Editor's Corner

March is... St. Patrick's Day, the First Day of Spring, my 49th Birthday, and the first month that the California Bluegrass Association has its own part-time Editor and Director of Operations! Yes, after 17 years in the volunteer Bluegrass business, the CBA Board of Directors has decided that the Association has grown to the point that a 1/2 time Director is needed to assist the volunteer board in the festival planning, production and advertising, edit our monthly magazine, and to help promote, publicize, and educate the general public about Bluegrass, Old-time and Gospel music.

Our membership has grown to almost 2,100 people, with members in California, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, and 17 other states, including Alaska. Planning and coordination of the yearly Grass Valley festival has become difficult to accomplish properly when the festival

coordinator is now teaching school during the day when the business offices for the Fairgrounds, Chamber of Commerce, and various contractors are open for business. There has not been anyone available to answer the phone calls of members and potential festival and concert customers during the day. Advertising sales for the *Bluegrass Breakdown* have not been taken care of properly by the volunteer editor or other members of the CBA Board, again due to lack of daytime hours to follow up when businesses are open. In short, the Board felt that it was time to run the California Bluegrass Association as a large non-profit organization should be run... in a business-like manner.

To this end, the Board of Directors has contracted with Denison Desktop Publishing (aka Suzanne Denison) to be its new editor and Director of Operations, effective March 1, 1992. By the time you read this issue, I will have resigned from my present job at the University of the Pacific, and will be working from my home at 1985 Madrid Drive in Stockton, California. To start with, the CBA office will be open at least 20 hours per week. Office hours haven't been established at yet, but there will be a recorder on the phone and calls will be returned as soon as possible. The CBA office number will be (209) 464-5324.







The CBA Board advertised the opportunity for a contractor to assume the duties mentioned above in the January 1992 issue of the *Breakdown*. There were no other applicants for the position, and I was ready for a job change. I worked for eleven years in the newspaper business as a Circulation Manager, Typesetter, Layout Artist, Art Director and Production Manager for weekly and biweekly newspapers first in Oakdale, and then in Manteca, California. The past six years I have been first a Department Secretary and then the Credential Analyst for the University of the Pacific School of Education in Stockton. I have recently started my own business (Denison Desktop Publishing), have all my own computer equipment, and will be doing desktop publishing of brochures, flyers, press releases, promotion materials and whatever for various clients.

During my time at UOP, I started to edit the *Bluegrass Breakdown* as a volunteer in September of 1989. The publication at that time was a two page flyer 6 months out of the year, and a 8 to 16 page newsletter the other 6 months. We had a total of 685 members in 1989, and have now grown to almost 2,100 members and a 24 - 30 page magazine every month. As you can see, that is an awful lot for a volunteer with a full time job to handle.

From the President's Desk

by Don Denison Hello again.

I hope you are all eagerly anticipating the end of winter, and making plans for the concerts, campout and festival we are producing this year. Your Board of Directors has been doing its best to provide you all with good music and good fellowship throughout the year. some of our endeavors have been successful and some have been failures. Our annual meetings and campouts have proven to be popular and a lot of fun without paid entertainment. It is evident to me that our membership will lend its support to events that allow informal communion with fellow Bluegrass enthusiasts. Judging from the attendance it appears to me that our membership views the performance of a paid band as a premium or the dessert; the "meat and potatoes" evidently is meeting old friends, conversations, jamming, camping and sharing meals.

Your association can put on those kinds of activities with a relatively small budget, and with the willing participation of our officers and members.

Concerts, however, have proven to be a completely different matter. During the past three years we have put on several concerts, only two of which came close to meeting expenses. Let me list them for you:

- 1. The Country Gentlemen at the 24th Street Theatre*
- 2. Bill Grant and Delia Bell at the UOP Pharmacy Rotunda
- 3. The Osborne Brothers at the 24th St. Theatre
- 4. The Lonesome River Band at the Beltline Station
- 5. Jim and Jesse at the Alameda County Fairgrounds
- 6. The Lonesome River Band at the Freight and Salvage
- 7. The Osborne Brothers and Mac Wiseman at the Crest Theatre
- The Osborne Brothers and Mac Wiseman at the College of San Mateo
- 9. CBA Benefit concert at the 24th Street Theatre.
- 10. Laurie Lewis and Grant Street at the 24th Street Theatre
- 11. The Lost and Found at the Guild Theatre
- The Lost and Found at the Freight and Salvage
 indicates a profit of less than \$200.

