Maybe someday I'll learn to do things ahead of time, but I don't know when.

Since I am writing this in early April, I can't tell you how the May campout weekend went... but I will in the next issue. We are hoping that the event continues to grow each year. This is our fourth year, and its an event that I thoroughly enjoy. It is easy to produce for one

thing, all that we have to do is publicize the event, collect camping fees, and set up for the Saturday night potluck and BBQ, then we can relax and jam with all the rest of the folks. There are several other board members and volunteers who help with these tasks, and that makes it doubly easy. Now, the June Festival... is another story! Don is usually so busy "putting out fires" that he doesn't have time to be in camp much, and as for having time to pick... well, I can't think of a festival since he became Coordinator that he did any of that... there just aren't enough hours in the day!

Thanks to all of you who have written and called to volunteer your talents during the June festival. If you contacted me, I have given your names and numbers to the coordinators in charge of the various activities (ie. gate, ice booth, etc.), and you should hear soon. If for some reason you don't hear from the coordinator before the festival, please come see one of us anytime after Monday, June 15 at the CBA "base camp" on the festival grounds. We will have our CBA blue pennants somewhere on our RVs, and we will be happy to put you to work.

Please remember that camping for the Festival begins on Monday the 15th, and you are welcome to come earlier, but you will be charged the regular Fairgrounds camping fee of \$15 per night rather than the \$10 per night CBA group rate. Actually, the early campers have lots of fun, jamming, talking, and touring the surrounding towns for museums, antique shops, etc. There are loads of things to see in the Grass Valley - Nevada City area, within easy driving, and even bicycling distance of the fairgrounds. If you would like information on local attractions, you might give the Grass Valley/Nevada County Chamber of Commerce a call at (916) 273-4667, or drop by their office at 248 Mill Street in Grass Valley to pick up some information. When you are there, be sure to take a look around their building. It is an old house, and contains some fascinating historical relics, as well as local tourist attraction brochures, lists of motels and restaurants in the area, and local papers for entertainment ideas.

If you don't plan to camp at the fairgrounds, you will need to make your reservations as soon as possible, since all of the accommodations in the area fill up fast. For a list of Motels, Bed and Breakfast Inns and Camping facilities in the area call the Nevada County Chamber of Commerce or the CBA office.

We are planning an event in a new location for August... a Saturday jam session, dinner and concert at the Black Bart Inn Park in San Andreas, CA. The event will be held on Saturday, August 8, from 1 p.m. until 11 p.m. or so. A Spaghetti and BBQ Chicken dinner will be served by the San Andreas Lions Club in the Park about 6 p.m., and a concert will be held at 8 p.m. in the Metropolitan Theatre. The bands to perform will be California Quickstep and Brushy Peak. Tickets will be available for the entire day's event for \$12.50... this includes jamming, dinner, and concert! We don't think it can be beat... and hope that you will all support it by your presence, and bring a friend or two. There is an ad with ticket order



From the President's Desk

Its almost Festival time again! It seems to come around awfully fast. This of course is the last issue that is sure to be received by all our members who are going to the festival, so I suppose it is the appropriate time to mention rules. I have to tell you that making, enforcing, and writing about rules is about at the bottom of the list of things I like to do. Indeed, I dislike it very much! With that said, I'll give you all a quick update on the rules we have had to set in order to make the festival a pleasant, safe and smoothly run event.

The first thing I'll mention is our new rule on bicycles. After long and careful consideration we have found it necessary to ban the use of bicycles on the festival grounds from Thursday at 10:00 a.m. until the end of the music on stage on Sunday, (or the end of the festival). Official Festival Personnel will be the only exception to this rule. (They will be wearing CBA orange vests and their bicycles will be marked so they will be easily identifiable.)

No Pets... a crowded festival grounds full of strange sights and unfamiliar people is not an appropriate place for your pet. Leave it with a kennel or in the care of a friend.

No roping of camp areas is allowed except for official festival purposes. This rule will be enforced. Please do not "circle your wagons" and HOG a large amount of space. We've worked hard to increase our ticket sales revenues to provide improved programming and activities. If you take up excessive space, you'll be asked to move

While I'm on the subject, <u>NO ONE OWNS</u> a particular space at the festival. Everyone buys a ticket and does what they can to find a "good" spot. Please don't expect special treatment because you've been camping in a certain place for the past 17 years, it just isn't possible.

Stay out of the ditch! It is part of the Nevada County drinking water system.

No alcohol in the audience area. We do not try to inspect



coolers or try to catch people drinking in the audience, but if your behavior calls attention to your drinking, the rule will be enforced.

Only California <u>street legal</u> motorcycles will be allowed to enter the festival grounds. Like automobiles, motorcycles will be used for entrance and exit only, not for within the grounds transportation

The fairgrounds has requested that except for the RV pads on the hill above the parking lot, we do not use the area across the ditch, above the parking lot for camping.

No open fires!

