Advance tickets will be on sale through May 31, 2004 for the CBA's 29th Annual Father's Day Bluegrass Festival to be held June 17-20, 2004. The festival is held under the beautiful pine trees on the Nevada County Fairgrounds in Grass Valley, California.

Make plans now to bring your family, instruments and camping gear for four-days of music, jamming and fellowship with the California Bluegrass Association. The campgrounds afford lots of room for RVs and a special tent camping area allows tenters to have a more rustic camping experience. Threre are a limited number of electrical and water hookups available on the grounds on a first-come, first served basis. There are two RV dump stations on the fairgrounds for your use, and two permanent restrooms with showers. The water isn't always hot, but the weather usually is.

Campers with handicapping conditions can make reservations for camp sites by contacting Steve House at 707-573-3983 or email bluegrass@pacbell.net. Please contact Steve before May to assure you have a reservation.

# **Bluegrass Folks -- Janice Haas** and Rosanna Young

Here is a mother/daughter team who share one of the most important jobs in the CBA. This is the job of volunteer coordinators. Without volunteers the CBA could not operate. It would not and could not produce the bluegrass festivals that have become so popular. There are many volunteers and there are many jobs to be coordinated to make everything work. That job is what these ladies do.

They not only have to get each job filled, but also make sure they are filled with the right people. Capability and job interest are important. Then there's the timing of it all. Some of these jobs have people relieving others and that all has to coordinate.

Most of the volunteer jobs begin the first day of the festival. That's not true of this one. Months ahead of time Rosanna and Janice are rounding up volunteers as needed by advertising in this publication and communicating by mail. This mother and daughter team are the ones who make this all happen.

These two ladies didn't just happen to stumble onto this music, either, so I'll start at the beginning. Back when country music was the real thing and bluegrass was a part of it, Rosanna had a natural love for it and grew up listening to it. Right after WWII she met and married Dave Young, a war veteran who had just come back from the front lines of the war in Germany. A German bullet had nearly taken off his left hand. For years he had sung and played a guitar. This seemed to have ended that, but he was determined to not let it stop him. He loved playing the guitar, but now it had

become next to impossible. He solved that problem by buying a tenor guitar with a narrower neck and only four strings. It was still difficult, but he was determined to get back to playing music. He had to learn all over, by fretting the strings in an unconventional way. Now, with the crippled hand, he improvised and made everything work. In this way he was able to get back to where he had been with his

It wasn't long before he and Rosanna had their own country/ gospel band. They had lived in the San Francisco bay area. As Dave had grown up in Colfax, California, they moved there at about this time. Two sons were born as was their daughter, Janice and they grew up there also. When in high school, Janice began singing in the band along with her parents. They now sang three-part harmony. They were known as the Young Family Band.

Some of the readers may remember Tommy Collins from Bakersfield who had some songs on the charts (including "Ya Gotta Have a License") back in the fifties.

He went to a seminary and became a minister. He and his wife, Wanda moved to Colfax in the sixties and set up a church. They all became friends and worked together with the music and the ministry. They did considerable traveling with it, too, back in those days.

Then when Janice grew a little older she became more interested in all this and began playing her own accompaniment on the guitar. She now needed one of her own, so Rosanna solved that problem. She said to herself, "people make guitars. I'm a people." It just so happened that she had a friend, Lou Lillis, a CBA member who had a shop in Colfax where he made musical instruments. With his permission and some of his help, she went to work in there and made her one for her. Janice still has that guitar, cherishes it and plays it well. It is a beautiful instrument with a good sound and is of professional workmanship.

Janice sings and plays a lot of bluegrass. Oh, yes, several years ago she grew up, got married and moved to Texas. She and her husband had


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

Their "Rump Roosts" are sturdy, one-legged stools that are ideal for resting your "rump" during long jam sessions, especially at festivals. With this stool, your back and legs won't get as tired and you can pick longer!

The wooden roosts come in several finishes including Clear, Driftwood Gray, Glossy Hot-Rod Black, Lime Green and Sky Blue, and have a variety of seat covers available. Optional features include a drink holder and bottle opener. The Rump Roost starts at \$20 for the basic model, with additional cost for the various seat covers and options.

# Update on the Bilyeu Family's tragic fire and injuries

Editor's note: In the February issue of Bluegrass Breakdown, we published a report of a tragic house fire which injured the children of Frank Solivan's neice, Cheryl Bilyeu. This is an update on the family and the injuries the children suffered.

I spoke with Cheryl Bilyeu, Sadie's and Riley's mom, today for the first time and was able to get an update and some corrections. Both children were burned in an explosion and fire at their home on Dec. 31, 2003. Originally, I was told it was a water heater that blew up, but in fact it was a propane leak into the house that caused the explosion and blew out two walls of the house. Sadie and Riley were in one of those rooms. An hour prior to the explosion, a propane company came to the house to refill the propane tank. Investigators found that a valve leading into the house was left open. It is still under investigation. Just before the explosion, Shari Eggert, roommate of the family who was home with the children, noticed something and went to check on Riley and Sadie. Just as she approached the door the explosion occurred. She was injured with flying debris.

Sadie, age 9, was burned the worst. She was released from the hospital on Friday, Feb. 27, 2004 as an outpatient. While in the hospital, Sadie had three skin graft operations on her legs, arms and hands. Her face was also burned, but fortunately did not need grafting. However, she does have to wear a plastic facemask 24 hours a day. She also has to wear a "full body pressure garment". Both will be worn for a full year. At that time, the doctors will be able to determine what further treatment will be necessary. Sadie had a fourth operation on her throat. She had not been able to speak due to some damage from the throat tube that she had to use for the first several weeks.

Sadie is now able to walk very slowly without a walker; however, she does wear a specialized brace or boot. She also has very little feeling in that foot. She receives physical therapy for her hands and arms three times a week at the hospital and daily at home with her mom. Cheryl, Sadie's mom, is currently trying to find a physical therapist to come to the home to work with Sadie. Her hands are still trying to curl up. Sadie's bandages have to be changed 3 to 4 times a day.

A very curious note here — I spoke with Frank Solivan today just after he had visited with the family. He told me about a sore on Sadie's arm that has been very slow to heal. It now has a scab on it and Frank says it is in the perfect shape of a treble clef sign. Strong music

in this family!!

Riley, age 10, is doing remarkably well. His injuries were very similar to Sadie's but much less severe. He also is still being treated as an outpatient. And Riley was truly the HERO. Cheryl said that the explosion blew out two walls of the house and Sadie and Riley were in one of those rooms. The explosion threw the kids across the room. Sadie was very stunned and Riley was able to pick Sadie up, put her on the bed to check her and then he led her through the two burning rooms to the outside. There he took Sadie to a water puddle where they both sat down in the water and waited for help. In February, the City of Chowchilla gave Riley a "Hero's Award". The Fresno Fire department, Police Department, P.G.E. and a number of other Fresno organizations voted for Riley to receive the "American Red Cross Real Hero's Award" which will be given to Riley at an award banquet ceremony in Fresno on March 31,

Cheryl says the that kids still suffer from nightmares and are sometimes very nervous but for the most part are doing well. She says Riley was just beside himself when Sadie came. As were the rest of the family.