These twelve concerts, with one exception, represent losses, many of them considerable. Now if our mission as an association is to sponsor and support Bluegrass, Old Time and Gospel Music, we should expect some losses. If we lose \$100 to \$200 per concert, we would not be concerned providing our bank account is able to withstand it. This is part of supporting the art and providing our members with the music they say they love.

Our ability to produce concerts is dependent upon three things: (1) the financial ability to produce these events; (2) the ability to break even or come close to it; (3) and this is the bottom line, the support of our membership. If our members support the concerts with their attendance we will be successful financially, and will make enough on the concerts to prevent the large financial losses we have incurred.

Not all of these concerts have been been losers. The benefit concert was a money maker, but only because of the efforts of our member bands who produced this event, and turned over all the profits to the association. To Rick Abrams, Carl Pagter, Alan Hendricks and all the other performers and members who were responsible for this event we give our thanks. Without individuals and bands like these our association would be greatly diminished.



The point is this. If you as a member want us to bring quality Bluegrass music to you, you must support it. If everyone who told me that he or she was really happy that we were putting on concerts had shown up, we would have sold out every one of them. The poor attendance tells me that our membership would like to have these events available if and when they decide that they aren't too busy to attend. I think it is time we ask our members what they want, and what will it take to get them to attend a concert. We would like to have a good enough regular crowd to be able to negotiate with the bands to play for a percentage of the net income; we can't do this until we can establish a regular, dependable history of good attendance. What it boils down to is this, if you want concerts, do two things:

First, attend every concert you can. Make plans ahead of time and go! Go regardless of rain, fog or where it is, you'll be glad you came as soon as the band begins to play! Believe me its true, several times I was tired and felt like staying home, but once I got there all the weariness, reluctance, and poor spirits vanished, I was listening to Live Bluegrass, there's no substitute for it!

Second, and this is important, sit down and write me a letter, let me know what it takes to get <u>you</u> out to a concert regularly. Or... if you would rather have other kinds of events, please let me know that too. There is a survey blank on page 23 of this issue which you can use to let me and the other members of the Board of Directors know what kinds of activities you want the CBA to produce, and which ones you would attend.

Well I see that I've gone on and on about this, but it is depressing to me and the rest of us who work for these events and attend them to see one of the best bands in the country play to a house of 60 people, or to see Grand Ole Opry stars play to a crowd of 115. Both these concerts were held in Sacramento within easy driving distance for about 1/2 of our over 2,000 members. Come on folks, get off it! Support your music and your association, or at least write me and let me know what we're doing wrong!

I hope all of you and yours are doing well and prospering. I'll see you at an event soon.

On the outskirts of Sonora, California, just off Hwy 49, is where you'll find Columbia State Park. With all its history and atmosphere it's the perfect place to hear Bluegrass. The St. Charles Saloon is located in the park on the corner of Jackson and Main, where it has been for over a hundred years. Back then there were over thirty saloons in the area.

Owner Denise Kerner says not much has changed about the building itself. Just the usual repairs and a new floor. The counter at the bar is the original except for a new top. She is glad to offer live Bluegrass and will do it more often if the capacity crowds remain. Over the past year groups such as Harmony Grits, Possum Hollow, and Horse Opry have played to enthusiastic crowds. The St. Charles underwrites for Public Radio station KUOP and ever fall has a Poison Oak and fiddle contest, both of which are very popular.

Hot dogs, pretzels, and other munchies are on the menu along with wine and a variety of beer at the bar. A cover charge of three or five dollars is all that is required on nights with live music. They're open daily from 11 a.m. until 11 p.m. or till the music stops. It's recommended to call ahead for information on dates and which groups are playing.

I like the fact that you are so close to the musicians on stage, and if you wander outside the music follows you out into the street. No wonder the Bluegrass groups want to play there. If you're planning a trip to this area or just want to get into the history and great music, stop by. Their phone number is (209) 533-4656.

It's places like the St. Charles which support Bluegrass music that make it possible for all those great musicians to perform for their fans.

Play Bluegrass — It's Good For You!