Generators will not be run during performances. This is a Bluegrass Festival! Please be careful when your generator is running; the festival is a crowded place and we don't want to poison any one with exhaust furnes! Courtesy is the rule here, if you are considerate of your neighbors there will be no problem.

TRASH! Please use the appropriate recycling bins. DO NOT hoard your trash until the last day, it creates a terrible problem for the ground crew. If there are no trash cans within easy walking distance of your camp site, please let one of the festival workers know, and we will find cans to place near you. Please break down all cardboard boxes before putting them into the cans, your help will be appreciated.

I think that I've covered everything. Actually, common sense and courtesy is all you need. Think about the environment you're in, think about how you want to be treated, and act accordingly.

OK, to all of you with small children who are not into volunteering to work with children's activities:

I raised my son (from the time he was 3 years old, we camped in a little tent) at bluegrass festivals. Never once did he lack for things to do, and never once did I resort to carrying his bike! (He wasn't always an angel, he's thrown a few rocks - boys will be boys.) But most of the time he loved laying tag, "Hot Wheels", "Tonka trucks", board games, card games, marbles or a number of other games with all the other "festival kids". 
Carol and I will deeply miss all of our friends and backers that we have met at our festival. We can't begin to express our thanks for all of the support and help that we have received on the festivals.

J.D.'s Blue Grass Kitchen

Howdy, Howdy, Howdy!

Well, I just got back from Grass Valley folks! My chair is already in place and I'm as anxious as a thoroughbred race horse waiting for the gates to open! Thought I'd get a good spot before the crowd shows up. I don't know about you'all but I'm really looking forward to the festival this year. And what a steller line up of bands that we're going to have. Wow! Industrial strength Bluegrass every one of them!

And speaking of steller bands, the Stoney Lonesome band put on a show for us on the 14th (March) that even Flatt and Scruggs would've been proud of. to say that they were hot would be a gross understatement!

And some of those tender ballads that Kate MacKenzie sang, had a few tears in quite a few eyes that night. Kate you're one of the finest "girl singers" on the stage today as Mr. Bill Monroe would put it. We've got to have this group back in the near future, and until we do all of us that were there that night sure thank you for such a wonderful evening of entertainment.

As you read this we're only 5 or 6 weeks away from festival time, but tonight as I'm writing this for you folks, I've got the window open, listening to a nice soft rain falling here on top of Blue Ridge where I live. It sure is nice to hear the rain and all the frogs out in the woods. sure is a peaceful sound and it puts a person in a good mood, and sometimes it brings back memories of other spring rains when we were younger. You know, like the time you went trout fishing on opening weekend and it rained the whole time you were there! It wouldn't have been so bad, but you forgot your tarp that you use to cover your stove and table area with and if it hadn't of been for a large jar of peanut butter and jelly you would have

And to top it off, the tent had a little drip, drip, drip right over your head that didn't develop until midnight or so! Oh, you've got those memories too huh? I'm sure that we all can recall one or two stories such as these if you've ever spent any time camping, no matter what the reason was. The point I'm attempting to get across is now is the time to take down all of the gear that you normally take to the festival. Make sure everything works, doesn't leak, holds water, lights easy (such as lanterns or stoves) and turns off completely.

Sometimes a stove or lantern develops this nasty habit and its a dangerous one as well. Usually just a good cleaning of the valve components cures it. Put the tent up in the back yard and inspect it, and if you think it might have a small hole or leak, turn the hose on it real good. If it leaks, now is the time to know it. We have had showers at night during the festivals in the past. Not many, but a few. During one of our fall festivals that we had back in the 80's, Ed Neff got to doing an Indian rain dance to a hot fiddle tune and

it rained the entire festival. He told me later that he'd of sworn that he was doing the Clinch Mountain Backstep, but what does he know? He's a dance school drop out! (Only went half a semester.)

In my first edition of the Blue Grass Kitchen back in March of '86, I included a basic list of camp equipment. for some of you folks that are new to this, I felt that it wouldn't hurt to list them here again. I've always stressed the point to buy the best equipment you can afford. It's better to pay \$60 for a quality piece of equipment than to pay \$40 for one that you have to keep repairing or replacing.

- Camp stove propane or gasoline, the largest you can get. You
 can never have too big of a stove.
- 2. Portable Bar-B-Que for those great steaks, burgers, etc.
- 3. Insulated Water Container 5 gallon size minimum.
- Ice Chests one is fine, but two or three is even better. One for beer, cold drinks, and the others for perishables, etc. Keep covered or in the shade.
- Two Tables one for cooking and preparing and the other for eating.
- 6. Chairs or stools buy quality here. They'll last a life time.
- Two Lanterns either propane or gasoline. One for over the stove, the other for the table.
- 8. Cooking Utensil Kit keep these separate from your household equipment and you'll always have the pancake turner!
- Tarp, Ropes and Stakes large enough to cover the cooking and eating tables. Even if it doesn't rain, the shade is always nice.
- Axe or Hammer or preferably both. Mainly for driving tent and cover stakes.
- 11. Sleeping Bags and Mattress. Your preference here. I had a 4-inch thick piece of foam rubber covered with heavy canvas about ten years ago and its still like new and is the most comfortable camping mattress I've ever used. Most foam places have these and they're fairly inexpensive. The secret is to put a good strong cover over it to protect it.