As for Cheryl, she has spent every day at the hospital with little Sadie. So of course this means no income. She has filed for disability, but that has not started yet. However, Savemart, in Chowchilla, her employer, is holding her job for her. They are currently living with Cheryl's sister and family. This week, she is starting to look for a new place to live. They also need to replace all of their furniture. No doubt there are many other things that will need to be replaced too. She has a big job ahead of her.

Cheryl asked me to please let everyone know how much she and her family appreciates all the help they have received and how much they love the cards. She says it all really helps them to know there are so many people out there who care

so much.

Needless to say, this family is still in desperate need of help. Please don't forget them. Let's show Frank and his family how much we care. And a HUGE thank you to all who have given already.

So, we now have her back to her original habitat where her roots are. Continued from A-6 tion. Gill has won more CMA awards than any other artist and just received his eighth Grammy for Best Country Vocal Performance - Male bringing his Grammy total to sixteen. Loveless is a multi-Grammy nominated artist, past CMA and ACM Female Vocalist of the Year and current ACM Female Vocalist nominee. The Del McCoury Band is an eight-time IBMA (International Bluegrass Music Association) Entertainer of the Year. Newly signed to Arista Records, Rebecca Lynn Howard was nominated for the ACM's 2003 Top Female Vocalist and Song of the Year

for her hit single, "Forgive." All of the artists appeared on this year's Grammy award winning album "Livin' Lovin' Losin' - Songs of the Louvin Brothers."

The Grand Ole Opry has taken its unique form of American entertainment on the road many times in the past with tours featuring everyone from Roy Acuff and Minnie Pearl to Garth Brooks and Ricky Skaggs. Traveling tent shows were the first means of taking the Opry on tour in the 1930s. Then, during World War II, Opry stars toured American military bases in the U.S. and Central America build-

ing wartime morale. Ernest Tubb took a group of Opry stars to New York's Carnegie Hall in 1947, and another Opry troupe played Constitution Hall in Washington, D.C. that same year.

The Opry's first overseas tour in 1949 took Acuff, Little Jimmy Dickens, Hank Williams, and others to U.S. military bases in England, Germany, and the Azores. The Opry traveled to Houston, Texas in 1990 for a special performance for President George Bush and the heads of state attending the Economic Summit of Industrialized Nations, then hit the road for a ten-city tour the

following year.





Nashville, TN — Grand Ole Opry star Ralph Stanley has been named the 2004 Virginian of the Year by the Virginia Press Association. He accepted his award Friday, March 19, at a banquet during the organization's annual meeting in Roanoke.

This honor places Stanley, a native and resident of Dickenson County, in the ranks of such former winners as television personalities Willard Scott and Spencer Christian, newsman Roger Mudd, musicians Bruce Hornsby, writer David Baldacci, the late June Carter Cash and the late publisher of the Washington Post, Katherine Graham.



"Nothing makes me prouder than praise from other Virginians," Stanley says. "I think that my growing up in the mountains of Virginia made my music what it is today. This is a great honor."

A multiple Grammy-award winner with more than 170 albums to his credit, Stanley holds an honorary doctorate from Lincoln University. He was a featured performer on the O Brother, Where Art Thou? soundtrack album, which has so far sold more than six million copies. Stanley headlined the wildly successful Down From The Mountain Tour of 2002, a production that brought an evening of traditional rural acoustic music to concert halls across America and into Canada.

Stanley will soon be taking the stage for the Great High Mountain Tour, which spotlights music from both the O Brother, Where Art Thou? and Cold Mountain movies. ### Music-related products News New Kenny Smith guitar instruction video now available from AcuTab

"Kenny Smith: Tunes & Techniques," an instructional video, has recently been released by AcuTab. Three hours of wisdom and experience from one of bluegrass guitar's most celebrated practitioners — plus 7 great flatpicking tunes — in this 2-DVD set from AcuTab Video. Serious students at any skill level will find much to challenge and inspire them in this presentation. All the tunes and techniques are demonstrated in detail, and in a split screen format, played both fast and slow. A booklet with tab and standard notation is also included.

Disk 1 starts with Kenny's discussion of his learning experiences and early professional years. More than just a personal bio, he shares the many insights he picked up at each level along the way, plus some detailed tips on restringing, tuning and guitar set up, as valuable as the primary topic being discussed -

and this is true throughout the two DVDs.

That is followed by 45 minutes on bluegrass rhythm guitar - perhaps the most crucial component of the style. Kenny covers basic right hand patterns, a number of effective G-runs and his tips on playing rhythm dynamically in a band setting, and behind a vocalist. Many pickers will find this to be the most valuable section of the entire presentation. It concludes with a demonstration featuring his wife, and bandmate, Amanda Smith

Disk 2 contains 7 tunes for which Kenny has been known over the years: Song For Emily, Studebaker, Me And My Farmall, Amanda's Reel, Bill Cheatham, Angelina Baker and Soldier's Joy. A couple are quite challenging while others will be within the grasp of intermediate players. Each tune is first performed by Kenny, and then broken down into sections. Careful attention is given to difficult techniques and phrases, and different camera shots and angles are employed to ensure that the points are clear. Then, each song is displayed in a split screen format, played both fast and slow.

### Kentucky High School offering class for prospective luthiers

Wayne Craft is a math teacher at Pulaski County High School in Somerset Kentucky, and an adjunct mathematics professor at Somerset Community College. Because of low test scores and lack of interest in higher

level math classes, they have decided to implement a new program to address these issues at **PCHS** 

The innovative program, called "Acoustic Alchemy", launches the PCHS Principles of Luthiery course. In this course students will design and build musical instruments common to Appalachia, such as banjos, fiddles, guitars, dulcimers and mandolins. Registration priority is given to upperclassmen who have taken or are taking higher level math classes at PCHS. There is tremendous interest thus far in the program. The first class will be offered during the 2004-2005 school year.

The PCHS Acoustic Alchemy project is designed to be student centered and handson. The school has committed two teachers to this project, Mr. Craft and Mr. Greg Barron, an agriculture teacher. Although their salaries are covered by the schools, additional funds are being sought to cover building materials, educational supplements and some specialized tools.



Poor Man's Whiskey is the hottest bluegrass band to emerge from Sonoma County. Young, talented, and engaging, this sextet has a knack for creating a hoedown wherever they go. # Jimmy Chicken Pants to appear at the Parkfield Festival


Two special old time music shows will be featured Friday and Saturday nights at the Parkfield Bluegrass Festival this year. In addition to





# **MUSIC MATTERS** — What Does It Take to Find Success?

What is the most important ingredient forecasting success in the music business? Is it talent, drive, good timing, business sense or other quality? Must you have all? If you're long on one, but short on another, can you still make it? Can any other elements substitute or compensate for lack of these?

A person who was sympathetic to beginning writers once asked an acerbic writing coach if he thought many would-be writers were turned away because of unduly harsh or abrasive manners of writing coaches. The answer came quickly and emphatically, "Not nearly enough."