Picasso said, "The day will come when the sight of a great painting will ease the pain of a toothache." The guitar picker with the blues who "sings his troubles away" is a cliche. Albert Adler, father of an entire frame of reference for psychotherapy, developed his own recreational therapy guidelines for helping over-stressed people learn to relax by "playing".

Music therapy, in the United Sates, is a thriving business, with post-doctoral training, supervised internships and residencies, and certification. Most recreational therapies operate from the (well researched) premise that "playing" rests psyches and allows the body to heal itself.

I could cram this article full of specific bibliographic references citing the efficacy of music therapy and I wouldn't enjoy that as much, either. Instead, if any of you are interested and contact me, I'll be glad to supply you with a list of relevant research articles and seminar papers. (Additionally, those of you who subscribe to Bluegrass Unlimited may see my article about bluegrass and music therapy in an upcoming issue there.)

Ok, so for now, let's just accept the idea that music (along with exercise and art), is a healing agent. So then, are some types of music better at healing than others? What kinds of music "soothe savage breasts" (or beasts)? Research is still in infant stages regarding these questions, but here are some facts already deduced from case studies observed:

- In certain disorders, e.g. depression, Alzheimers, and autism, response to external cues to the imagination has been shown to be sluggish/lazy.
- Certain facets of music, (e.g. lyrics, rhythm, melody and to a small degree, harmony) have been shown to help to jump-start sluggish imaginations and thus aid the parasympathetic system.
- •Active participation is more therapeutic than passive listening.

We can take each of these findings and render them through our chain of connected thoughts, from the bare research findings to interpretations and applications, to show that traditional acoustic music, in particular, is most therapeutic of all.

Health, like sex, is said to be 3/4 above the neck; at least it has been estimated that 75% of hospital beds are filled with folks whose disorder has a psychological component. Without getting into too much jargon, we are assured that both psychosomatic and psychogenetic problems produce actual physical problems, so it goes full circle. (Anyone can demonstrate for him/herself how pulse rate can be affected by visual and aural stimuli of various types; and masseurs and chiropractors make a good living on the proven relationship between continuous tightening of muscular and skeletal armor and the occurrence of pain.)

The imagination is a stimulus-response mechanism; that is, it will not act unless acted upon, and then it reacts, automatically. all sorts of things can act as stimuli, from internal events (like day-dreaming) to external sources (like the phone ringing). for most folks, external stimuli are stronger than internal; i.e. A ringing phone will interrupt a daydream. Folks with autism, Alzheimer's disease, and some forms of depression, generally suffer from decreased response — or sluggish imagination. Since mental



images are complete neurophysiological events — i.e. they affect the brain and body simultaneously — jumpstarting the imagination also aids the body.

Music comes to the rescue! Each of the components of music helps in its own way. Lyrics offer possibilities for concrete images, specificity, action, and appeal to universal experience in our imaginations. Rhythm takes a more visceral approach, and melody and harmony provide (weaker) associations for secondary images to the imagination. Cumulatively the elements of music act as a powerful "tug" on the mind and induce the body's healing abilities to operate.

Traditional music, including folk, country, old-timey, gospel, and bluegrass music all excel in specific, visualizable lyrics. "There's a well-beaten path", "Old Rattler was a good dog", "In the pines, where the sun never shines", "I've wandered far away from God, now I'm coming home.", etc. tell stories that "warm the hearts" of most of us — literally. Or at least, they warm up the "oils" which encourage the body to do its work.

Speedy tempo, a component of much bluegrass, acts to accelerate physiological response rate, and (when used in conjunction with other aspects of music) stimulates the metabolism rate. (Studies have not been done in this country regarding acceleration of the thyroid gland's hormone by rapid music-participation therapy, but they have been suggested in discussion and interpretation sections of foreign research.) Aerobics instructors apparently sense, intuitively, a connection between fast, strongly rhythmic music and motivational aid to maintain healthful exercise stamina.

The last research claim, that active participation is more therapeutic than passive, is a particular plug for bluegrass in music therapy. It just so happens that people get excited about bluegrass right away — they don't sit around and listen to it as background music for years; people get involved in bluegrass!

Music therapy programs all over the U.S., now are trying to build active participation into their formats. And it isn't just remedial — daycare programs offer courses like "Music and Motion" to enhance the lovable psyches of toddlers.

