Since all of these folks are volunteering their time, it is especially important for festival attendees to abide by the rules which are a necessary part of such a large event. The Board of Directors and the festival personnel have thought out these rules carefully, and ask for your cooperation during your stay at the Fairgrounds.

Please read the following rules and regulations carefully, and give us your full cooperation. If everyone follows these simple guidelines, we can all enjoy our weekend together in harmony, and listen to some wonderful music!

Rules and Regulations

In order to facilitate the enjoyment of the California Bluegrass Association 22nd Annual Festival, the following rules and regulations will be in effect during the Festival.

- NO ALCOHOL or display of public drunkenness and disturbance is permitted in the audience area.
 Persons who interfere with the enjoyment of the rest of the audience will be asked to leave the area.
- NO ILLEGAL DRUG USE will be permitted on the site. Anyone caught using illegal drugs will be required to leave the fairgrounds for the balance of the festival.
- NO DUMPING TRASH ON THE GROUNDS Help maintain the cleanliness of the grounds and restrooms. Deposit all trash in available dins and recyclade containers in appropriate bins. Do not move the trash barrels. If you need an additional container in your camping area, please ask one of the grounds crew or come to Festival Headquarters and ask.
- NO LOUD RADIOS OR TAPE PLAY-ERS are permitted.
- NO AMPLIFIERS OR ELECTRIC INSTRUMENTS are allowed in the camping areas.
- BICYCLE OR SKATEBOARDS
 RIDING AND ROLLERBLADING
 OR SKATING are prohibited on
 the festival grounds from Thursday morning at 8:00 a.m. until
 Sunday after the music on stage
 stops, and at all times on the
 inner fairgrounds, except for festival volunteer workers.
- MOTORCYCLES AND GOLF CARTS - Only California Street Legal motorcycles are allowed on the fairgrounds. Use of golf carts is restricted to those authorized for the performance of CBA functions.
- NO OPEN CAMPFIRES Keep a close watch on camp stoves, barbecues, lanterns, etc. Make sure they are completely out when not in use.
- NO PETS of any species (dogs, cats, birds, etc.) are allowed on the fairgrounds during the time that the CBA has possession of the grounds (Monday, June 15 through Monday, June 22, 1998). Persons who bring pets onto the

festival site will be asked to take their animal to a kennel, or leave. No refunds will be given on advance tickets.

- NO ROPING OFF AREAS except by festival officials. Due to the large number of campers, "saving a spot" for a friend who is coming later is not allowed. If your group wants to be together, try to arrive about the same time.
- NO SMOKING in the audience seating area. Please be considerate of your fellow audience members and smoke around the perimeter or camping areas only.
- NO SOLICITING, DEMONSTRA-TIONS OR UNAUTHORIZED CONCESSIONS - for a variety of reasons, including cleanliness of the fairgrounds, avoidance of congestion, security, crowd control, and the fulfillment of the CBA's contractual commitments, no ticket holder is authorized to sell merchandise or carry on any commercial enterprise at the festival without a concessionaire's permit obtained prior to the start of the festival in accordance with the rules and procedures of the CBA. No ticket holder is authorized to distribute or post literature, leaflets, flyers, circulate petitions, picket or carry signs, or set up booths or tables in connection there with without the express written permission of the Board of Directors of the California Bluegrass Association obtained prior to the festival.
- NO USING THE WATER DITCH through the fairgrounds for wading, drinking, washing, trash dis-

- posal, or any other purpose. This ditch is a part of the fresh water system for the town of Grass Valley.
- •VIDEO RECORDING OF ART-ISTS'STAGE PERFORMANCES is PROHIBITED unless specifically allowed and is indicated by a sign displayed near the stage *indicating that video recording is permitted*. If permitted, this permission applies only to artist on stage at the time the sign is displayed. Persons who tape bands against their wishes will be asked to stop by security personnel. If they refuse, they will be asked to leave the fair-grounds.
- SERVICE ANIMALS In compliance with Chapter 9.5 (section 7200 of Division 3 of Business and Professional Codes) and the Disabilities Act of 1990 (Public Law 101-336), individuals who are visually impaired or blind, deaf or hearing impaired, individuals with a disability and persons who are licensed to train guide dogs, signal dogs, or service dogs for individuals with these disabilities may take guide dogs, signal dogs or service dogs in any of the places specified in subdivisions (a) and (b) of the act.. These persons shall ensure that the dog is on a leash and tagged as a guide dog, signal dog or service dog by identification tag issued by the country clerk, animal control department, or other agency as authorized by Chapter 3.5 (commencing with section 30850) of Title

- 14 of the Food and Agriculture Code. Nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to impose limitation of access to any person in violation of The Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 (Public Law 101-336).
- CONSERVE WATER AND ELEC-TRICITY - Campers and RVs may draw electrical power only from designated outlets. Water faucets and connections are scarce and should be shared.
- KEEP YOUR GENERATOR USE MINIMAL - if you must run a generator on your RV to charge your battery or for any other reason, please keep the time minimal.
- DO NOT REMOVE YOUR ID BAND · Your ticket entitles you to enter the fairgrounds and participate in all musical performances on the date or dates covered by the ticket. Camping fees are included in all three and four-day tickets. You will be banded when your ticket is taken at the front gate. No replacements will be made unless you purchase another ticket. All festival attendees need to be banded. Security personnel will be checking for ID bands and will ask unbanded persons to leave the fairgrounds or purchase a ticket.

The California Bluegrass Association reserves the right to deny admission to anyone, and/or to have anyone removed from the fairgrounds if necessary or desirable. at the discretion of the CBA Board of Directors.

The Nashville Bluegrass Band -- The Boys are Back!