The idea that people who are perceived to have lesser amounts of talent or aptitude for a thing should be weeded out at early stages is not new, but it is still disturbing in areas where the field in question is seen as beneficial (perhaps even essential) to everyone, regardless of their degree of talent. Music teachers are understandably reluctant to discourage someone who doesn't seem to have a flair for music, especially if that person is strongly motivated. Music can still provide the person a great deal of joy and ease a difficult path through life.

But talent in other people may not be initially obvious. We have heard of experts' initial perceptions that proved to be wrong—e.g. A young music student cried and put his hands over his ears when music was played around him. His parents were discouraged from 'wasting their money' on music lessons on him, yet within two short years after that he had composed several works that were judged by posterity to be great. That was Mozart.

So music teachers are reluctant to let private perceptions of another person's aptitude influence the options open to a student. We secretly hope to be proven wrong when one of our darlings does not at first seem capable of developing musically. He or she might prove to be another Mozart.

Yet, at the same time, we contrarily subscribe to an assumption about how much effort is necessary in order for good results to follow. Leopold Ayer, professor of classical violin at the university level was once asked how many hours per day a student should practice. He said, "Three if they are good; 4 is they are a bit stupid, and if they need more than 4, they should try another profession."

We do not like to see people flailing away, unsuccessfully when there is little chance that they can master an instrument. A certain three year old developed a strong opinion that he would learn to play the upright bass, despite the fact that he could not hold the bass up, could not press down on any string hard enough to get a good tone and could not reach the full range of tones on the fingerboard. When his parents asked him to work up to the bass gradually, as he got taller,

he threw a tantrum. Still, they took the bass away. So instead, he started holding his father's cello upright, as if it were a bass, and grew to love to play the cello. This apocryphal tale is about YoYo Ma, who credits his parents with wisdom, saying that if they had let him continue to try to play a bass when he wasn't big enough to manage it, he might have grown to hate playing musicaltogether. But, we note, not all instruments were removed from his reach—he had the cello available for his drive to express himself musically.

Vocational economists have accused music instructors (at the college level) of wearing blinders or at least being remarkably shortsighted regarding their students' futures. These critics accuse enthusiastic music teachers of ignoring the reality that there are only a few slots open in civic orchestras, symphonies, operatic companies, jazz combos and other performing groups at any one time. Yet each graduating class of music majors can consist of 300% to 400% more new qualified musicians than there are existing jobs to support them. The vocational critics say that teachers should at least make fledgling musicians aware of the lopsided job-market situation, so that upcoming musicians can seek and acquire additional, even possibly unrelated, skills for making a living. Even such things as health insurance and pension plans are not the standard for folks who make their living playing music.

Artists who hope to get a contract with a major recording company are quickly daunted when they finally actually comprehend how microscopic are their chances. When an artist finally glimpses the notion that business people, who may not have as much savvy in their whole company as the artist does in one little finger, can make or break his career, it is more than merely discouraging.

Because the desire to make one's living doing things we love to do is so strong, we may, in fact, inhibit our perceptions to the extent that even if concerned loved ones warn us of difficult odds, we shut out such base, unbelieving words, and continue our quest for our individualized ideal life. Who can fault that? It is the character stuff of which heroism and nobility of action are made. We seek to instill such virtues as being true to inner leadings in children and we admire folks who do not abandon their dreams because of influences of external pressure.

How important is talent? The jury doesn't have to stay out very long to determine whether or not all people start with equal musical talent. Talent will out. A person's natural predilections rise to the

top predictably.

We all can cite individuals whose vast quantities of talent left the world speechless. Sadly, some of the most gifted musicians we can name have also been the most likely to sabotage themelves, reducing the power of their talent. Personal ghosts can haunt us all—even people who appear to have the most fertile imaginations and huge amounts of creativity. Depression, addictions or lack of discipline all may undo the initial edge that talent lends.

If such a view is daunting even to people who are perceived as extremely gifted, we can see that it applies, also to other folks. Prodigious talent can grease the path to the top for a musician, but a certain amount of drive and stamina have to be in the equation also. Being in the right place at the right time never hurts, either.

It is sometimes supposed that pure talent may not even be the primary factor leading to success. All of us can cite examples of successful people whose primary asset is their great desire to succeed. Internal drive may fuel a person through numerous setbacks and keep him focused on the goal as no other quality will do. People who make the decision to keep going, even if it is a struggle every step of the way, develop strong work habits and self discipline, which are surer harbingers of success.

It is not wrong to encourage someone who at first appears to have little natural ability. On the contrary, we reek of hubris when we think that a person outside our 'shared-perception' level of experience will not be able to comprehend the gestalt necessary for achieving success. Numerous factors, in various combinations, come into play to foreshadow success. Even such things as vagaries of health and family commitments may enter the picture. And some of the essential qualities are intrinsically internal and private: how can anyone else but the person experiencing his life know how strong his motivation level is?

Business management consultants, economic gurus and coauthors of several books, Marcus Buckingham and Donald O. Clifton, in "Now, Discover Your Strengths" come down strongly on the side of leading with one's strengths rather than working feverishly to shore up weak areas. They urge people to shoot for the moon, using their best skills, rather than spending much time and effort shoring up areas of weakness. They cite research regarding factors leading to success showing that many of these people, in many arenas of endeavor, simply disregarded their short suits and emphasized their long suits.

Buckingham & Clifton conclude that it is more efficient and effective to run with one's greatest talent than to put in much effort trying to become a well-rounded contributor.

If, however, we decide to shore up our weak areas, or work around them while still focusing most of our energy and time on our strongest points, here are a few tips that I have paraphrased from management consultants Buckingham & Clifton:

- While still leading with your strengths in the foreground, get enough better at your areas of weakness to pass the minimum threshold of performance.
- Design a support system to help you keep your focus, e.g. efficiency planning charts which allow you to rate given activities as primary, secondary or tertiary in priorities and build-in subtle pressures to keep you focused on primary activities.
- 3. If one of your strengths is so overwhelmingly awesome as to flush away anyone's perception or memory of your weak areas, by all means, lead with that strength.

 Identify and use a partner who supplies complementary talents, rather than one who duplicates your strong points.

 See if you can re-define your path so that you can avoid going through your weak areas for the present.

So where is the 'wisdom point'—that point which most closely seems to ring true to our highest mental honesty? What does it take to achieve success in music? That depends on how you define 'success.' Perhaps the problem lies in the supposition that making a living and making a life overlap perfectly.

Some degree of internal drive for outward artistic expression exists in everyone, regardless of individual degree of aptitude or talent, but some other work in the world needs doing, so not every single person can make their living making music. We need some musically inclined doctors, grocers, bus drivers, nuclear engineers, repairmen, etc.

"In an ideal world, everyone would be encouraged for any creative effort," says Betsy Lerner in Forest for the Trees. When we encourage, or at least not discourage, folks as they give vent to their expressive urges, we validate their self-empowering urges and help them to grow to their best potential. When we applaud every person's inherent yearnings toward self-expression, we can enjoy all the textures and renditions of vision their spirits choose to share. Our lives are graced by simple gifts from people who offer us musical expression from their unique vantage points and thus expand our own horizons.

