



Because of this, and because the images recorded are the property of the persons being taped, we insist that those who want to Videotape a performance obtain signed, written permission from the performers before taping. If you are videotaping near the stage, expect to have a director or a security officer ask you for your authorization.

One more comment on rules and I'm going to leave the subject.

The list I commented on last month was not all the rules, only those



we have had controversy about. The complete list will be published in the program. The association expects that you will read these rules and abide by them, we don't want to be "the police", we just want everyone to be able to enjoy the festival.

It is with great sadness that I note the passing of Randy Nicely of the Brushy Peak band. Randy and the band performed for us several times; this year will be the their third appearance at Grass Valley. Randy was the lead vocalist and mandolin picker for Brushy Peak. We all mourn his untimely death and his loss to the Bluegrass community. Most especially we extend our sympathies to the family he left behind. Randy was a fine musician and vocalist, a hard worker, and most especially a family man. We will miss you, Randy.

Grant Street Changes Personnel and Produces New Recordings

The past few months have been exciting and busy ones for Laurie Lewis and Grant Street. Laurie was featured on the cover of Bluegrass Unlimited in April of 1990; had her own calendar page on Copper Creek Records Bluegrass Calendar; and was introduced by Hank Snow for her television appearance on the Grand Ole Opry.

Love Chooses You (Flying Fish Records) was named the Best Country Album of the Year by NAIRD (the National Association of Independent Record Dealers and Manufacturers. Laurie recorded an album with Kathy Kallick for Kaleidoscope Records in February. Other personnel on the recording were Tom Rozum, John Reischman and Charles Sawtelle.

Scott Nygaard and Tony Furtado will soon be heard on Sally Van Meter's forthcoming Sugar Hill recording, All in Good Time.

Bassist Tammy Fassaert left the band to join the Texas Rangers and has gone to Japan. She was replaced by Beth Weil from October through May, when Cary Black joined the band. Cary was heard on Scott Nygaards' Rounder album *No Hurry*. He has played with the Kingston Trio, and with jazz artists like Diane Schuur, Ernie Watts, Laurindo Almeida and others.

Comments on CBA Festival Rules in May Issue Editor:

After several interruptions the past week I have managed to read most of the content of the May Breakdown and I was pleased

to read "From the President's Desk", your views on the eight subject matters covered. In particular reference to item "7" seating in the audience area you did a masterful job in letting some selfish individuals (who have insisted that the area down front immediate from the stage in a semi circle out about 150' was the sacred ground for the young and elastic who could fall into and arise out of low beach or low back chairs with collecting a back spasm or sprain. Many others have been laying claim to this geographical area by placing blankets and or tarps on the ground (staking a claim) to a large area and then occupying it with two or four chairs.

Many grand parents present are the reason their children and grand children are there enjoying the festival in a family gathering, so to speak. The younger generation are supple enough to like the beach or low back chairs and some may even spread out on a portion of the family blanket. For some individuals to lay down an edict that this large area is for the special use of blanketeers and sand chair occupants has always been a thorn in the side of many parents and grand parents who do not want to be separated from their youngsters..... by being forced to take their high back chairs outside this "sacred" area. We have Ray Edlund to thank for his dictating where people could sit.

Billie and I for several years have taken in an average of 6 to 10 bluegrass events in California, Arizona, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Colorado, New Mexico and a few other outlying places along our travels and have never experienced this sort of regimentation.

Also, for what it is worth... we, and other Video Camera buffs at none of these other places have ever been confronted with an edict either verbal or in writing that such equipment operators had to contact each group of entertainers in advance and receive written approval to tape their program. And I Say "NEVER". When (Raymond) Fairchild was at Grass Valley last year he said to me... "you do not have to ask our permission... we welcome your taping... who knows if we get the right exposure, we may get another job."

While I am on this video camera use bit, let me say I have received letters from Pentas, RCA, Magnivox, Sony and Hitachi who inform me that the camcorder was perfected only to replace the old 8 milimeter family camera and was never intended to be a perfection recording device for music. They say all that camcorders audio receptor mikes will only go down to 50 hz and up to 18,000 or 20,000 hz and so do not pick up the bass sound from a bass fiddle (upright or electric) and only a miniscule sprinkle of a bit from the sound of a guitar. Any person using a non commercial camcorder cannot hope to record a program that would be a saleable item to a person who knows anything about music. (Bass sounds are picked up only in the 20 hz to 40 hz range.)