Formed in 1984, NBB is a quintet currently consisting of Alan O'Bryant (banjo and lead vocals), Pat Enright (guitar and lead vocals), Roland White (mandolin), Stuart Duncan (fiddle) and Gene Libbea (bass). They are the most awarded bluegrass band around with four straight wins from the International Bluegrass Music Association (IBMA) as Vocal Group of the Year and two-time winner of Grammy Awards in 1994 and 1996.

Instrumentally, they are in the first rank of bluegrass bands and vocally they are without peer. O'Bryant's and Enright's soaring gospel and blues-tinged lead vocals are spine-tingling.

Stuart Duncan began his career in California touring and recording with Alison Brown, Lost Highway and Larry Sparks. He settled in Nashville in 1985, becoming a much sought-after session musician playing fiddle with Vince Gill, Mark Knopfler, Alan Jackson, Dolly Parton, John Prine, Ricky Skaggs, Nancy Grifith and many others.

Pat Enright, guitarist, began his career in San Francisco in the early

1970's by forming a local live music favorite called The Phantoms of the Opry. A stint in Boston in 1978 saw him playing with Tasty Licks, a band that include Bela Fleck. Having met Alan O'Bryant on an earlier sojourn to Nashville, Pat returned in 1979 and found the perfect home with the Nashville Bluegrass Band.

Gene Libbea began his career on the acoustic bass in 1969. Since then he has appeared with Pat Cloud, Byron Berline and Vince Gill. He formed the group Turkee in West Germany and toured Europe for three years prior to joining NBB. His music has been greatly influenced by Jim and Jesse McReynolds, the Osborne Brothers and Junior Huskey.

Alan O'Bryant is a native of North Carolina who started playing banjo in his teens. He has performed and recorded with Bill and James Monroe and Peter Rowan and has had his songs recorded by Vern Gosdin, Emmylou Harris, Dolly Parton and Linda Ronstadt. One of his compositions, "Those Memories of You," from the award-winning TRIO album achieved Top 5 positioning on the country charts.

Roland White was one of the founders of the Kentucky Colonels in 1957, one of the most influential bands in the history of bluegrass, along with his brother Clarence White (later of the Byrds). Roland was also a member of The Country Boys, the first guest band on *The*

Andy Griffith Show. They appeared in episode #19, Mayberry On Record, which first aired on February 13, 1961. He settled in Nashville in 1967 and performed in the bands of Bill Monroe, Lester Flatt and Country Gazette, and has become one of bluegrass' most influ-

ential mandolin players.

NBB have performed in as diverse places as the Grand Ole Opry, Carnegie Hall (sold-out), China, Japan, most of Europe, Israel, Brazil, as well as at every major bluegrass and folk festival, and on television.

Ralph Stanley and the Clinch Mountain Boys

When it comes to bluegrass music, few artists command the respect and attention that comes to Ralph Stanley. Having been a part of bluegrass music for 50 years, Stanley is shadowed only by Mr. Bill Monroe. Many artists own Stanley a lot for getting them into the music, including Keith Whitley, Ricky Skaggs, Charlie Sizemore, Larry Sparks and others, who got their start through Stanley.

The Stanley Brothers, Ralph and Carter created the natural Mountain Music sound which has become synonymous with bluegrass music. Taking lessons from the music pioneered by Bill Monroe, the brothers evolved the harmonies into a unique form of bluegrass. Even during their early years, they experimented and with the music to develop their own presence in the genre. The blend of Carter and Ralph matured into a style which neither could have achieved on their own - exciting musicianship and rich vocals were their trademark.

From the 1940's through 1966, the brother's perfection of their style contributed greatly to the arena of bluegrass. Carter's passing away in late 1966, was a great loss to the bluegrass family. Ralph recruited news members into the Clinch Mountain Boys to solidify the mountain bluegrass sound. Larry Sparks, Curly Ray Cline and Jack Cooke and Ralph evolved into another fresh



style and continued the tradition of the music. Even today, their unique combined artistry remains a solid member of the bluegrass foundation.

For 50 years, Ralph has been a central focus for the genre. As a master of bluegrass banjo, he has seen others use his style as the standard for the music. The sound of the Clinch Mountain Boys has, at the same time, become a standard for the overall sound of bluegrass in the traditional sense. Audiences still flock to hear them all and never tire of their cured and aged traditional sound.

The Clinch Mountain Boys are: Jack Cooke (upright bass, baritone and tenor vocals) who joined the band in mid 1969 and has been with the group for more than 25 years. He is on all the albums recorded with the band during this time, beginning with the landmark gospel album Cry From The Cross, recorded in 1971. Jack and his wife, Cornell, reside in Norton, VA.

Ralph Stanley II (rhythm guitar, lead vocals) was born Aug. 20, 1978 and started traveling with his dad at age four. He learned the Stanley style from listening to records and through first hand experience by performing on the road with the Clinch Mountain Boys when he was barely in his teens. Ralph II took over the lead singing chores in August of 1995.

James Shelton (lead guitar) joined the Clinch Mountain Boys in March of 1994. He grew up in Southwest Virginia, near the town of Gate City, and now resides with his wife, Greta, in Church Hill, TN. Since joining the band, he has toured in over 30 states as well as a trip to Europe. His hobbies, when not on the road, include leatherworking and repairing musical instruments.

Steve Sparkman (banjo) was born Feb. 4, 1972 and grew up in Waynesburg, Kentucky. Steve started picking the banjo at age 13, and learned the Stanley style by listening to his dad's Stanley Brothers records. He was chosen by Ralph Stanley to fill in on banjo after Ralph suffered a broken femur bone in June of 1994. Steve has remained with the Clinch Mountain. Boys ever since. Steve now makes his home in Nicholasville, Ky. with his wife Valentina.