Ah yes, springtime again! That time of the year when a young man's desires turn to affairs of the heart, and an old man's desires turn to his wants for some real, live, smashmouth Bluegrass music!

Along about this time every year I feel like one of the old time mountain men who've been denned up all winter just waiting for the spring thaw. They couldn't wait to get some fresh spring "greens" (wild vegetables) and a big rack of fresh Buffalo ribs. Food to rejuvenate the body as well as the soul! Then, for them, it was off to "the shining mountains" to trap some fur. But for me, I can't wait for that first festival to go to.

The old time fur trappers went to their fall "rendezvous" to sell their furs, visit with old friends, and in general spend three or four weeks just having a good time. I feel like we're luckier today, in as much as we spend weeks and even months enjoying ourselves and each other at Bluegrass Festivals all summer and fall.

(I've often wondered what it would be like to attend a festival that lasted for a whole month!)

When I hear that first "G-run" from the stage, then for me, winter is over and I'm ready for some spring greens and Buffalo ribs! Smash mouth Bluegrass cures the winter doldrums every time!

You know, the latest trendy, low carb, upscale, yuppy, don't stick to yer ribs recipes!

Things such as: "Grilled Medallions of Emu with a Velout' Sauce," or how about a "cornucopia of Organic Vegetables with a Tofu Burger". To which I say, no thanks! (I ain't eatin' a bird that don't look like one and my burger is made from a piece of real meat!) But all is not lost.

Two or three weeks ago they featured some fairly decent recipes that are worth fixing. So this month's column features all newspaper recipes and I hope you enjoy 'em.

This first recipe is one that my mother would call a "fancy" recipe because it has more than the traditional ingredients. Is recipe by another "untraditional"

name, which really didn't do it justice, so I'm gonna take a pace from my mom's way of naming food and just call it:

### **Fancy Cornbread**

1/4-cup vegetable oil 4 TBSP butter

2 cups finely chopped yellow on-

8 ounces sour cream

Tabasco

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese 1 1/2 cups white self-rising corn-

1 TBSP granulated sugar 2 eggs, lightly beaten 8-ounce can cream-style corn 1/4-cup milk Dash hot red pepper sauce, such as

Instructions: Place the oil in a 10-inch cast-iron skillet and place in the oven while preheating to 375 $\int$ . In another skillet over medium heat, melt the butter. Add the



onions and heat until softened, 5 to 7 minutes. Let cool. When the onions are cool, add the sour cream and 1/2 cup of the cheese and stir to combine. Set aside.

Continued from A-21 In a large bowl, stir together the cornmeal, sugar, eggs, corn, milk and pepper sauce. Remove the skillet from the oven, carefully pour the hot oil into the batter and stir to combine. Spoon the batter into the hot skillet and smooth the top.

Spoon the sour cream mixture evenly over the top. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese. Bake the cornbread for 35 to 40 minutes, until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Set aside to cool slightly before cutting into wedges. Makes 8 servings.

Here's a good recipe for a quick supper or late lunch. What I like about this one is you don't spend a lot of time cooking when you could be out jamming with your friends at a festival. This one makes enough for four people, so you can invite me over

### Beef Steak with Brown Rice and Vegetables

1 boneless beef top sirloin steak, cut 3/ 4-inch thick (about 1 pound) 1/2 cup prepared non-creamy Caesar dressing

2 tsp. lemon pepper 1 cup uncooked instant brown rice 2 cups frozen vegetable mixture, such as baby green and yellow beans

2 TBSP prepared non-creamy Caesar dressing

2 tsp. shredded Parmesan cheese (optional)

Instructions: Cut beefsteak crosswise into four equal pieces. Place steaks and 1/2 cup dressing in foodsafe plastic bag; turn steaks to coat. Close bag securely and marinate in refrigerator 15 minutes. Remove steaks from marinade; discard marinade. Season steaks with lemon pepper.

Heat large nonstick skillet over medium heat until hot. Place steaks in skillet; cook for about 8 to 10 minutes of medium-rare doneness. turning once.

Meanwhile, cook rice according to package directions, including salt but omitting butter. When adding rice to saucepan, stir in vegetables. When rice is done, stir in 2 tablespoons dressing. Serve with steaks. Sprinkle with cheese,

These two recipes make for a wonderful supper - hot bread, meat and veggies.

When you've got that and an ol' pickup truck, you've got everything in life that you need! (I just assume that you already have a Blue Tick hound, a Martin guitar and a good woman!) How's that, Les?

Even though the days are warming up the nights are still chilly and you don't mind warming up the kitchen with a hot oven in the evening. Last night I whipped up a batch of Sourdough biscuits to have with my supper of Steak and veggies. The kitchen was nice and warm and made for an enjoyable meal. If I'd had time, I would've fixed this next recipe too, as I purely love potatoes au gratin. I try every new recipe I get my hands on for Au Gratin Taters! This is one of the best and easiest I've ever tried. This one cooks up so fancy you'll think you're eating at "The Ritz".

### Au Gratin Taters

1 clove garlic 1 1/2 lbs. Potatoes, sliced very thin 1 tsp fresh ground nutmeg Salt and pepper to taste 1 1/2 cups Whipping Cream

Rub a gratin dish with garlic and butter it well. Toss the potatoes with nutmeg, salt and pepper and place in dish. Cover with the cream and bake at 325 funtil brown (about 1 1/2 hours) Periodically break the crest that forms and submerge it in the unbrowned cream. Viola!

There you have some of the very finest Au Gratin taters that you'll ever wrap a lip around!

Now then, let me tell you about one of the finest eating establishments in all of California. The name of it is the "Bonanza Bar and Grill" and its located in Jackson, California at 835 N. # This month: Bluegrass Web Sites... A One-Man Survey

For a while now I've had a general feeling that the current state of California Bluegrass Band web sites was, frankly, not doing so well. Once and a while I will visit a random band's site and come away thinking that certain things don't look right, that the design is flawed in a major way, or that someone has decided they need a site, buys some software, and just goes nuts. As this happened more and more frequently, I started to wonder what the true state of bluegrass band web sites was, so I decided to take a more comprehensive look. Rather than visit sites randomly when they came to my attention, I have now visited every single web site listed in the "band profile" section of the CBA's web

Now, before going on, I need to make a gigantic disclaimer. I have a business called Cornstalk Design, and I build web sites for a variety of customers, bluegrass bands included. So you could say that I have a sort of built in conflict of interest when it comes to assessing the quality of web sites linked from cbaontheweb.org. However — and this is really the point I want to make - I believe that with some basic knowledge, a little skill and lots of patience and determination, anybody can build a decent bluegrass band web site. It's precisely because I really do believe this that I undertook to write Net Notes more than a year ago. I've attempted to be objective, and I offer the following in the spirit of constructive assistance.