Isn't it great — you don't have to pay a personality-enhancement specialist to tell you that playing music will make you more joyous, more sociable, and more vivacious. You don't have to wait until some activity director in an institution hands you a tambourine to get you interested in the world around you. You can pick up your fiddle, banjo, — whatever, without guilt that you're neglecting other chores, and play to your heart's content (again literally). Now you know that it's good for you, so go to it!

Stoney Lonesome Brings Minnesota Style Bluegrass to California this Month

Stoney Lonesome, the Minneapolis-St. Paul based Bluegrass band, will be bringing "Minnesota Style" Bluegrass to Sacramento on March 14 at 8:00 p.m. The band will perform in Sacramento at a CBA sponsored concert at the Guild Theatre at 35th and Broadway.

Those of you who attended the 1991 CBA Father's Day Festival in Grass Valley, will remember Stoney Lonesome as the band that backed up the legendary fiddler, Chubby Wise. They also performed two sets on their own, and contributed to the Gospel show on Sunday morning.

Sometimes a band backing a well-known solo artist does not get the recognition they deserve. While I think that Stoney Lonesome did a fine job in backing up Chubby Wise, their own sets were simply outstanding.

I remember the band especially for their performances during the years that Prairie Home Companion was a regular feature on Saturday evenings. The show aired for over six years on

Minnesota Public Radio, and was rebroadcast on the West Coast on KUOP in Stockton, KQED in San Francisco, and numerous other California public radio stations.

The band originated with singer, songwriter, Kate MacKenzie and her banjo playing partner, Kevin Barnes in 1979. The other members of the band, Chris Kaiser (mandolin), Brian Wicklund (fiddle), and Patty Shove (bass), joined the band in 1985.

During a recent telephone interview with Chris Kaiser, I asked him how the unexpected demise of Prairie Home Companion affected the band. He told me that it "caught them off guard", but has acted as a catalyst for them. The band had been playing on the show weekly from 1980 to 1986, and it was a "thing we did every Saturday". The theatre in which the show was taped is only a few blocks from where Chris lives, and most of the people who produced Prairie Home Companion were locals.

Chris said that the weekly live show provided the band with lots of good contacts in the music business. The show was taped on location several times each year from different parts of the country, and the band worked with such diverse artists as Chet Atkins, Johnny Gimble, Emmy Lou Harris, and the Everly Brothers. One of the things that performing on weekly live radio taught the band was how to learn to "work up tunes fast... sometimes within 24 hours of the show". It also "taught us about performing on a professional, national basis."

Due to family considerations the band became a regional band for a period of time, but they are now working on some of the national music contacts made during the life of the radio show and are looking for venues outside of the Midwest. Stoney Lonesome showcased this past September at IBMA's Bluegrass Trade Show in Owensboro, Kentucky, and received numerous offers to perform at festivals as a result.

After listening to Stoney Lonesome perform last June, and to some of their recordings, I found that they perform a great deal of original material. I asked Chris who in the band wrote the music, and he said: "I guess it is better to ask who doesn't write music?" Kate MacKenzie writes most of their vocal tunes. Her songs have a feeling of country music, which Chris described as "Jimmy Martin 50's style" Brian, Kevin, and Chris write instrumentals. One of Chris' tunes, Santa Maria Breakdown, is on their latest recording. The tune was written after their performance at the Santa Maria Style Bluegrass Festival last year. Chris said that the members of the band are trying to "keep a traditional (bluegrass) sound with songs that we can call our own." The band tries to "capture what was part and add a Midwestern feel to the music." Their next recording features about 75% original music.

I asked Chris what he felt were the band's greatest strengths. He said that he felt that the diverse musical backgrounds of individual members brought a great deal of variety to the group. Kate MacKenzie, a native Californian, has a background of working with country bands, which is reflected in her musical style, and strong vocal approach. Kevin Barnes brings his Southern roots from Lousiville, Kentucky, and his versatility as a musician to the band. He is equally at home on the banjo and dobro, and sings harmony to Kate's lead vocals.

Chris Kaiser, a Minnesota native, is an award-winning musician on both the mandolin and the guitar. He formerly worked with country, bluegrass and folk bands. He also sings baritone lead and harmony as well as writing original material for the band. Brian Wicklund, from St. Peter, Minnesota, competed for many years in State and regional fiddle contests, and brings a touch of old-time fiddle tunes to the band.