James Price (fiddle, bass vocals) was born June 21, 1964 in Cleveland, Ohio and grew up in Boone County, West Virginia. James started playing fiddle at the age of 10, after his dad took him to his first bluegrass festival. He joined the Clinch Mountain. Boys in August of 1995. When not playing music, he loves the outdoors and enjoys hunting and fishing.

John Rigsby (mandolin, high baritone vocals) is 20 years old and is from Martha, Kentucky. He joined the band in August of 1995 and is also a fine fiddle player in addition to his role as mandolinist and harmony singer. Being from Eastern Kentucky, John grew up exposed to the music of Ralph Stanley and has a tremendous knowledge of the mountain style. He enjoys hunting and training dogs in his spare time, as well as trading musical instruments.

Ralph Stanley and the Clinch Mountain Boys will be performing on Thursday at 3:05 p.m. and at 9:55 p.m.; and on Friday at 4:00 p.m.

The Lonesome River Band

The Lonesome River Band brings contemporary sound to traditional Bluegrass music. Exceptional songwriting from lead singer/ bass player Ronnie Bowman, coupled with vocal and instrumental prowess characterize the group's abilities.

The past several years have endowed the band with nearly unrivaled success in the Bluegrass music industry, owing greatly to the leadership of Ronnie Bowmand and Sammy Shelor, awarded the 1995 International Bluegrass Music Association's Male Vocalist and Banjo Player of the Year respectively.

Sammy Shelor was again recognized for his outstanding talent by being named 1996 IBMA Banjo Player of the Year. The additions of mandolin player/tenor singer Don Rigsby and national flatpicking guitar champion Kenny Smith effectively complete the band's line-up.

Tight vocal harmonies and instrumental virtuosity have allowed the Lonesome River Band to produce critically acclaimed recordings rendering them a virtual benchmark in Bluegrass and Acoustic Music. The 1992 release "Carrying the Tradition" debuted at the number one position on the <u>Bluegrass Unlimited</u> album chart and was named IBMA Album of the Year. Remaining in the position for five months, the album was only challenged by its successor, "Old Country Town" which in turn occupied the position for six months.

On the heels of this phenomenal success was the release of Ronnie Bowman's solo project "Cold Virginia Night" which in comparable fashion took the number one spot. This singularly exceptional recording, ultimately named 1995 IBMA Album of the Year, featured a combined effort from members of LRB as well as guest appearance of such notable artists as Tony Rice, Del McCoury and Alison Krauss.


The release of LRB's 1996 recording, "One Step Forward", brought them even greater critical acclaim and insured their future in Bluegrass music.

Laurie Lewis and Her Bluegrass Pals

During the past two decades, Berkeley, California-based band leader/singer/songwriter/ fiddler/ guitarist/ bass player Laurie Lewis has quietly established herself as one of the best, most talented artists in traditional music.

Growing up in the San Francisco Bay area, Laurie learned to play the violin as a child. As a teer in the '60s, she was exposed to the era's best folk music at the Berkeley Folk Festivals, hearing many greats, from Doc Watson, Jean Ritchie and Mississippi John Hurt to bluegrass revival group the Greenbriar Boys. The early '70s were spent at fiddle contests, where she twice won the California State Women's Championship and as a member of various bands, including two of the area's best: the Phantoms of the Opry and the Arkansas Sheiks. Eventually, she fell under the spell of the first great innovators of bluegrass, including Flatt &. Scruggs and the Stanley Brothers. She was especially attracted to the "spookiness" of the music of bluegrass founder Bill

A founding member of the pioneering West Coast bluegrass group

the Good Ol' Persons in the mid '70s and of the Grant Street String Band in the '80s (later called Lewis and Grant Street) and a member of the bluegrass super group allwoman band Blue Rose, Laurie has been a key figure in bluegrass, traditional country, and folk music circles since the mid '70s. That circle has gradually widened until it now includes appreciative admiration from her peers in the music business and fans around the world.

She has toured and recorded with many of the true greats of bluegrass and traditional country music, including a stint as fiddle player for the highly acclaimed NCTA-sponsored Masters of the Five String Banjo tour, in which she found herself nightly singing harmony with an early idol, Ralph Stanley.

Laurie is highly regarded as a singer and twice voted International Bluegrass Music Association "Female Vocalist of the Year"; her album Love Chooses You won the 1989-1990 "Country Album of the Year" designation from the National Association of Independent Record Distributors, lyric interpreter. Her

compelling reading of Kate Long's "Who Will Watch The Home Place" led to the song being named IBMA "Song Of The Year" in 1994.

She is an award-winning fiddle player and one of the best flat out breakdown fiddlers around and has lent her instrumental talents to countless recordings by her peers. Laurie is also known as one of the finest acoustic bassists on the West Coast, occasionally taking time out from her busy schedule to nail down the rhythm on other artists' recordings.

Laurie is also highly regarded as an original songwriter-her "Love Chooses You" is everything a country ballad should be, so much so that Kathy Mattea's interpretation on her Willow in the Wind is one of the high points of that best selling album. Laurie's "Cowgirl Song" sounds as if it may have been written by Patsy Montana in the '30s.

It is as an interpreter of her own memorable songs that Laurie most often touches the uninitiated, and it is as interpreter of her own songs that she continues to leave an indelible impression on the hearts and minds of festival audiences, LAURIE LEWIS true stories

concertgoers, album buyers, and music lovers in general throughout the traditional and acoustic music world.

Appearing with Laurie Lewis this weekend are her "Bluegrass Pals": her vocal duet partner and mandolin virtuoso Tom Rozum, nationally-known bassist Todd Phillips, and two Bay Area musicians whose talents deserve national recognition, Bob Smith on the Banjo and Mary Gibbon on guitar and harmony vocals.