Now, back to the analysis. I rated bands on a scale of 1 to 10, with 1 being unattractive and poorly designed, and 10 being highly attractive and expertly designed. That makes 5 just sort of there, not good, but not bad either. Since there were so many, I admit this was done very quickly — I spent just enough time at each site to click a few links and get a general

sense of what was there. I did not rate content or load time, mainly just layout and appear-

So here are the results:

- ·As of March 1, 2004, there were 164 band profiles on the CBA site (is your band listed?)
- •71 of those bands had no site at all (!), which means that 93 bands did have a web site.
- Average rating of the 93 sites that I viewed: 4.1.
- •% of bands below average: 54.8%

Again, this is just my opinion expressed in statistical form. It would be really cool to have others go through and do a similar rating, anyone interested? Email me.

I don't want to offend anyone by singling out sites that had poor ratings, but I don't see why I shouldn't list those at the top. The only band that got a 10 was the Earl Brothers (www.earlbrothers.com) their

site is really professional and original, and was clearly done by someone who does this sort of thing for a living. A few others that topped the charts were Ho'Down Quartet, All Wrecked Up, and Homespun Rowdy.

Since I am not publishing the entire list, you can e-mail me if you would like to know how I rated your band. I will review your site again to get a fresh take and look in greater detail at your

One thing that I did not consider when rating the sites, was the use of frames. I did notice however, that frames were heavily used. There are a lot of good reasons not to use frames, and only a few reasons to use them. If your site has them, read some of the articles listed on this (http:// www.sitepoint.com/article/ 1204/7) and consider re-design-

ing your site without frames. With the advent of WYSIWYG (what you see is

what you get) web authoring software, anyone can create and update a web site. This is both very neat, but also not so great when it comes to quality design and layout, since most users will not take the time it takes to develop a working knowledge and practice of this medium. One solution might be to have a professional web designer create a template for your band of which you could then make routine updates.

Of course I realize that for many of the Bluegrass folks out there, their band is a fun hobby, not a serious business venture that warrants capital investments, such as professionally designed web sites.

# **CBA** annunces new lifetime membership rates

In recent years, many CBA members have expressed an interest in holding a lifetime membership in our organization. Such a relationship would of course eliminate the need for the membership renewal process each year. But perhaps even more significant is the symbolism that can be associated with a lifetime membership with the CBA.

Lifetime membership in the CBA will demonstrate an abiding love for the music and a personal alignment with the goals of our organization . . . "the furtherance of bluegrass, old-time, and gospel music in California." A Lifetime membership in the CBA will also show the world the pride you place in being an active and contributing participant in our unique musical genre, and a part of our wonderful extended bluegrass music family.

Your Board of Directors has been considering this issue for about a year now. After much discussion, the Board is pleased to make "CBA Lifetime Membership" a new membership offering, available to all. The rates for this special category of membership have been considered very carefully and are quite comparative with the membership structure and offerings of various other major American organizations.

### Here are the rates for CBA Lifetime Membership:

Lifetime Membership, for applicant ages 18-35 -- \$1,000 Lifetime Membership, for applicant ages 36-60 -- \$ 750 Lifetime Membership, for applicant ages 61-100 -- \$ 500

For comparison purposes, under current rates an individual membership renewed annually across 25 years would cost \$500. A couple's membership would cost \$625.

Some caveats apply. Lifetime membership rates apply to individuals, married couples, and committed partnership couples abiding in the same residence. The youngest age of a couple is the determining age for rates. Lifetime Membership is not transferable, and in the case of a marriage or partnership dissolution, Lifetime Membership will be retained by ONLY ONE of the principals. Children under age 18 are not eligible.

Each Lifetime member of the CBA will receive a unique identification card, a suitable plaque, and a modified CBA hat, each designed to illustrate this special class of CBA membership. Other standard membership benefits apply such as receipt of the monthly CBA newspaper, Bluegrass Breakdown, and discounted tickets to CBA sponsored concerts and music festivals.

Lifetime membership in the CBA should not be confused with Honorary Life Membership. This very special category of membership is conferred by the Board of Directors on people who have demonstrated significant contribution to bluegrass music. To date, this honor has been bestowed to only 21 people, a few of whom

are deceased, but many of whom you will find in our midst at various CBA events.

This is a new offering, and will be somewhat complex for us to launch and administer. If you have additional questions about how it works, please ask a Board Member to help determine the answer to your question. Our names and contact information can be found on page 2 of the Bluegrass Breakdown.

### THE CALIFORNIA BLUEGRASS HERITAGE FUND

To more effectively meet its mission — the furtherance of bluegrass, old-time, and gospel music in California—the CBA has established a special fund. Per the terms of the fund, monies held in the California Bluegrass Heritage Fund will be used exclusively for activities and projects which directly address the long-term achievement of our organization's mission. (The policy governing the fund would only allow monies to be used for operational expenses in case of an emergency, and then only with a two-thirds vote of the entire board of directors.)

Projects and activities supported by the fund could include:

- · a scholarship fund
- · a music in the schools program
- · creation of a California Bluegrass Hall of Fame
- acquisition of a permanent home for the CBA
- · establishment of a CBA music, photograph and manuscript archive

The California Bluegrass Heritage Fund offers members of the CBA the chance to take tangible action in promoting and preserving the music that we love and that is so much a part of all our lives. Donors are reminded that contributions are fully tax deductible.



# Staff changes & additions to the 4th Annual CBA Music Camp

Register early to save money and insure your space in the class of your choice

Classes are filling for the 4th annual CBA Music Camp, to be held June 13-16, 2004, at the Nevada County Fairgrounds in Grass Valley, CA. As this article goes to press, some classes are already full or close to full; others still have room, but registrations are coming in daily. So if you're thinking about coming, don't think too long or you might find yourself on a waiting list.

This camp is intended for students who already basically know how to play their instrument, but still have lots to learn (we call this level 1), as well as folks who are already proficient but want to learn more from some great players (level 2), and also singers who want to learn more about vocal style and

We have had some changes in personnel. Dirk Powell and Riley Baugus, who were hired to teach old-time banjo and old-time guitar, respectively, both had to cancel. Luckily, we were able to find excellent replacements for them. Brad Leftwich and Tom Sauber, who along with Alice Gerrard comprise the popular old-time trio Tom, Brad, and Alice, will be joining the staff. Brad will teach the old-time banjo class, and Tom Sauber will teach guitar. We're changing the focus of this guitar class, based on student sign-ups — Tom will teach a level 2 Carter style guitar class, which may also include some beginning flatpicking fiddle tunes. new class descriptions and prerequisites on the website and in next month's Breakdown, or call for more information.

Tom Sauber is a master musician in a variety of styles, a multi-instrumentalist (banjo, fiddle, guitar, and mandolin) and singer, well grounded in tradition, with a comprehensive grasp of style and an exceptional ability to teach. In the 30-plus years Tom has devoted to playing traditional music, the cast of characters with whom he has associated reads like a who's who in old-time, bluegrass, and Cajun music. He is † particularly known for his long-time part-nerships with Oklahoma fiddler Earl Collins (with whom he recorded the classic LP That's Earl) and North Carolina banjo picker Eddie Lowe, both now deceased. Old-time fans have heard Tom's music on his recently released CD with harmonica virtuoso Mark Graham (Thought I Heard it Blow), on his recording with Dirk Powell and John Herrmann (One-Eyed Dog), or through his performances with former Fuzzy Mountain String Band members Blanton Owen and Tom Carter. Bluegrassers know of his work with Byron Berline,

John Hickman, and Alan Munde. He has also performed with cowboy musician Skip Gorman, and will be appearing in Skip's band at the Grass Valley Bluegrass Festival this year.