I hope to remember to bring up to you the May issue of *The Elks*, magazine who has an article called "That Rollicking Bluegrass Music". I feel sure they would not mind you using it as an insert in a future *Breakdown*.. (P.S.... the article has a couple of errors. (1) very few bluegrass bands have four musicians singing as a group. (2) Bill Monroe did not invent Bluegrass Music. Hillbilly music was sung and played 50-75 years before Bill was born.)

In Rememberance of Randy

(Following are two articles which were written in remembrance of Randy Nicely who died recently in an industrial accident. The California Bluegrass Association has established a Memorial Fund for his family. The following are some thoughts I have about Randy Nicely. I am submitting them for your review and possible publication in the CBA Bluegrass Breakdown.

Randall C. (Randy) Nicely, a 30-year-old millwright from Manteca, CA, died, Thursday, April 25, 1991 in an industrial accident in Tracy. Surviving family members include Randy's wife, Anita, his children, Lloyd (11) and Miranda (3), his parents L.C. and Marie Nicely (all of Manteca, CA), his brother, Steve Nicely of San Antonio, Texas, and his sister, Janet Balentine (along with her family) from Tennessee.

Randy was an outstanding musician and a member of our band, the Brushy Peak Bluegrass Band, since 1985. He sang lead harmony vocals and played mandolin and guitar (and sometimes bass and banjo) with us. We loved him very much, and we will miss his friendship even more than his musicianship.

Randy seemed to be born to play Bluegrass music. He grew up by the Cumberland River in Tennessee, and was influenced by his father, L.C. Nicely, who played mandolin with Jimmy Martin in the late 40's and early 50's. Randy had a natural ability to learn to play any instrument and any tune quickly. He amazed people with his talent and versatility. His voice was absolutely beautiful, and in my opinion, he was one of the finest vocalists in Bluegrass. Randy wrote several tunes, including "Miranda's Waltz" (named for his daughter), "You're My Horse", and "Georgia Moon".

Randy had a tremendous amount of energy, and his enthusiasm was contagious. He was always willing to exert the extra effort necessary to help another person, or do a tough job that needed to be done.

I always enjoyed Randy's humor. He was one of the most enjoyable joke-tellers I have ever known. He put great expression into his stories and he often had us in stitches with laughter. Particularly notable were the colloquial sayings he would insert into daily conversation. I had so much fun with them, that each time I heard one, I wrote it down in my journal of quotes and jokes. Examples include the following:

- "He's so poor he can't pay attention."
- "That's finer than frog hair."
- •They've been working me like a borried (borrowed) mule."
- •She's level-headed; snuff runs out both sides of her mouth."
- ·That's handier than a pocket on a shirt."

I believe that all we really have in this life is our family and friends. We live our lives not for money, power, or glory, but for meaning. We want to know that we made a difference in the world. Randy had an enormous impact on the world through his family, his character, his love, and his music. The world is a much better place because Randy lived. He truly made a difference, and we loved him.

I, as a fellow musician and another of his many friends, would like to focus on his non-official musical sharing and personality. Please try to make room in the *Breakdown* for some of the outpourings and testimonials about Randy which may come to you, although you may receive more than you have room to print. A Tribute to Randy Nicely

We've lost another fine musician — more than that, we've lost another fine sample of humanity. As we develop individually, we show signs of variegation, uniqueness, and sometimes even indispensability. After we lose someone who casts a long shadow, we doubt that anyone else can ever fill his shoes, or make us secure and comfortable in necessary replacement functions. So it is with Randy.

How can anyone else ever combine the traits he showed us, in such a charismatic way? He was ready to pick on a minute's notice — anyplace, anytime. He'd stay up jamming (really trading tunes and licks — not just performing his band's stuff and then leaving) way up into the wee hours, even when his band was the first group at a festival's next A.M.'s performance schedule. He was a musician's musician, being willing to try new things in a jam — not merely playing what he already had practiced and was sure he could do well.

His natural Southern hospitality extended widely, as he invited nearly everyone into his home for a visit and a home-cooked meal, prepared by his every-willing wife and fellow Tennessean, Anita. He was quick to offer to bring meat and potatoes kind of food to potlucks.

He freely offered his help (e.g. he offered, without a second though, his muscles to us when we were moving — as did many other wonderful friends). When a friend showed up at a festival with something valuable and only a tent to keep it in, Randy immediately offered the use of his van for storage and safekeeping.