Bassist, Patty Shove, is from Onalaska, Wisconsin, and plays both electric and stand-up bass. Her bass playing is a solid foundation for the band's music, and she occasionally sings harmony on the vocals, especially the acapella gospel songs.

All of the band members presently live in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area, and get together a couple times a week to practice. They are all full time musicians, and Chris said that to their knowledge, they are the only full time bluegrass band in the Midwestern area. He told me that country and bluegrass music is enjoying a revival in Minnesota. One of the biggest AM radio stations in Minneapolis is a country station, and the band feels that they have a huge potential audience for their music. At an album release party for their latest album, *Lonesome Tonight*, last fall about 2/3 of the audience were new to Stoney Lonesome and bluegrass music.

I hope that you won't miss this opportunity to see and hear Stoney Lonesome while they are on the West Coast. They are an excellent band with a repertoire which covers bluegrass, gospel, original songs, soulful country ballads, and a wide variety of dance tunes. A recent reviewer for the Twin Cities Reader said that "Stoney Lonesome's harmonies are crisp, tight and smooth... audiences find it hard to resist clapping or toe-tapping along with the music..."

You can do your listening, clapping, and toe-tapping in March when the band will be appearing:

Howdy, Howdy, Howdy!

Ah March! Hang in there folks, the winter doldrums are just about over with and Spring is right around the corner. March 20th to be exact, is the first day of Spring. Its also the day before my 54th birthday. You know 54 doesn't seem that old to me any more. It did when I was 24 but it sure doesn't now. You know compared to a lot of things, 54 is young. Say like a redwood tree maybe? Or a Stradivarius fiddle? So you see by comparison I'm really quite young and that's just how I'm gonna keep it. I know that my young outlook on life is due in no small part to the music that we all love and live for. I'll bet that if they took a survey of Bluegrass music fans, they'd find that we probably have longer and happier lives than the average person. Its a proven fact that happy people are healthier people, and all it takes to get my HAPPY gauge running on FULL is to crank up Doyle Lawson and Quicksilver, a pickin and doing some of that "ridiculous harmonizing" as only Doyle's group can! That's good for at least 8 hours, but throw in some Del McCoury and Bill Monroe, and buddy, I'm set for a couple of days!

If there's any doubt left that we're a happy bunch of people, just notice all the smiles on everyone's face at the next festival or concert that you attend!

All the folks are usually smiling and are the nicest folks you'll every meet. You'll never meet a stranger at a Bluegrass Festival, for as Pete Kuykendal the editor of *Bluegrass Unlimited* so aptly stated, "we are after all, family".

And family we are, and as a big happy family we love to share with each other and one of my favorite things that I get to share with you all is my love of good vittles and cooking. So without any more comparisons of my young body to really <u>old</u> things, let's get down to some good vittles!

While searching through my stacks of recipes and cookbooks I came upon two totally different recipes for one of my favorite Mexican dishes, **Huevos Rancheros** (Ranchers Eggs). In one of them the eggs are fried whole and in the other one they're scrambled. I prefer the fried recipe myself but they're both excellent so I thought that I'd include both of them so you folks could choose the one that suits you best. Also these two recipes call for a Green Chile Salsa, so I've included my best recipe for that. So lets first cook up some:

Green Chile Salsa

1 No. 2 1/2 can green chiles, diced

5 medium white onions chopped

1 No. 2 1/2 can peeled tomatoes, chopped medium

1 1/2 cups beef stock

2 TBSP lard

2 cloves garlic

3 TBSP cornstarch

3 TBSP water

Brown the onions in the lard, lightly. Add the beef stock, chiles, and tomatoes. Simmer very lightly for 15 minutes. Add the pressed garlic. Make a paste of the cornstarch and water and add. Simmer another 10 minutes, stirring well. This makes a marvelous accompaniment to any red meat or poultry.

This first recipe is for the scrambled style of **Huevos Ran**cheros. It is a good breakfast or lunch dish when served with beans, rice, and warm tortillas.

Huevos Rancheros


6 eggs

3 green chiles, cleaned and chopped fine

1 onion, chopped fine

1 peeled tomatoe, chopped fine

1 tsp lard



Simmer all ingredients except the eggs in the lard over medium heat until soft, (about 10 minutes). Beat the eggs, add to the chile mixture, salt to taste and cook until the eggs are done. Serve with refried beans, tortillas, and green chile salsa.