Tom holds a masters degree in folklore, and is an exceptional teacher who is in demand at the major traditional music workshops across the country. This will be his third year at CBA music camp. Past students say: "I loved the wellroundedness of class. I was doing things I wouldn't have made myself do, and yet it was done gently and clearly. I am thankful for the equality Tom gave to us. He made each of us feel

Tom was excellent. I recommend him highly. He gave everyone something to learn."

Brad Leftwich has been sharing his love of old-time music with audiences for some 30 years. Known for the purity of his sound and his devotion to tradition, he is an accomplished banjo player, fiddler, and singer, whose playing has tbeen acclaimed by critics nationwide. Having grown up in Oklahoma,

in a family with musical and cultural roots in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia, his music reflects the traditions of both those areas. In addition to†carrying on his family's music, he spent years seeking out and learning from older-generation musicians in the southern Appalachians and in Oklahoma and the Ozarks.

Brad was a founding member of the Plank Road String Band in the mid-seventies and toured†with his wife Linda as Leftwich & Higginbotham throughout the 1980s and '90s. Today he is among the foremost old-time musicians of his generation. Recordings of his music appear†on respected independent labels such as Rounder and Marimac. His bands have won contests at the Appalachian String Band Music Festival in†Clifftop, West Virginia, performed at venues from the White House to the Philadelphia Folk Festival, and toured†both in the U.S. and abroad.

Brad is especially regarded for his teaching of traditional fiddle and banjo style. He is a frequent staff member at workshops and teaching camps throughout the country. He has a book on Round Peak style clawhammer banjo published by Mel Bay, and two old-time fiddle teaching videos on Homespun Tapes. We're pleased to have him join our staff.

We are also delighted to announce that Kenny Hall will be back to teach afternoon repertoire classes and lead jam groups again. Kenny, surely one of California's greatest treasures in the world of old-time music, came to camp last year; we received many requests to bring him back, and are glad to

Born blind in 1923, Kenny Hall was enrolled at the California School for the Blind in Berkeley at the age of six. Music was an important subject at that school, being recognized as a viable profession for blind people, and Kenny started piano lessons right away. Later, he learned to play the fiddle and became interested in old-time music, not only of the Appalachian region, but also from other parts of the US, Ireland, Mexico, Latin America, and Europe. He took to listening to the radio and to 78-rpm recordings, and began learning songs from them, and also from the many mentors who came into his life over the years. The band The Happy Hayseeds, a distinctive old-time string band that was often played on the radio in the 30's, heavily influenced him. Their repertoire differed significantly from most commercially recorded southern string bands, focusing on such old-time popular dances as two-steps, quadrilles, polkas, and quicksteps.

Kenny also took up the mandolin, and to this day he plays it the way he taught himself, playing a roundback mandolin on his knee, and using his fingernails instead of the usual flatpick. It is truly a unique style with a unique sound. Based on the Canadian string bands he heard on the radio, Kenny early adopted a crisp sound with

# STUDIO INSIDER -- Mastering Preparation

#### By Joe Weed

OK. So you've been working hard on your album for a year and a half. You've hired all the best musicians you can find, you're really happy with your engineer and can work together seamlessly, and you've indulged yourself and spent those extra few hours on each tune to get the best possible mixes.

Now you have twelve mixes just about ready to send out for mastering, and somebody tells you that they should all be normalized, finalized, and trimmed up so that the mastering engineer won't have to do all that. Is that good advice?

To answer that, here are a few simple guidelines to make the next stage of your project, called mastering, go more smoothly, more quickly, more cheaply, and better.

# Normalizing — or abnormalizing — which will it be?

'Normalizing" is a process that's relatively new to recording, and as such, is sometimes misunderstood or misused by recordists. (The first time I recall seeing the term "normalize" was with an early digital two-track sound editing software made by Digidesign, called "Sound Designer.") Normalizing is a process that didn't exist in the world of analog recording. It's a process that the computer uses to make a given soundfile (read "song" or "track") be as loud as it can possibly be without changing it in any other way. It's a multi-stage process.

First, the computer analyses a

given file and measures each audio sample for volume. (A sample is a tiny slice of audio). When it has measured the complete file, it looks at the volume of the loudest sample. It then measures the difference between that loudest sample and digital zero, which by definition is the loudest anything can be in the digital world. If that difference is, say, two dB, then in the next stage of the process the computer ads that two dB to every single sample in the file. Presto! The complete file is now 2 dB louder, and otherwise unchanged. And it is as loud as it can possibly be.

#### Or is it?

Frequently, short, sharp sounds, like snare drum hits, percussion hits, acoustic guitar string squeaks, pick noise, banjo notes, or other sounds will contain really high amounts of acoustic energy i.e., they're really loud!! But, due to their extremely short duration, our hearing doesn't interpret them as loud. It's kind of like a flash bulb going off. If we knew how bright that light really was, we'd be careful to keep our eyes closed (and covered!) whenever it went off. These loud audio spikes I'm referring to can be many dB louder than the average level of a song or of a track, and since digital recording has an absolute limit on how loud things can be, they can keep all the rest of a track from sounding as loud as it should.

### An example

Imagine a song in which the

average level is about 5 dB below digital max. It sounds to you like it should be a little louder in order to fit in with the rest of the songs in a collection, so you want to raise it. But in one little spot in the third chorus, there's a squeak from a guitar string. It only lasts for a few milliseconds, but there it is, and it's 5 dB louder than the rest of the track. Normalizing can't do anything to make this track sound louder, because the level of that squeak is already at digital zero (digital max.) The song can't be turned up any louder.

### What to do?

Mastering engineers have tools which can find little peaks like that guitar squeak and lower them, without appearing to affect the sound quality of that particular passage of music. Tools like that have improved greatly over recent years, and mastering engineers know how to use them without artificially coloring the rest of the program material. If your mix sounds good to you, but is just too soft, then leave it alone, and let your mastering engineer work to get the volume where it should be, while preserving the great sound of the mix. That's what you're hiring her or him for.

# My head won't fit in there!!!

"Headroom," a term used in audio recording, refers to some "open space" or unused room above the level of the song or track you're working with, but below the limits of the system. Say you're working

with a digital system. Its maximum level (volume) is referred to as zero dB. If your song's loudest peak is at 3 dB below that, then you have 3 dB of headroom. (The unused space between your max and the system's max.) If you're working with an analog PA system, for example, and the loudest sound it can put out without distorting is +18 dB, and the loudest sound you put through it is only +4 dB, then you have 14 dB of headroom. Headroom is a concept that affects the mastering process, and it's important to conserve it when possible.