I could relate many other tales of Randy's generous heartedness and thoughtfulness to other people and of his loyalty to friends, but the examples I've given are typical and may serve to remind someone else of similar kindness and other endearing traits of Randy Nicely.

We will all miss Randy and mourn him, but our memories of him will linger with us and nourish us and assuage, in part, the emptiness created by his loss.

This was the first festival to be jointly sponsored by the Northern Nevada Bluegrass Association, Fallon Tourism Authority, Fallon Optimists and the Churchill County Parks and Recreation.

The festival started with a sad not when the audience was informed of the death of Randy Nicely, a member of the Brushy Peak Bluegrass Band. Understandably, the band did not appear, and California Quickstep volunteered to perform in Brushy Peak's stead and did a fine job.

The music was very good which is not surprising, considering the lineup: California (Berline, Crary, Hickman, Spurgin and Moore), Sidesaddle, California Quickstep, Piney Creek Weasels, Marley's Ghost, High Strung, Horse Opry, Doo Doo Wah, Jake n' Annie Rose, Wild Creek and Classic Country.

Saturday night after the stage show was over everyone sought shelter from the cold breeze. Sidesaddle headed up a jam session in the Dry Gulch building. There was another jam going on in the multipurpose building. Any other picking took place in motorhomes, campers and tents. There are some good pickers and fiddlers that went to Fallon.

Sunday morning began with a cup of coffee and the Gospel Hour which Wild Creek Started. Don Timmer's (lead singer) voice and selection of songs coupled with the harmonies of the band, were

truly stirring. High Strung and Marley's Ghost filled out the Gospel Hour with excellent harmony singing. The entire Gospel Hour was dedicated to Randy Nicely.

The festival was well organized but not heavily attended. A full array of workshops was offered. There were also children's activities which included story telling, face painting, and clowns. The food concessions were good, and the folks were friendly. All in all, it was very enjoyable.

Howdy, Howdy, Howdy!

Can you believe that its June already? When I was around 10 or 12 years old it took about ten years for a year to go by, and how days it only takes a year for ten of 'em to go flying by! Not only is it June already but we're going to enjoy "sweet sixteen" this month. I guess our festival has finally come of age and its not a youngster anymore, but then who among us is?

It is nice to have been part of these last wonderful sixteen years of volunteer madness. I used to think that it was dedication that led us all to volunteer our time and forsake our jobs and families to help put on our festivals, but as time goes by I've given this a lot of thought and I'm convinced that we're all mad. You know, as in bonkers, looney, etc. I guess I've had this madness since about 1946, that being the year I first heard Bill Monroe and His Bluegrass Boys on the radio. And like a lot of people, I haven't been the same since.

This particular brand of madness has made me search out other musicians who are as mad or madder than myself. It has made me spend untold amounts of money on records, tapes, musical instruments, etc., in quest of my MAD sound. It has also caused me to drive thousands of miles throughout the western states to remote mountain festivals where I got to go for days on end without sleep, very little to eat and sometimes take a shower if I was lucky.

My madness has also been the reason that I've spent about half of my life sleeping in a tent on the hard ground or on the hard ground without a tent. All of this because of a song I heard on the radio in 1946? You bet! And I'd do it all over again with nary one regret. I guess I'm lucky though because my ol pardner Vern Williams has been at it longer than I have, because he first heard Bill on the Opry in 1939. And like Vern says "I ain't been the same since." You know Vern, I don't think any of us have.

They say MAD people have bigger appetites and can eat more than normal folks, so now that I've established the fact that we're somewhat ABOVE normal, I'd better get to the subject at hand and that's some more good lip smackin vittles!

I've still got a few recipes to go in the Marlboro Chuckwagon Cookbook so lets start off with one of my favorites, a recipe for bean soup. Here's what the wagon cook had to say about this one: "When a cold West Texas wind is howlin' around, a bowl of thick, hot soup is mighty welcome. The taste alone warms you up quick." Here then is:

Pecos Bean Soup

1 lb. dry Pinto beans

2 1/2 qts water

1/2 cup chopped onion

1 clove garlic, minced

1 large piece bacon rind

1 TBSP chili powder

1/2 tsp oregano

1 4-oz. can diced green chili peppers

2 tsp salt

Wash beans and soak overnight in cold water; drain. Put beans in a large kettle, add 2 1/2 qts. water and simmer one hour. Add onion, garlic, bacon rind, chili powder, oregano and chili peppers. Cover and simmer 2 hours, adding salt the last hour. Serves 6.