Lynn Morris

Two time National Banjo Champion and Traditional Female Vocalist, Lynn Morris is one of only a handful of female bandleaders in bluegrass music today. She has that intangible quality of success — a heightened sense of what it really takes to entertain an d move her audience.

It was 1988 when Lynn and her husband-to-be, songsmith and rocksolid bassist Marshall Wilborn, formed the Lynn Morris Band in Winchester, Virginia. Since then the couple has earned a well-deserved reputation for professionalism and genuine warmth on stage. Their music has always spoken for itself - straightforward and soulful with the uncommon ability to capture the essence and passion of real country music. Now their music speaks with a new voice as former bandmates Tom Adams and Audie Blaylock rejoin the group and begin to explore new territory as a team

The band's repertoire and instrumental style strongly reflect the influence of traditional bluegrass legends Jimmy Martin and Flatt & Scruggs, mountain singersongwriter Hazel Dickens, and country favorites Buck Owens and Dolly Parton. But the group's standout attraction is its own originality — the level of musical excellence they demand from themselves in each performance and their willingness to share their life experience with the fans who support them

Whether performing an austere heart song in an intimate club setting, nailing a hard driving breakdown on a festival stage, or patiently teaching young enthusiasts at a bluegrass camp, the unfailing dedication to their life's work illuminates their artistry.

Grounded in traditional soil but untethered by the past, the Lynn Morris Band offers a totally unique presentation, sparkling in its simplicity and directness. If it's true that class never goes out of style, the Lynn Morris Band should be around for a long time to come.

Lynn Morris has had a remarkably varied career. After growing up in a small West Texas farm community called Lamesa, she graduated with a degree in art from Colorado College, and was playing professionally as a-five string banjo player within the next year. She has toured military outposts in the Pacific and Indian ocean regions for USO, and has performed nationally for audiences from the Philadelphia Folk Festival to Leavenworth Federal Penitentiary to the stage of the Grand Ole Opry. Sought after as an instructor, Lynn leads seminars and teaches at music camps across the US and is currently finishing her third term representing artists and composers on the International Bluegrass Music Association's (IBMA) Board of Directors. Lynn plays guitar in the band.

Marshall Wilborn was born and raised in Austin, Texas, and has

played bass with some of bluegrass' most respected artists, including Jimmy Martin, the Johnson Mountain Boys and Crowe & McLaughlin. The genuine, slightly primitive quality of his lead singing and his highly acclaimed songwriting get their well deserved share of the spotlight on stage. Marshall's songs have been recorded by artists such as Rhonda Vincent, the Johnson Mountain

Boys, Doyle Lawson and Alison Krauss.

Tom Adams is from Gettysburg, PA. Asoulful banjo player of exquisite precision, he can be relentlessly hard driving or delicate as the finest antique lace. Twice the recipient of IBMA's Banjo Player of the Year award, Tom is featured on each of the Lynn Morris Band's three Rounder albums, and has released

his own solo album, Right Hand Man ,also on Rounder.

Audie Blalock, Tom's former bandmate with Jimmy Martin's Sunny Mountain Boys, hails from Garrett, Indiana, and has also worked with bluegrass legend Red Allen. Audie's driving mandolin style and powerful expressive tenor voice add an exciting new dimension to the band.

Dry Branch Fire Squad

In over twenty years of music making, Rounder recording artists Dry Branch Fire Squad have become an institution in American acoustic music. Inspired by a fierce and uncompromising loyalty to the most traditional aspects of bluegrass, old time and southern gospel music, Dry Branch Fire Squad is fueled by the musical vision and incomparable cultural satire of group founder and mandolinist Ron Thomason.

Unlike most bluegrass groups, the Dry Branch Fire Squad sells neither itself, its members, nor even particular bluegrass songs. What it markets are the emotions which stimulated the creation of bluegrass and mountain music and fueled the development of each as well as a taste of the culture in which these forms evolved.

A native of southwest Virginia, Ron Thomason began his professional career with Ralph Stanley's Clinch Mountain Boys, founding the Dry Branch Fire Squad in 1976. To date, the band has recorded twenty projects and performed at some of the most prestigious acoustic music venues and festivals in North America.

Most bluegrass observers agree that Dry Branch's current line-up is

its strongest ever: guitarist/ clawhammer banjo player Suzanne Thomas (formerly Suzanne Edmundson), known for her many years of work with the popular old time band the Hot Mud Family. provides a strong second musical focus with one of the most recognizable and enduring female voices in bluegrass and old time music today. Bluegrass banjo player, historian and ethnomusicologist Bill Evans is the newest addition to the group. His recent Rounder solo banjo release Native and Fine received a 1996 Honorable Mention for "Acoustic Instrumental Recording of the Year" by NAIRD, the National Association of Independent Record Retailers and Distributors.

Additional group members are Mary Jo Leet on rhythm guitar and harmony vocals and Charlie Leet on acoustic bass and bass vocals.

Dry Branch Fire Squad has performed for the National Council for the Traditional Arts, at the Smithsonian Institution and has toured internationally for the U. S. Information Agency. The band's all-gospel release "Golgotha" was chosen by the Library of Congress for its "Select List" of significant recordings of American music. In 1997, the band will tour coast to

coast, including appearances in twenty-one states and Canadian provinces and at such events as Wintergrass in Tacoma, Washington, the National Folk Festival in Dayton, Ohio and many of the largest folk and bluegrass festivals in

North America. In addition, Dry Branch Fire Squad continues to host the largest bluegrass festival event in the northeastern United States, the Winterhawk Bluegrass Festival.

Meet The Freight Hoppers, the most exciting and entertaining old-time string band to emerge in 25 years. Rounder Recording artists, The Freight Hoppers possess that rarest of all gifts, the ability to connect directly and personally with any audience. The Freight Hoppers have been performing regularly at the Great Smoky Mountains Railway since 1993, and that has honed them into an extraordinary performing unit.