### Head Master, or Mastering Headroom?

When your mastering engineer works with your songs to make the best possible CD, he/ she may need to do some processing to some of the songs in order to improve their fit into the overall package. This processing may involve equalization, level changing, ambience (reverb and/or delays) or dynamics processing (as in compression or limiting) or a combination of these processes. Often, these processes demand a certain amount of headroom in order to work properly, or in order for the mastering engineer to experiment with them to find the best treatment.

If the song that's being worked on has been normalized so that there is no headroom left,



then the mastering engineer will first have to lower the level of the file before doing any work on it. It will now have a different relationship to the rest of the pieces in the project than it did when it left your studio, and it will have to undergo some processing before it can be worked on at the mastering studio. That costs time and money. So leave some headroom on your mixes, and don't have them normalized before delivering them to your mastering engi-

Continued from B-1 each note clearly distinguishable — no matter how fast it's played. Other than to vary minor ornamentation, particularly on the mandolin, Kenny does not improvise, though he often knows several versions of the same tune.

Kenny has become more than just a fiddler and mandolin player with a distinctive style and energy. Without setting out to do so, he has amassed a repertoire of over 1,100 songs and tunes, and has actively passed this music along to many other musicians, thus rescuing many beautiful pieces that might otherwise have been forgotten.

Bringing him to music camp continues this fine tradition. Kenny's music teacher at the School for the Blind was a violinist who was persuaded to teach Kenny fiddle tunes. He still teaches tunes the way she taught them to him—playing a phrase at a time until the student catches it perfectly note for note. He will be teaching repertoire classes every afternoon at

camp, followed by jam sessions, playing the tunes taught and more.

Kenny Hall is a wonderful, energetic musician who will play all night if you let him, with a great enthusiasm for sharing and teaching his music to others. He also has a lot of amazing stories to tell, having lived a long and interesting life. We are pleased and honored to have him be a part of our music camp.

Along with Kenny, we have several other teachers on staff who are important people in the old-time music scene: in addition to newly added instructors Tom Sauber and Brad Leftwich, Ruthie Dornfeld will be teaching old-time fiddle, and Skip Gorman will be teaching early bluegrass and old-time style mandolin, and doing some cowboy songs and fiddle tune workshops in the afternoons. Also Evo Bluestein will be back to teach the autoharp class.

Jim Nunally, Eric Thompson, and Chris Stuart are our bluegrass guitar teachers this year; bluegrass banjo will be taught by Bill Evans, Janet Beazley, and Alan Munde; mandolin classes, besides Skip's, will be taught by John Reischman and Tom Rozum; Jack Tuttle and Chad Manning will teach bluegrass fiddle; our two dobro teachers are Ivan Rosenberg and Ron Stanley; and Dean Knight will teach the bass class.

Our vocal department last year was unbeatable, taught by Laurie Lewis and Keith Little—they will both be back this year.

Check the website (see below), call, or look in recent issues of the Breakdown for more details on all these classes and instructors.

Some general information about the camp: It starts Sunday evening, June 13th, with dinner, introductions, questions/answers, a mini-concert, jamming, and "hang-out" time with the staff. Classes start Monday morning. The entire morning Monday and Tuesday, and most of the morning Wednesday, is devoted to small group instruction (approximately ten-to-one student ratio) with

your instrumental or vocal instructor. This is the part of camp that you sign up for in advance, so we can be sure to keep these class sizes small. Afternoon classes include jam groups, working with an instructor or teacher's assistant; and elective classes, in everything from music theory and instrument-specific topics, to clogging and songwriting.

Evening activities include a contra dance on Monday and a staff concert on Tuesday. Wednesday late afternoon, we wrap up with a student concert, featuring bands formed at camp.

The cost of the camp is \$230 if you sign up by May 1<sup>st</sup>, \$265 thereafter, with additional options of camping on-site (\$20) and catered meals (\$75).

Discounts for 4-day passes to the Father's Day Bluegrass Festival are available if you are registered for music camp — to get this \$10 discount, FIRST sign up for music camp, get your camp registration number, and THEN order your festival tickets. Look elsewhere in this issue for more information about the festival. Discounts of \$5 are also available to music campers for new CBA memberships (not renewals)—again, to get the discount, you first sign up for music camp, and then apply for membership.

To register for camp, fill out the registration form in this issue, and mail it in. Sorry, we do things the old-fashioned way at this camp, we don't take credit card or phone orders. There is also a registration form posted on the camp website (www.cbamusiccamp.org), along with additional information about the camp, including teacher biographies, detailed class descriptions, and recommended prerequisites for each class.



This offering, from "Rural Rhythm Presents Classical Bluegrass Recordings" is an album of vintage Bluegrass songs and tunes recorded in the 60's. Original recordings were produced by Rural Rhythm owner "Uncle Jim O'Neal," and these current compilations have been assembled from the company's extensive archives.

The song list of this CD reads like a "must know" list of Bluegrass music. The 60's produced some great bands and some classical bluegrass music and it is a treat that some of these excellent recordings are again made available.

I'm a Man of Constant Sorrow was a surprise, as the lyrics diverged from the Stanley version we are all familiar with. It was also interesting to hear The Coo Coo Bird done in Bluegrass style, rather than Old Time style. I also really enjoyed Wandering Boy, as done by Earl Taylor and Jim McCall and the Stoney Mountain Boys. Other artists include Don Reno and Bill Harrell, Hylo Brown, Tater Tate and Red Smiley, Raymond Fairchild, and Red White, and the Dixie Bluegrass Band.

This new CD from the Rural Rhythm Presents Classical Bluegrass Recordings series is an album of vintage Bluegrass train songs and recorded in the 60's. If you delight in the rich heritage of America's train songs, you will be sure to find pleasure in this album. It is hard to think of any songs in this genre that were left out, and there are several that I had never heard before.

One song that sent shivers was the lonesome sound of Ghost Train. An excellent version of the instrumental Train 45 is performed here by the Log Cabin Boys. One feature included in this album is an insert briefly giving a history of some of the songs performed. You will have to look elsewhere for a history and information on the musicians, though.

At first glance, this CD appeared to be a "various artists" recording. Upon closer inspection, I saw that it is from a single band, the Great Wear Family and Dewayne Wear, billed as "Champion Fiddler."

Inside the cover is a publicity photo of the band with their names captioned. The instruments, other than the fiddle, that I can hear are a "skilled but nothing fancy mandolin," "good beat for dancing bass," and background rhythm guitar. Unfortunately, there is nothing in the liner notes to further identify these talented musicians, other than it was recorded in the 1960's.

I have found this to be a very enjoyable CD of fiddle tunes. They are all up-tempo "happy' tunes that make you want to dance, or at least tap your foot or bob your head. Dewayne's playing seems effortless as he covers these well-known traditional tunes with great tone and timing. The one song I wasn't already familiar with was I Ain't Loving Nobody. That had a little twist with a minor key change in the middle that really caught my attention! I did find myself wondering if there were any other ways to kick off a song besides "potatoes," though.

This recording is promoted as being "specially priced" from Rural Rhythm. With this inducement, there is no reason not to add this fiddle-tunes CD to your collection for dancing, background music, learning tunes, or for something to play along with on your own instrument.

