The landfill in Nevada County is full... and the cost of disposal is so great that the fairgrounds has locks on all of its garbage bins. In fact, the fairgrounds manager told us at a meeting in January that the cost of


garbage disposal for their county fair was \$15,000! Well folks, if we had that kind of garbage bill, it would be disastrous to the CBA.

We will have recycling again this year, and ask that you help as much as possible by being responsible for your trash. Separate your cans and bottles for recycling bins, crush boxes and fold bags, dump only what is really necessary, and haul out what you can. It can mean the difference of having the money to pay bands or not... for next year.

From the President's Desk



Good Ol' Persons Announces a Change of Personnel

News flash! The Good Ol' Persons are changing personnel. Bethany Raine, bass player with the band since 1980, has moved to San Antonio, Texas. The Persons welcome Beth Weil to the group as of April. Beth has long been a mainstay of the Bay Area bluegrass scene, and has been associated with the band as a player, producer, and graphic artist. Beth will be appearing with the Good Ol' Persons at Ramblin' Conrads in Norfolk, Virginia on April 25, the Merle Watson Memorial Festival April 26-28, the Birchmere on May 1, and the CBA Grass Valley Bluegrass Festival in June.

Since their first incarnation in 1975, the Good Ol' Persons have been playing their brand of acoustic country music to appreciative audiences all over the country and in Canada and Europe. They perform a broad range of styles including traditional bluegrass, their own compositions, swing, old-time country, and contemporary music.

The band members are both instrumentally excellent and vocally strong, and provide a sophisticated ensemble sound both on recorded material and personal appearances. The original material written by Kathy Kallick and John Reischman adds a unique quality to the group's repertoire.

Kathy Kallick is the emcee, lead singer and rhythm guitar player for the band, as well as the composer of many of the band's original songs. She has a unique voice which lends itself to all kinds of material, but is especially strong on gospel, old-time country and bluegrass tunes.

John Reischman is one of the most innovative performers of contemporary mandolin music. He has written many instrumental songs for the group and is responsible for some of the unique musical arrangements the band performs. He also sings bass on the band's trios and quartets. Reischman plays some of the most intricate and complex mandolin breaks that I have ever heard, and seems to do it effortlessly.

Sally Van Meter is an extraordinary dobro player who has done extensive studio work nation-wide. She sings harmony, and seems to be able to perform all types of music with the group with equal virtuosity and taste.

Kevin Wimmer, fiddle, is a fairly new member of the band. He brings a classical violin background to the group, as well as years of playing electric violin in rock bands before branching out into various acoustic music forms. He has mastered swing, Cajun and bluegrass fiddle styles, and has been a principal fiddler in the burgeoning contra and square dance scene nationally.

Beth Weil, the newest member of Good Ol' Persons, bought a bass on June 5, 1976. Four days later she was on stage with a bluegrass band and has been singing and playing professionally ever since. In 1980 she and Laurie Lewis teamed to form the original Grant Street String Band, and recorded an album for Bonita Records in 1983. Since then, Beth has broadened her musical scope to include swing, dixieland, Cajun and klexmer music, and has recorded with Beausoleil, the Savoy-Doucet Cajun Band, Kate Wolf, the Good Ol' Persons, and many others. Beth is also a graphic artist with many album designs to her credit, for artists such as Tony Rice, Bob Wills, Flaco Jimenez, Beausoleil, Kate Wolf and the Bobs.

Current recording projects for the band members include a duet album by Kathy Kallick and Laurie Lewis on the Kaleidoscope label, which should be released in early summer; and an album which Sally Van Meter is recording for Sugar Hill, with Jerry Douglas as the producer. This will be a first solo project for Sally and will feature many Bay Area musicians as well as national artists.

Good Ol' Persons has several recordings which will be available at the June Festival, including: "Part of a Story", Kaleido-

scope Records F-26; "Any Way The Wind Blows", Kaleidoscope Records F-38; "I Can't Stand To Ramble", Kaleidoscope F-17; and "The Good Ol' Persons", Bay Records 208.