The first egg recipe came from a little book of authentic Mexican Recipes of only 46 pages that I paid \$1.25 for back in 1968. Boy, have I ever got my money's worth from it! This next recipe for Huevos Rancheros came from the "Arizona Cookbook" that was given to me by my good friend John Murphy at the June festival in '91. It is a most unique compendium of Indian, Mexican ad Western cooking. Thank you, John for this nice gift and I'm sure all the folks will thank you too once they've tried some of these recipes. Thanks again John, you're one of the best friends I'll ever hope to have in this lifetime.

Here then is the second version of:

Huevos Rancheros

1 cup Green Chile Salsa

4 oz. grated Longhorn cheese

4 corn tortillas

4 eggs

Oil and butter for frying

First, put the salsa on to heat. Heat 1/2 inch of cooking oil in heavy skillet. When hot, dip heated tortillas in hot oil and remove quickly. Place tortillas on baking pan to keep warm. Panfry eggs in butter. Turn and sprinkle with cheese. Cook to suit. Remove ad place egg on hot tortilla. Spoon hot Salsa liberally over each egg and tortilla. Serve with beans, Mexican rice and warm tortillas. Salud!

Here's an old Mexican proverb from my small cookbook: "Hunger is a burning and eating is a coolness!" How very true!

I'd like to remind all of you out there in "Bluegrass Land" that we still have plenty of our "Home Cooking" cookbooks available. If you would like one, just look in the Breakdown and you'll find them listed under Mike's General Store, 1110 Calhoun Way, Stockton, CA 95207. They're \$7.00 within being free plus \$2.00 postage and handling.

This is a joint fund raising by some of our Bluegrass Family to help further the music and besides that they're great recipes too! All of the recipes were sent in from folks all over the country and contain quite a cross section of American cooking.

Well folks, I'm just about "wrote out" for this edition of the *Breakdown* and in closing I'd like to say howdy to two of my good friends up in the great northwest, and thank them for their kind words of encouragement about my feeble efforts here in the *Breakdown* and the *Home Cooking* book. Those two being Mr. Sonny Hammond of Portland, Oregon, and Mr. Steve Waller of Peeder Creek, Oregon. They are part of our "family" and both have their own bands, Sunny South, and The Sawtooth Mountain Boys, respectively. (They can also eat more biscuits and gravy faster than any blue Tick hound ever dared to!) Don't ever invite 'em over to eat unless you've won the Lotto, 'cause you'll need it! But they're "good ol boys."

17th Annual CBA Festival Rules and Regulations

In an attempt to inform CBA members and any first-time festival attendees and facilitate the enjoyment of the California Bluegrass Association 17th Annual Festival, the following rules and regulations will be in effect during the June 18-21 Festival:

•NO ALCOHOL or display of public drunkenness and disturbance is permitted in the audience area. Persons who interfere with the enjoyment of the rest of the audience will be asked to leave the area. •NO DRUG USE will be permitted on the site.

•NO DUMPING TRASH ON THE GROUNDS - Help maintain the cleanliness of the grounds and restrooms. Deposit all trash in available bins and recyclable containers in appropriate bins.

•NO LOUD RADIOS OR TAPE PLAYERS are permitted. You did come here to enjoy the music on stage and in jams, didn't you? •BICYCLE RIDING will be prohibited on the festival grounds from Thursday morning at 8:00 a.m. until Sunday after the music on stage stops except for festival volunteer workers. This is a new rule and is due to an injury accident which occured at the 1991 festival.

•MOTORCYCLES - Only California Street Legal motorcycles are allowed on the fairgrounds.

•NO OPEN CAMPFIRES - Keep a close watch on camp stoves, barbeques, lanterns, etc. Make sure they are completely out when

•NO PETS will be knowingly admitted to the fairgrounds. Festival attendees who are found to have pets on the fairgrounds outside of their vehicles or RVs will be asked to leave.

•NO ROPING OFF AREAS - except by festival officials.