The insistent dance rhythm and inherent energy of string band music combined with their engaging vocals and peerless ability to entertain make The Freight Hoppers an act that can take any stage—folk and bluegrass festivals, concerts, alternative rock clubs, arts councils, square and contra dances, schools, and more.

They play a high-energy style of old-time music consisting of fiddle, banjo, guitar, and stand-up bass. The Freight Hoppers play and sing traditional music of the Appalachian mountains. This music pre-dates bluegrass and was originally played as

music for old-time square dances, or purely for personal or social enjoyment.

Many of the songs and tunes they play come from recordings made in the 1920's or 30's by bands such as the Skillet Lickers from Georgia, Grand Old Oprystar Uncle Dave Macon from Tennessee, or singers such as the Carter Family from southern Virginia. Other material comes from mountain fiddlers that are still playing tunes passed down through the generations.

Live The Freight Hoppers deliver a non-stop program mix of fast-paced fiddle tunes, traditional songs, mountain clogging (David fiddles and dances at the same time!), and Appalachian jokes and folklore. The band and its members have won awards at the Galax Fiddler's Convention in Virginia, the Old-Time Fiddler's Convention in Mount Airy, North Carolina, the Maury River Festival in Rockbridge, Virginia, and the Appalachian String Band Festival in Clifftop, West Virginia, where the group won First Place Traditional Band in 1996.

Few ensembles in any style of music can match the energy or entertainment abilities of The Freight Hoppers. Very few bands can take their music successfully into so many different kinds of venues, winning over audience after audience. The Freight Hoppers are simply the best at what they do.

Each performance by the Patriots is a blending of their individual talents, with each member contributing equally to produce a distinctive and exciting sound: Ken Seaman's hard-driving banjo style, Glenn Zankey with his powerful high-lonesome vocals and guitar playing, Rick Bradstreet's expressive and swinging dobro as well as his tasty flat-pick guitar, Willie McDonald plays straight ahead Monroe style mandolin, and Dan Roger's solid bass beat. All the Patriots display their considerable vocal talents, as well as song crafting abilities, to make the Patriot sound - a sound which has had well over 15 years to mature and solidify.

The Bluegrass Patriots, from Fort Collins, Colorado, are recognized as one of the top traditional bands in bluegrass music. Their highly acclaimed recording project, "When You and I Were Young, Maggie," received nationwide attention in 1991, when the title cut appeared on Bluegrass Unlimited's "National Bluegrass Survey" for several months. This CD received a prestigious "Highlight" review in Bluegrass Unlimited.

The Bluegrass Patriots signed with Turquoise Records during the fall of 1992 and released their fourth recording, "The Last Waltz," in April 1993. The title cut of "The Last Waltz" first appeared on the "National Bluegrass Survey" in the summer of 1993.

One of the trademark sounds of the Patriots is their use of twin flatpicked guitar tunes. Both Glenn

Familiar flatpick tunes like 'Crossin' the Big Sandy' and 'Flop Eared Mule' are often requested, performed in two and three part harmonies, with the mandolin playing a third har-



Workshop Presentors who are not band members

Tina Louise Barr, of Modesto, CA, will offer an autoharp workshop at the CBA festival on Friday during the noon break in Area A. Tina has been offering autoharp workshops to the CBA for a number of years and now performs in a group called "Frettin' Around." Tina has placed second at the Winfield, Kansas International Autoharp Competition twice, in '93 and '96. She has also accumulated a number of trophies from regional competitions, e.g. La Grange, in the "Miscellaneous" category for her autoharp. She will be assisted by her loyal husband and promoter, Uncle Jon Gwinner, who produces a very popular folk music program on Stockton FM radio station, KUOP.

Alice Bass is a "sweet little old lady" who fairly twinkles with mischief. She has fully lived the music she presents, and she plays her mountain dulcimer with the same energy which she displays when she indulges in spontaneous dancing, in response to a lively fiddle tune. When she is not telling stories and singing songs, Godfrey is a teacher. She has performed on stage, radio, television and street corners. She has been an Artist in Residence in Oregon and California Schools, and will "tell a story to anyone who will listen". We hope you will listen and enjoy Godfrey's Storytelling sessions on Saturday and Sunday in the Children's area.

Elena Corey will offer two adult workshops and two children's workshops and she will assist other teachers at the children's stage. Elena, a music aficionado, plays a lot of music, teaches and writes a lot. Beginning Thursday afternoon, at 3:15 PM Elena will offer a musical petting zoo for very small children, offering them a chance to experience hands-on picking of a number of traditional acoustic instruments. During the supper hour, 4:50 P.M. Thursday, Elena will offer a vocal harmony workshop for adults. Elena has offered vocal instruction for a number of musical festivals. This mini-course offers vocalists opportunities to find and maintain appropriate pitches, to be able to sing assorted bluegrass, gospel and blues harmonies.

On Saturday, at noon, Elena will present a workshop for adults who are interested in chord melody playing of the guitar. This workshop responds to requests for face-to-face demonstrations of skills alluded to in one of Elena's instructional columns, featuring vertical, rather than horizontal voicings. Saturday during the dinner hour, Elena will assist participate in a traditional acoustic instrument demonstration and panel discussion, along with Ken Van DeKieft and Howard Polley.

Gene DeBarreul and Barbara Carmichael will demonstrate a number of song and dance funfilled things for children to do on .Friday at noon. Barbara and Gene bring a great reservoir of creativity and dedication to their workshops. Children sense this and get involved immediately. Gene and Barbara now live in Yreka, CA, and appreciate the slower pace of life they are finding there.