Be sure to catch the Good Ol' Persons' sets in June at the CBA Festival. They will be performing at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 13; and at 3:50 p.m. on Friday, June 14.

J.D.'s Bluegrass Kitchen

Howdy, Howdy, Howdy!

(That's my Bill Monroe Impersonation). We're so glad to be her'today and we've got a wonderful column for you this month that we know you're gonna enjoy! Well folks, I can't pick a mandolin or sing like Bill, but from time to time its fun to talk a little bit like him. To my way of thinking Glen Duncan does one of the best and funniest impersonations of Bill that I've ever seen or heard. (Glen was part of Jim and Jesse's Virginia Boys when they played for us two or three years ago, and is now part of the Mike Snider Trio in Nashville.) In his "Monroe Voice" Glen would say: "A bluegrass band with ten mandolins would be awful powerful! You jes' caint have too many mandolins".

I've often thought of taping everything that goes on backstage at the festival and maybe set down some day and put it all into a book. Some of the funniest stories that I've ever heard have been backstage, and also a few very touching ones too, that the performers would never talk about onstage. Some of the most serious performers onstage are just the opposite backstage.

I guess the classic example of that would have to be Raymond Fairchild. Backstage he's loose and very funny, but buddy, when he mounts that stage he's there to pick! Then there's Sonny Osborne. I'd bet a week's wages that he was born laughing! He and Bobby are a genuine pleasure to work with.

Well now that you're all loosened up and you've read this far, you've probably started to work up an appetite and that's what we're here for!

I'm still using the recipes from the "Marlboro Chuckwagon Cookbook" and I have enough recipes for another 3 or 4 editions of the Bluegrass Kitchen, so without further ado, let's get back to some genuine Cowboy Cookin!

The cook had this to say about this first recipe: "All hands come a-runnin' when they get a whiff of the smoke from these. I use the sauce both for bastin' and eatin'".

Barbecue Beef Ribs

5 lbs. Beef Short Ribs

3 cups Black Jack Barbecue Sauce

Place ribs in a flat pan or dish. Pour sauce over ribs, turning so as to coat both sides. Pierce meat with a large fork. Marinate 8 hours, turning once. Remove from marinade and brush off excess sauce to avoid burning. Broil over coals for 10 minutes each side. Brush with marinade and cook 4 to 5 minutes more. Heat remaining sauce and serve with ribs. (Ribs may be cooked in a covered pan in a 350° oven for 1 1/2 hours if desired).

Makes 4-6 servings for normal people or serves Cuzin Al and Sonny Hammond at one time.

Here's the recipe for the sauce that goes with the ribs.

Black Jack Barbecue Sauce

1 cup strong black coffee

1 cup Worchestershire sauce

1 cup catsup

1/2 cup apple cider vinegar

1/2 cup brown sugar

3 TBS chili powder

2 tsp salt

2 cups chopped onions

1/4 cup minced, hot chili peppers (fresh)

6 cloves garlic, minced

Combine all ingredients in a saucepan and simmer for 25 minutes. Strain and puree in a blender or food processor. Makes 5 cups. Refrigerate between uses.

Now to top off a meal like that is hard to do, but I'll guarantee



that the dessert that you can fix with this next recipe will do it. Not only is it easy to fix, but it's down right tasty. It has become one of my favorite cakes and I'm sure it will be one of your too!

The ol' Chuckwagon Cook that wrote this one had this to say: "This is kinda interestin' to fix. but a lot more interestin' to eat." Let's all fix some:

Stir Crazy Cake

2 1/2 cups all purpose flour

1 1/2 cups sugar

1/2 cup cocoa

2 tsp baking soda

1/2 tsp salt

2/3 cup cooking oil

2 TBSP vinegar

1 TBSP vanilla

2 cups cold coffee (or cold water)

1/4 cup sugar

1/2 tsp cinnamon

Put flour, 1 1/2 cups sugar, cocoa, soda and salt in ungreased 9X13X2 inch baking pan. Stir with a fork to mix. Form 3 wells in flour mixture. Pour oil in one, vinegar in one, vanilla in one and pour cold coffee over all ingredients and stir with a fork until well mixed. Do not beat. Combine remaining sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle over the batter. Bake in 350° oven for 35-40 minutes.