Thursday

·NO SOLICITING, DEMONSTRATIONS OR UN-AUTHROIZED CONCECESSIONS - for a variety of reasons, including cleanliness of the fairgrounds, avoidance of congestion, security, and crowd control, and the fulfillment of the CBA's contractual commitments, no ticket holder is authorized to sell merchandise or carry on any commercial enterprise at the festival without a concessionaire's permit obtained prior to the start of the festival in accordance with the rules and procedures of the CBA. No ticket holder is authorized to distribute literature, leaflets, flyers, circulate petitions, picket or carry signs, or set up booths or tables

in connection therewith without the express written permission of the Board of Directors of the California Bluegrass Association.

•NO USING THE WATER DITCH - through the fairgrounds for wading, drinking, washing, trash disposal, or any other purpose. This ditch is a part of the fresh water system for the town of Grass Valley. There will be no camping permitted above the water ditch on the far side of the parking lot.

•NO VIDEOTAPING OF STAGE PERFORMANCES - is permitted without specific written permission from the artist being

•CONSERVE WATER AND ELECTRICITY - Campers and RVs may draw electrical power only from designated outlets. Water faucets and connections are scarce and should be shared. •KEEP YOUR GENERATOR USE MINIMAL - if you must run a generator on your RV to charge your battery or whatever, please keep the time minimal. No generators at all during musical

•PICK UP CHAIRS, BLANKETS AND TARPS - after the evening performances in the audience area.

Your ticket entitles you to enter the fairgrounds and participate in all musical performances on the date or dates covered by the ticket. Camping fees are included in all three-day tickets, and is available for day ticket holders for the day of their ticket and until 9:00 a.m. of the next day. You will be banded when your ticket is taken at the front gate, or for early arrivals, at your campsite. Please DO NOT REMOVE YOUR ID BAND - no replacements will be made unless you purchase another ticket. All festival attendees need to be banded, including children. Security personnel will be checking for ID bands and will ask unbanded persons to leave the fair-

If you have a handicapping condition which will require special camping or parking facilities, please contact Don Denison and he will do his best to accommodate you needs.

The CBA information booth will be located at the Security table behind the stage, and will be in radio contact with the festival coordinator or security personnel at all times.

Product Review: The Climate CaseTM

By Jim Carr

Case covers have long been available, for most instruments, for years. Their primary function is, of course, to protect good cases from the usual wear of daily use. The Climate CaseTM, is the first case cover I know of, designed to protect the instrument as well as the case.

Even here in California, temperatures and humidity can vary from below zero to above 120°, and from arid to muggy. Going from a controlled indoor climate to these extremes, or leaving an instrument in a car or trunk for long periods, can ruin an instrument. Until now few options existed.


Some of the newer cases, such as the Martin case, provide some degree of protection, but their black surface will heat up quickly when

exposed to the sun. Some custom made cases, such as the "Leaf" case, work very well, but their bulk and weight make them difficult to deal with. (Voice of experience - I used to own "leaf" cases.)

Now we have the option of the Climate CaseTM. These covers do an excellent job of reducing rapid temperature and humidity changes, are very durable, and best of all, are light weight and reasonably priced.

The covers are made of "space blanket" material which reflects most of the heat and is moisture proof. The use of closed cell form under the skin of the cover acts like a thermos bottle. The cover is lined with nylon, has a large zipper pocket, and has zipper access to the foam material to allow adding more for better insulation. If the outer skin is damaged, it can be repaired with metallic tape for an almost invisible repair. The dual talon zipper arrangement will allow use with any case handle position.

Eddie and Martha Adcock wrote in the November 1991 issue of Banjo Newsletter: ..."We all have heard horror stories about instruments damaged by extreme or rapid variations in tempera-



ture: necks warped, tops bowed, bridges loosened, and worse. ..."the Climate CaseTM is really an attention-getter. It looks as high-tech as it performs."

The covers are available in regular banjo (RB-1) or large banjo (RB-2) sizes and for most guitars, including Martin cases both the older and new style molded type. Mandolin and electric guitar covers are available as well. If you have a Gibson banjo case, order the RB-2!

The cases come with a 30-day money back guarantee and a 1-year defect replacement guarantee. I've been using the guitar case for some months now, and just got a banjo case as well. I've been very happy with both. They work! They won't keep an instrument from getting hot or cold but they will hold a reasonable temperature for about three hours. Its the rapid changes that do the damage! all in all this is a product I can highly recommend to anyone who values their instruments.