Annie and Barry Ernst, of Novato, CA will perform their collection of songs especially written for children on both Saturday and Sunday mornings at 11. Their show reflects the originality and creativity shown on their CD for kids, which Barry takes into schools and uses to educate and entertain

kids, all year long. Their lovely daughters will also assist the Ernsts in these performances.

Monte Hendricks, of Hendricks Banjo Works, will discuss assorted aspects of the banjo at his booth also on Thursday at noon. Monte and his brother Alan are familiar to and beloved by CBA folks, as their long-time participation in musical projects and ventures has endeared them to music lovers who have come to know them.

Evelyn Horner and her able assistants will teach beginning fiddle to people of any age on Friday at 6:30 PM and on Saturday at 10AM. Over the years, Evelyn has helped many aspiring beginners. She helps in the development of intonation as well as technique, whether the learner wants to apply the teaching to ambitious projects or simple relaxation playing. She has helped many young children learn to "play a song"-so that they can qualify to enter Kids on Bluegrass, Frank Solivan's teaching project for kids wanting to perform on a real stage in a band.

Michael Lewis will be conducting a luthier's workshop on setting up instruments on Thursday noon, at his booth. Mr. Lewis has created and repaired many musical instruments for CBA people. At many area festivals, Mr.

Lewis has offered on site repair of performers' instruments, gratis. His ideas in instrument design have attracted nation-wide recognition and appreciation, and his advice about repairs and set-up are sought by many serious musicians.

Vince Combs and the Shadetree Bluegrass Boys

Making their first appearance on the CBA's Festival stage is a traditional, hard-core Bluegrass band from Kentucky, Vince Combs and the Shadetree Bluegrass Boys.

Vince Combs is from Hindman, Kentucky. His band consists of five talented musicians who play and sing the old and traditional harddriving bluegrass. The band shows an unwavering love for bluegrass music and an insistence on excellence in all of their performances.

They take the bus on the road and have logged thousands of miles across country. They always want to leave the people with a good impression of what bluegrass is about. Their reward is seeing a smile on the faces of their fans and hands clapping for more.

Vince Combs plays mandolin, sings lead and has one of the most powerful high tenor voices in bluegrass. He worked and recorded with the legendary Hylo Brown in Nashville, Tennessee before he formed his own band.

Carlos Brock is from Hyden,

Kentucky. He plays guitar and sings lead. He was one of Bill Monroe's Blue Grass Boys and also one of the Country Partners on RCA Victor Records. Carlos worked for a time with Red Allen, Noah Crase, and Frank Wakefield.

Art Stamper is from Hindman, Kentucky. He is one of the best old time fiddlers in the country. Art played with Ralph Stanley for several years and has also played with Bill Monroe, Larry Sparks and Bill Grant and Delia Bell.

Red Spurlock is a multi-talented musician, playing banjo, dobro and bass. He started playing music at an early age in Austin, Indiana. He played for several years in the Dayton area with Red Allen and other local bands.

Noah Crase plays a hard-driving banjo and is also a Kentuckian. He was one of the original members of The Boys From Indiana, played with Red Allen and also for the Father of Bluegrass, Bill Monroe.

Bob Flesher and the New Old-Time Band

Bob Flesher and the New Old-Time Band is a popular band, playing the old-time traditional music of the Appalachian Mountains on the east coast festival scene. They bring a touch of class and respect to the music that gave birth to our bluegrass music.

With Bob Flesher on the clawhammer banjo, Toby Denham on the fiddle, and John Grim on the guitar and fiddle, they articulate the old tunes with a drive and bounce that old-time music is known for. The have successfully competed at the renowned Galax Fiddlers convention against the best in the old-time music field, and played over 20 shows during the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia.

Bob Flesher is known world-wide for his fresh approach to the old clawhammer style banjo. Unlike the three-finger style of bluegrass, the old clawhammer frailing style, which goes back to the 1830's, can have a vast array of sound and interpretation. Bob has been playing for over 40 years, and has developed a distinctively bright sound in which every note can be distinguished as might be heard on the bluegrass banjo.

This drive and sparkle has resulted in his winning many contests along the way. Some of these include being an unprecedented 8-time winner of the oldest and largest convention of its type, the Galax Fiddlers Convention in Galax, Virginia. He also won first place in the 1993 Appalachian String Band Mu-

sic Festival in Clifftop, West Virginia, and was the 1990 National Champion at Uncle Dave Macon Days in Murfreesbobo, Jennessee.

In addition, Bob is foremost among banjo players today in playing the old "stroke" style used by the minstrels before and during the Civil War. This style contains the clawhammer style as well as fancy arpeggios and unusual rhythm. Bob has incorporated many of these fancy techniques into his modern clawhammer style, enabling him to perform licks not seen in over a hundred years. A highlight of ever show is when he uses an original 1850's banjo to create the authentic sound you would have heard before the Civil War.

Toby Denham is foremost among old-time fiddlers for his ability to recreate the old George fiddle style used by the Georgia string bands of the 1920's and 30's such as Gid Tanner and the Skillet Lickers and the Georgia Crackers. Toby has been playing fiddle for over twenty years and is among the top fiddlers every year at the Galax Fiddlers Convention, competing against over 200 fiddlers. He has also spent much time and research to recreate the authentic fiddle style of the fiddlers on the Minstrel show before the Civil War, whose style was copied by fiddlers across the country in the 1880's. Toby is famous for building and playing his authentic cigar box fiddles, made of real cigar boxes, and is also very accomplished on the clawhammer

John Grim has been playing professionally for over twenty years in every type of music from rock to country western, but is most comfortable with the old-time music he learned in the hills of North Carolina. John plays guitar, fiddle and

clawhammer banjo and will play a second fiddle to Toby on a few pieces. John runs a store called Vintage Instruments in north Georgia and deals in vintage string instruments such as banjos, fiddles and guitars. Bob Flesher will be presenting a workshop on the History of the Banjo on Thursday at 12 noon in Area B. The band will be performing this weekend on Thursday at 6:15 p.m. and on Friday at 9:30 a.m.