This is one heck of a dessert, especially when served with a dish of good vanilla ice cream. It's also good with some sweetened sour cream sloshed over the top of it. To fix that, you just take powdered sugar and sweeten the sour cream to taste. Mix real good in a bowl and there you are. A fast and simple topping that's good on cakes, pies, fruit, chili beans, you name it. Well, maybe not chili beans, but then again I haven't tried that yet so I can't really say. Hmmmm! Sounds interesting!

As you folks know, from time to time I run across a good place to eat and I like to share these places with all of you when I find a good one. There are three things that I base my criteria of any restaurant on and these are: the food, the service, and the price.

Before I'll ever consider writing about any place at all, the food has to be good! The service can be lousy and the prices high or low, and you can be sure I'll tell you that too, but first and foremost, the food has to be good!

Well about the middle of January my wife and I were heading south on highway 49 and it was about 6:00 in the evening and we were powerful hungry. My wife said: "Why don't we try that Barbecue Place in Amador City that we've been meaning to try." (Now Amador City is just about an eye blink in size, and if you blink your eyes when you come to it you'll miss it!) So about 5 miles later we pulled off the highway, down the ramp and parked behind the restaurant.

Sitting there beside the restaurant was a huge barbecue with a

firebox that was stuffed with oak and coming out of the smoke stack along with the smoke was the kind of smell that says "Come Get Me Baby, I'm Yours!" Needless to say the meal we had at "Rollies Express" was one of the most pleasant ones that I've had in years.

I had the sliced brisket of beef and you could cut it by looking at it hard. Honestly folks, this is the best barbecue I've ever eaten in a restaurant anywhere. (Mike said the Brisket is slow cooked for 12 hours!)

They also feature barbecued ribs, chicken, hot links, sausage and smoked ham. You get your choice of two side dishes of potato salad, coleslaw, pinto beans, corn on the cob or french fries. (The beans have got it!) You also get pickle, onion, and sourdough bread!

Since that first time I've been back and I can vouch for their chicken as well. Dinner for two is less than \$20 which in this day and age is sayin' something. They also have beer and wine available. To experience this gastronomical delight, head north of Jackson on highway 49 about 6 miles. When you come down the hill into Amador City, the highway turns to your left and right after

that turn there on your left-hand side is Rollies Express.

Turn down the driveway and park in the back. They're open 5 days a week, 11:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. and 12:30 to 9:00 p.m. on Sundays. They're closed on Monday. Mike and Cheri Anderson are your hosts and when you go in, tell 'em you're with the CBA and where you heard about them. They're from Texas folks, and they sure know all about barbecue. In fact I called Don Denison and Hank Gibson and told them all about how Mike has this huge portable barbecue built that he expressed interest in our festival and would like to see if the folks would like to try some real Texas barbecue. Hopefully, he'll have his rig at the June festival so you all can have a taste of some good Texas barbecue.

Well, I've run out space, so I'll close by saying that its always a pleasure to serve you folks, and keep on pickin' that good ol' Bluegrass, for its an awful good music and I'm really proud of it! Until next time may God grant you all peace and health.

IBMA Bluegrass Bricks Purchased by CBA

The California Bluegrass Association purchased three Bluegrass Bricks by making donations in the names of two life members, Bill White and Rose Maddox and one in the name of the association.

The bricks are a fund raising effort of the International Bluegrass Association, to be used in building a permanent home for the organization. The IBMA is a non-profit organization which supports Bluegrass music and musicians, as well as disc jockeys, writers, associations and fans ..."working together for the common good of bluegrass music".

Donors of Bluegrass Bricks will be honored by having their chosen names engraved in the actual bricks which will form a walkway to the new IBMA headquarters in Owensboro, Kentucky.