I'd like to quote a few paragraphs from this great book, just to give you a little insight of what a chuckwagon cook's duties were.

"A man called Cookie." The man in charge of the chuckwagon was usually referred to as "Cookie". His friendly nickname fooled no one. Most wagon cooks had hair trigger tempers, and testy dispositions. As one old timer put it, "only a fool argues with a skunk, a mule, or a cook."

More reasonable men figures that wagon cooks had good cause to be cranky. The cook got up before the sun to fix enough grub to fill the bellies of 15 to 20 complainin' cowboys. Wood for the camp fire was often wet or in short supply. When it rained or snowed, he had to find some way to keep the fire going and have the meals ready on time. On top of cooking duties, the cook kept the leather harnesses mended. He repaired any damage to the wagon. He was called upon to doctor man or beast with the limited number of medicines he carried in his chuck box.

Considering all this, no wonder his disposition soured a little at times. Keep 'em full, keep 'em rollin! An open range cowboy was willing to work long hours under tough conditions - as long as the grub was good. Most times it was. A proud cook managed to do wonders with staple ingredients like beef, beans, bacon and flour. Rain or shine he could find a way to cook sourdough biscuits, breads and flapjacks in heavy iron pots over a crude campfire. No fancy gauges told him when they were done — only experience.

Beans appeared on tin plates as often as the sun rose. Fortunately, most cooks had a stock of bean recipes so the men never grew tired of eatin' 'em. But surrounded by cattle, the mainstay of most meals was beef. Some outfits got to eat steak three times a day. When the cook had more time for fussing back at the ranch, he might smoke up a big batch of ribs over smouldering Mesquite.

Sounds to me, like one of the old boys could tree a junk yard dog in no time flat. Here's what helped make 'em so tough. A good bowl of Chili! Here's the recipe for:

Wild Card Chili

1 lb. chopped beef

1/2 cup chopped onion

1 16-oz. can red beans

1 16-oz. can refried beans

1 8-oz. can tomato sauce

1 cup water

1 TBSP molasses

1 tsp chopped hot red peppers

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp garlic salt

1/8 tsp black pepper

1/8 tsp cayenne

3 TBSP chili powder

Brown the beef with the onions in a Dutch Oven. Pour off the grease. Add the rest of the ingredients, cover and simmer for one hour, stirring occasionally. Serves 6.

Now everyone that loves a good bowl of chili knows that you have just got to have some good bread of some kind to go with it. This next recipe is a natural to accompany a big bowl of chili. The recipe calls for dry baking mix and sourdough starter, both of which were featured back in the September '90 issue of the *Breakdown*, so you'll have to dig through your back issues to get this portion of the recipe. Here we go, fixin' some Wild Onion Bread.

Here's what this old "Cookie" had to say about his bread recipe: "The way I used to make it was with wild green onions, for the sharp taste. Now they have mixes that work fine."

Wild Onion Bread

1 1/2 oz. pkg. onion soup mix

3/4 cup hot water

1 pkg. dry yeast

2 TBSP sugar

2 TBSP warm water

1 egg

2 recipes dry baking mix

1 cup sourdough starter (September 1990 Bluegrass Breakdown)

Add soup mix to 3/4 cup hot water. Let stand until lukewarm. In separate bowl, soften yeast and sugar with 2 TBSP warm water. Beat soup mixture and yeast mixture together with egg, 1 cup dry baking mix, and sourdough starter. Stir in remaining dry baking mix to make a stiff dough. Place on a floured surface and knead until smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl, turning good to grease the top. Cover and let rise for two hours. Shape into a round loaf. Place on a greased pan. Cover and let rise 45 minutes. Bake in a 375° oven for 35 minutes.

Wow! Talk about some good eatin! Even my ol' pard "Cuzin Al" has a copy of this cookbook and uses it a lot when he's cookin' for a bunch of hungry folks, be it pickers or cowboys. These good recipes keep 'em comin back for more don't they Al!

I'm going to close out this month's edition of the Bluegrass Kitchen with the address of a company in Southern California that specializes in handling freeze dried foods, bulk canned foodstuffs, and single meals in a pouch.