The Foothillbillys

The Foothillbillys are a traditional/eclectic old-time string band from of all places, Fiddletown, California. Their up-tempo and diverse performances have earned them a strong and growing reputation for being the "Good-time band of choice" for events and festivals throughout California and Nevada.

The Foothillbillys are Greg Osborn, banjo; Maggie Jean Osborn, bass and washboard; Lowell Daniels, rhythm guitar; Dave Rainwater, fiddle and mandolin; and Julia Guerra on slide guitar, mandolin and slide mandolin. Each player lends their vocal talents throughout.

Greg Osborn is a twenty year veteran of the clawhammer style banjo which is a signature sound of old time music. Along with Maggie Jean and Lowell, Greg was a founding member of both the Fiddletown Old Time String Band, and the popular Poison Oakies.

Maggie Jean Osborn started out with the band on washboard, but soon proved herself invaluable as a solid stand-up bass player.

Lowell Daniels is the rhythm guitarist, songwriter and a primary vocalist for the band with influences that run from Jimmie Rodgers to the Beatles. Lowell's innovative rhythms and warm vocals are becoming trademarks of the Foothillbilly sound.

Dave Rainwater is a widely recognized fiddler, and a first place winner in the old-time fiddle contest at the prestigious Galax Fiddler's Convention in 1993. He was a founding member of the nationally known old time band, The Piney Creek Weasels, and also toured internationally with Horse Sense before joining up full time with The Foothillbillys. Dave sings lead and harmony vocals and is also a luthier, building mandolins and fiddles at his home in Mountain Ranch where he lives with his wife Adrianne and their three horses.

Rounding out the distinctive Foothillbilly sound is Julia Guerra on slide guitar, mandolin and slide mandolin. Originally from Equador, Julia has the distinction of forming that country's first rhythm and blues band, Los Insectos, in 1966, performing on television and radio. Julio moved to the Sonora area in California and co-founded the highly successful string band Fiddlestix in 1975. He has acted with the Columbia Actors Repertory, and was in several bands in-

cluding Blue Shoes and Hide The Whiskey before joining the Foothillbillys in early 1997.

The Grasshoppers

A band featuring some of the top Bluegrass vocalists and instrumentalists in the Northwest. The Grasshoppers, a Nampa, Idahobased band, will be making their first appearance on the CBA's Festival stage this year. They were the winners of the CBA sponsored Band Contest at the 1997 Late Summer Bluegrass Festival in Plymouth, California.

Members of The Grasshoppers have played together for twenty years, with the exception of Honi Glenn, who has played with the band for five years. Band members are: Jeremy Garrett, fiddle and vocals; Randy Glenn, banjo, lead guitar and vocals; Glen Garrett, rhythm

guitar and vocals; and Honi Glenn, upright acoustic bass and vocals. This is a real "family" band, since Glen is Jeremy's father; Randy and Honi are married.

The band's recently released CD, All Dressed Up And Someplace To Go, is reviewed in this issue of the *Bluegrass Breakdown*. The project was recorded and produced at Scott Vestal's studio, Acoustic Image. It contains many original songs and a few traditional favorites. Each member of The Grasshoppers is dedicated to supporting Bluegrass music and working with others who share the same common interest.

New Vintage

Pinecastle Recording Artists, New Vintage of Raleigh, North Carolina perform exciting traditional and original bluegrass music. A New Vintage performance weaves the classic sounds of bluegrass music's pioneers with compelling contemporary and original material. In the last ten years, New Vintage has garnered an impressive list of accomplishments including two international band championships, four critically acclaimed recordings, featured performances at festivals and concerts throughout the U.S. and Canada, a performance at the 1995 International Bluegrass Music Association's Fan Fest, five top 30 songs, and two top 10 albums. These achievements combined with their lively personal appearances have launched New Vintage into national prominence.

New Vintage has performed throughout much of the United States and Canada. Together since 1989, the band was formed by Russell Johnson and Earl Lewellyn. Mandolinist, Russell Johnson, has been described as "one of the most promising songwriters and singers on the scene." His soaring lead and tenor vocals are trademark sounds of New Vintage. Earl Lewellyn, a multi- instrumentalist who sings lead and harmony, adds his rock-solid rhythm and lead guitar.

Russell Johnson, from Four Oaks, N.C., is the front man for New Vintage. A co-founder of the band, Russell plays mandolin and sings lead and tenor vocals. He has been described as "among the most promising of the bluegrassers who will take the music of Bill Monroe into the next century". His soaring tenor and inspired songwriting are trademark sounds of New Vintage. Russell's original songs regularly land in the Bluegrass Top 30 chart.

Earl Lewellyn, a multi-instrumentalist from Walnut Cove, N.C., is the New Vintage guitarist. His solid rhythm and exciting lead guitar compliments his soulful lead and harmony vocals. A founding member of New Vintage, Earl adds his creative flair to arrangements for the band. Jody King is a champion banjo player from' Winston-Salem, N.C. He is also an accomplished guitar player as well and adds harmony vocals to some of the trios. His unique and smooth banjo style anchors the New Vintage sound. He has become a recognized talent in the industry and can be heard on several other artists projects, including the 1995 IBMA Album of the Year "Cold Virginia Night" by Ronnie Bowman.

Kim Gardner, an accomplished dobro player from Franklinton, N.C., is a seasoned veteran in the music industry. Kim has been playing and recording regularly since he was fourteen. He adds lead and harmony vocals and has recorded with notables such as The Lonesome River Band, The Country Gentlemen, and Doyle Lawson and Quicksilver. Kim, James, and Jody all played in 1995 SPBGMA National Champion Band, After 5.