This live recording was taped at the Cobblestone Club and the Ash Grove in Hollywood, California in 1965 and features Scotty Stoneman, five times national fiddle champion. According to extensive liner notes on Stoneman written by Peter Rowan and Richard Greene, these tapes represent the peak of Scott's playing and this may very well be the best of him. They describe his style as wild, intense, passionate, and energetic; giving everything he had to the show he was playing, with no consideration of the next show.

As with most vintage live recordings, the sound lacks a little in technical quality, but makes up for it with the exuberance, immediacy, and audience participation present in a live take. You get the feeling that Stoneman's imaginative and wild flights of solo breaks are fed by his appreciative audience, and celebrated by cheers and whoops from himself and the band.

Most of these tunes are traditional ones that listeners will be familiar with, but Scotty's improvisation adds a new dimension to them. The tempo ranges from fast to faster. I thought

Listen to the Mockingbird was exquisite at the part where the fiddle imitates various bird songs. Shuckin' the Corn shows off the great skill of the whole band. There are a few vocal cuts in which he sings the lead in a traditional, old time countrystyle voice.

Scotty Stoneman died at the young age of 40 years old in 1973.

If you are like me and appreciate live recordings and if you like hot, jazzy fiddle-playing within a talented bluegrass band, you will enjoy this recording from Rural Rhythm.

The Austin Lounge Lizards have been on the leading fringe of bluegrass for many years, and this album continues their tradition of tongue-in-cheek songs powered by banjo, acoustic guitar, dobro, oboe (!) and tambourine.

Not wanting to leave out any corner of the populace, the songs skewer dog food, gin drinkers, Jesse and Phil the politicians, yodelers, and large noses. There's even a fight song for the UC Santa Cruz fighting banana slugs!

New member Eamon McLoughlin adds some frenzied fiddle on "Merchant's Lunch," and stalwarts Hank Card, Conrad Deisler add their rhythm guitars and twisted lyrics joined by Boo Resnick's bass and Tom Pittman's banjo. The fine cuisine of "Tastes Like Chicken" includes the only rhyme for spumoni: baloney!

The chuckles abound, the carefully crafted satire pokes fun on all sides, and the gang romps through many musical styles and possibly politically incorrect topics.

Dirk Powell's participation in the Cold Mountain movie project has brought his music to a wider audience and this latest CD showcases his banjo and fiddle playing learned in the heart of his family.


The traditional Appalachian tunes are interspersed with conversations with Dirk's grandfather taped in 1990. Dirk involves the listener in the long chain of music that stretches from the hills of Kentucky to the children who have yet to learn the music of the past.

The zest of life shines through the songs. The fiddle and banjo propel the dance tunes and images of the rolled back rug and the dancing feet appear as the rhythm picks up. "Police" and "Goin' Where I've Never Been Before" are highspirited dance tunes. Dirk's banjo on "Waterbound" has that woody resonance that matches the tale of the wanderer. Tim O'Brien sings "My

Loves Lies in the Ground" with a mournful sense of loss, and Riley Baugus fingerpicks the banjo on a sprightly version of "Honey Babe."

With his musical family surrounding him (Tim O'Brien on vocals and guitar, Riley Baugus on banjo, Tom and Patrick Sauber, Travis Stuart, Jim Miller and Darrel Scott), Dirk has preserved a timeless glimpse into the music of America's past for the present and the future.

Earl Scruggs can be considered a bluegrass treasure and he certainly is the recognized master of the 5-string banjo. Even though he celebrated his 80th birthday in January, he has not stopped performing and his participation in the Three Pickers project with Doc Watson and Ricky Skaggs was nominated for a Grammy in 2003.

Amazingly enough, the famed Scruggs-style of three finger banjo playing was developed by Earl at the age of ten. Earl started playing banjo at age 4 in a family of banjo pickers. His signature style was part of the bluegrass sound and he played a part in many bands throughout his career. He joined Bill Monroe's Blue grass Boys in 1945 and with Bill and Lester Flatt, the talented singer and guitar player, the bluegrass sound with its distinctive vocals and instrumentation was born.

The CD includes three songs from that period including "Molly and Tenbrooks" with Earl's banjo pacing the band. Lester and Earl left the Bluegrass Boys to form the famed Flatt and Scruggs and the Foggy Mountain Boys which recorded on Mercury and Columbia Records from 1948 to 1969. Their almost 20 year association included many songs that are now bluegrass classics: "Salty Dog," "Down The Road," "Roll in My Sweet Baby's Arms," and the classic instrumentals featuring Earl's banjo. The instrumentals are well represented on the CD with all the variations with "foggy mountain" in the title.

The band's fame skyrocketed with the "Ballad of Jed Clampett" from the Beverly Hillbillies TV show and the "Foggy Mountain Breakdown" which was the theme of the movie "Bonnie and Clyde." Other songs in the collection include tunes with Mother Maybelle Carter, Norman Blake and Doc Watson. Earl and Lester parted ways in 1969 and Earl continued to meld musical styles with his sons Randy, Gary and Steve in the Earl Scruggs Revue. The Revue mixed the Flatt and Scruggs favorites with rock, folk, blues and jazz and played across the country to the delight of its many fans.

For fans who have worn out their vinyl records, this CD is truly the "essential" Earl Scruggs.



For those players who are looking for a jump start to their playing or a set of new tunes, Mel Bay has a great set of books that fit into music cases or big pockets. All of the inexpensive books have a CD with all the tunes and either standard notation or tab for learning them and at \$5.95, they are a bargain that can't be beat!



### Famous Fiddle Tunes by Craig Duncan

MB98431BCD

This collection has 44 tunes (in alphabetical order) including such jam favorites as Blackberry Blossom, Down Yonder and Fisher's Hornpipe. The recorded segments are about a minute in length and have a solo fiddle playing the melody line with a guitar rhythm track. The tunes are written in standard notation with guitar chords added above the melody line. This is an excellent collection for anyone trying to learn fiddle tunes - hum along during rush hour and it will help your memory and calm your nerves!



### **Famous Banjo Picking** Tunes by Janet Davis MB98530BCD

Janet Davis has written several

banjo instruction books and this collection includes two lead variations for each of the 30 songs. The music is written in banjo tablature with numbers showing the fretted note on each string. Janet gives song titles and page numbers and capo directions when needed on the CD. Songs are standard folk

songs including Auld Lang Syne, Swing Low Sweet Chariot, Yankee Doodle and there's even a version of the Star Spangled Banner. This would be useful for campfire singing, and could make a banjo player the life of a



### Favorite Guitar Pickin' Tunes by William Bay MB98591BCD

The 16 tunes included in this collection are among the favorites at jams, and learning them with be helpful for any guitarist. The recording has one guitar playing the melody line and another playing backup. The double staves have the melody in standard notation and tablature. Included are Blackberry Blossom, Red Haired Boy, St. Anne's Reel, Whiskey Before Breakfast, Bill Cheathum and Billy in the Lowground. The songs are not adjusted for the common capo positions used by