In the military they are known as MRE's, or meals ready to eat. For example you can buy freeze dried scrambled eggs in a #10 can. To fix you just add some boiling water. Or you can purchase a three day emergency food supply that will last for 8-10 years for only \$14.50. They also handle surplus military clothing and equipment, and are a heck of a good source for outdoor equipment. How To Promote Our Music

Some time ago I wondered, in print, about how we, as lovers of traditional music, can best promote it. I let my thoughts meander a bit and offered several potential paths for readers to use as springboards for their own thoughts. Did they ever respond! I was swamped with mail, phone calls and conversations at various jams and festivals.

Nearly everyone had ideas — many of which were not new. I took notes and tried to capture the essence of each person's thoughts without coloring their contributions my own reactions, and collected the entire bunch of notes together to summarize. There they all lay for some time, for I doubted I could adequately present what some folks said without giving offense to others — for folks were candid — and without revealing identities, for some folks had especially asked to remain anonymous.

Some of the thoughts offered to me were contradictory to others. Some were quite negative and critical of our status-quo in tone, but I believe the people offered these thoughts with the intention of being helpful.

So, after much thought on how I could most concisely present the total range of comments, I've gathered similar thoughts together in clusters. More than one person, often said about the same thing, so the number of ideas presented will not begin to total the number of respondents.

Likewise, many folks had more than one idea and suggested several things. Here then — disembodied from identifying or evaluative qualification, are the results of my query:

- Put money were our mouths are. Many folks pointed to the disparity of the values we say we hold and those we show by our actions. If we back bluegrass and traditional acoustic music with pocketbook power, it will grow.
- Performers should start acting like professionals. A few folks
 pointed to specific instances of performers' immaturity, evidenced by on-stage behavior which would not attract others to
 traditional music.
- Promote musical events professionally hire it done if we can't do it well ourselves.
- Performers should shoulder some portion of responsibility for drawing a crowd, and their pay should be a percentage of the gate, not a flat fee.
- 5. M.C.s shouldn't tell hill-billy, baggy-pants type jokes; that only perpetuates the stereotype of rustic, ignorant yokels as the primary lovers of our kind of music. Demographic statistics show that, nationally, bluegrass fans ans pickers are more highly educated and are not racist, sexist, or ageist. Our stage patter should more accurately reflect our lives.
- Stop taking it all so seriously. We don't worry about breathing
 or talk about professionalizing breathing. Singing and playing
 music ought to be just as much a part of our daily lives with
 no one having to strain. Just relax and enjoy it.
- 7. Everyone should share in the publicity deluge we can all put up posters/fliers. Let's have incentives say sell 15 tickets and get a backstage pass for one day or be called up on stage and applauded. Both the work and the glory are for everyone.
- Be more seriously organized. We could have area chapters under a state umbrella and each state organization could be under a national super-organization. That way we'd have clout, we could act in accord and accomplish much.
- Integrate playing music into other areas of our lives. Other
 cultures have music playing while they eat, e.g., and while they
 do other things. We compartmentalize too much. Music will
 reward people with more relaxed, healthier lives when music is



an integral part of each person's life. Then we won't have to promote it to others; others will see our enhanced lives and imitate us.

- 10. Be less egocentric listen to each other. How many area bands even go through the motions of coming to each other's concerts? We can start by supporting each other.
- 11. Stop separating music makers into amateur and professional. That places unnecessary strains on everyone. What if dogs had to decide whether the baying over the next ridge was professional or amateur baying. We get into needless distancing postures trying to make sure everyone knows just how good we are.
- 12. Upgrade and update the lyrics; if you want music to appeal to the younger generation out there, it should say something in terms they can relate to. How many kids believe that the singer is "sad and lonely for the little church in the vale"?
- 13. Leave the lyrics alone they're historically relevant, and kids need to learn a sense of history. They'll be able to relate to songs of heartbreak soon enough.
- Continue pretty much as we are, just being content to appeal to a certain percentage of people — the best.
- 15. Just love everybody. People want to be around people who really love them not just use them to sell records, tapes and C.D.s. If we love each other, we'll be courteous and sensitive to each other then we won't have one bore hogging a jam session or one person offending an audience. People will be able to feel the genuineness.

So there you have it folks. Most of these thoughts have been seen in these pages before — but that doesn't make the ideas less useful. These specific things are what you all have suggested as steps or avenues to promoting our beloved traditional music.