James Doncsecz of Pilot Mountain is the bass man for New Vintage. James brings years of experience to the band from playing with several different country and gospel acts in the Winston-Salem area. James' solid timing and tasteful runs add the finishing touches to pull together the New Vintage sound.

The workshop, to be presented on Friday afternoon at 4:15 will offer small children a chance to make cardboard replicas of bluegrass band instruments, and to "play" along with Orfita and her helpers.

Howard Polley: is a retired teacher who loves music and plays harmonica as easily as he talks. He lives in Susanville, CA, and has written at least one article for the CBA newsletter about playing harmonica. Mr. Polley will demonstrate the folk harmonica on the children's stage on Friday morning at 11, and he will participate in a panel-discussion/demonstration of folk instruments with Ken Van De Kieft and Elena Corey on Saturday at 6 PM..

The Sacramento Luthiers' Guild will present a group offering on Friday at noon at Mike Lewis' booth. This organization, which consists of about 50 instrument makers, last year offered a number of educational and entertaining tips regarding musical instruments, both to adults and to children. In combining the efforts and showcasing the products of all these luthiers together, the contrast and compari-

son of their individual styles becomes more apparent.

Ken Van DeKieft: is a Modesto, CA resident who plays many varieties of folk and traditional music on just about any instrument you can name. He is involved in several exciting performance groups, and also is in much demand as a harmony back-up singer. He brings a rich background of knowledge about the origins of traditional instruments to his demonstration of their capabilities. He will be chairing a panel discussion about traditional instruments, Saturday at the children's stage, at 6 PM. He will demonstrate the hammered dulcimer and the mountain dulcimer especially.

Joe Weed will be offering a short workshop covering fundamentals and old pros' tricks to help your recording of bluegrass and other acoustic instruments.

Whether you're an old hand at recording acoustic instruments, or just starting to record your band, Joe will have tips and suggestions to help you avoid common pitfalls and employ creative techniques to get great sounds.

Joe has produced many acoustic albums, ranging from traditional bluegrass to his own award-winning "Waltz of the Whippoorwill" to Martin Simpson's "A Closer Walk with Thee," picked by Guitar Player magazine as one of the year's 10 best albums. Joe's soundtracks grace the Lincoln Museum, shows on National Public Television, and NPR

The Long and Pardue Band

Johnny Brock sings several parts and holds down the bass duties and is the rock on which the band builds their dynamic sound.

As the old saying goes "a chain is no stronger than it's weakest link". All the links of the L & P chain are strong, solid, and sure to make a lasting impression on an audience.

In a Bluegrass Unlimited review of their CD, "Shaving a Dead Man", Robert C. Buckingham wrote: "This is a young band with lots of enthusiasm and a box car full of talent. If they stay on this track, they could be big time contenders. The most important thing going for these guys is that they sound like they are having fun and really enjoy what they are doing."

Lost Highway

Lost Highway, the legendary Southern California-based bluegrass band has reunited after an absence of 15 years — and they sound better than ever! There are a few new faces, but the sound is the same solid, driving, hard-core traditional bluegrass. This band has a rhythmic groove, great instrumental soloists, and a smooth trio sound that rivals any band of the past or present.

Many fans will remember Lost Highway from its Southeastern and Midwestern festival appearances in the early 1980's. The band, then as now, is built around the smooth lead singing and rhythm guitar of Ken Orrick. His mellow, soulful voice and his fine original songs, written in the best traditional style, define the Lost Highway sound. He is a stylist in the tradition of his musical mentors; Larry Sparks, Melvin Goins and Dr. Ralph Stanley, and the admiration is mutual. Ken has performed at their festivals and opened shows for them. Ken is also a top-notch banjo picker and hails from Smithville, Tennessee.

Jeff Harvey was born in Lynwood, California and took up the mandolin around the age of nineteen. About this time, he toured with Lost Highway and recorded an album with them, which is available once more. Taking over the family business has kept him out of the bluegrass limelight for many years, but his amazing original style on the mandolin is about to attract world-wide attention. His technical facility and inventiveness are on

par with any of the top names in the business. With his great vocal range, he sings the tenor part in the trios, as well as some of the lead vocals.

Dick Brown is the group's banjo player and baritone singer. He has played and recorded with notables such as Lynn Morris, Traditional Bluegrass and Pacific Crest. Born in Artesia, New Mexico, he took up the banjo at the age of fourteen and is also proficient on guitar and bass. Much of the drive of Lost Highway's sound comes from Dick's banjo playing. He gets a huge sound and his timing is right on the money. His back-up is tasteful and appropriate. He sings a solid baritone in the trios and some lead vocals.

Fiddler Paul Shelasky took up the instrument at the age of twenty. Although he was the son of a concert violinist, Paul plays by ear and his favorite fiddlers are Benny Martin and Scotty Stoneman. Paul has recorded on over twenty-five albums and has played and toured with the Good "Ol Persons, Frank Wakefield, Tony Rice and David Grisman. He has toured the U.S., Canada, the British Isles, Europe, Japan and Taiwan. Paul plays all the bluegrass instruments and hails from Vallejo, California.

Marshall Andrews, a native of Pasadena, California, is the bass player and bass singer in the group. He learned to play the guitar and mandolin in his youth, but then took a break from music for many years. Anyone who hears his accomplished bass playing would not



The newest member of New Tradition is Aaron McDavis. Aaron came to the group in the fall of 1997 and plays traditional Scruggs-style banjo and is one of the harmony singers responsible for New Tradition's tight vocal arrangements, particularly on their wellloved a cappella performances.

Together they can bring an audience to its feet and keep them there for song after song... their energetic show is positive, familyoriented and exciting!