When you buy your cooking utensil kit, but the largest one you can find. The smaller ones are just that... too small! Remember, you're not planning a backpacking outfit. Buy the one that nests together. also buy the necessary large spoons, ladles, spatulas, and silverware along with a couple of Old Hickory kitchen knives. Keep all of this together and you'll never go to a festival without a pancake turner!

Preplanning for a festival or campout of any kind always cuts down on mistakes or the possibility of forgetting something. I keep a permanent equipment list of what I take with me. A quick check of this list when I'm loading the truck has saved me more than once. I also plan on how many meals I'm going to cook and write up a menu for each day. That way I can buy exactly the amount of food

that I'll need. I also pre-cook a few things and that saves a lot of time for me later. Some of the things you can fix ahead are your desserts, salad veggies, (sliced, chopped, etc.) Also a big covered container of gravy, just reheat it. A dozen or so potatoes wrapped in foil and baked — just slice and brown in butter for some of the best breakfast spuds you've ever eaten! In other words, do all that you can at home.

You'll love yourself for it later, believe me. Here's a trick I learned years ago that keeps everything from getting wet and soggy in your ice chest. Rinse and clean one gallon milk jugs, fill with water and freeze. As the ice melts it stays in the jug and you can use it for drinking water too! Two birds with one rock! Who says Hillbillys are dumb? So folks, let's check all the gear, make our equipment list, and starting planning some scrumptious meals. I can smell them Grits fryin' already!

Before we get down to the vittles this month (my favorite part), I'd like to thank Don and Suzanne Denison for the surprise birthday gift that they gave me for my 54th Birthday. They gave it to me the night of the Stoney Lonesome concert in Sacramento, so I opened it in front of the audience on stage.

It is a wonderful cookbook named Around the Southern Table by Sarah Belk. In the process of tearing the wrapping paper off of it, I inadvertently tore the jacket cover in two. (My whole day had been like that, but that's another story.) My good friend, Harold Crawford was in the audience, and realized what I was doing, and laughed until he cried almost! Later he said it reminded me of that "Woody" station wagon that I bought a few years ago. Said he's never forget how ugly I thought that car was, once I got it out of the crate! Thanks, Harold, I love ya brother.

I haven't had a chance to try any of the mouth slobbering

recipes from this fine volume, but rest assured as soon as I do you'll get to share 'em here with me. Yeah, mo vittles!

Since one of the bounties of being in this part of California is Asparagus, here's two of my very favorite ways to fix it. To my way of thinking the finest Asparagus in the whole world is put up by Kings Crown packing right in Stockton, California. A good friend, Mr. Ronnie Del Carlo not only raises fine Asparagus, but is one of the principal owners of Kings Crown Packing. This recipe came from the Kings Crown Asparagus Cookbook. Should you like a copy just drop a line to Kings Crown, P.O. Box 6478, Stockton, CA 95206, and they'll see you get one. Here's how to fix:

Deep Fried Asparagus

1 lb. of Asparagus
2/3 cup of all purpose four or
1 cup bread crumbs
2 tsp salt
2/3 cup milk
1 egg, separated
1/4 tsp cream of tartar
Vegetable oil
Garlic salt to taste

Break off bottom ends of Asparagus spears. Cut spears into 1 1/2" pieces. Combine flour (or bread crumbs), salt, milk and egg yolk in a bowl. Mix well. Beat egg white until peaks form, add cream of tartar and continue to beat until stiff. Fold into flour mixture.

To cook, pour 2 1/2" of oil in a skillet. Heat to 375°. Dip spears into batter, fry until light brown. Sprinkle with garlic salt when

frying. Drain on paper towel. Serve hot. Excellent dish.

Not only does Ronnie Del Carlo raise Asparagus, but he's one heck of a good cook too! Here's the way that he prepares Asparagus Fritatta.

Asparagus Fritatta Ronnie Del Carlo Style

- 1 lb. Asparagus
- 2 Artichoke hearts
- 2 potatoes, cut up
- 4 Zucchini, sliced
- 1 red onion, sliced
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2 slices American Cheese, chopped fine
- 1 cup Half and Half
- 1 bunch fresh parsley
- 2 TBSP butter
- 1 cup bread crumbs

1/2 cup grated Romano or Parmesan Cheese

Melt the butter in a heavy skillet. Saute red onion with the garlic and parsley. Next, precook the Asparagus, Artichokes, Potatoes, and Zucchini in boiling water until each vegetable is tender. Combine the bread crumbs, cheese, and Half & Half. Place the vegetables in a 9"x12" baking pan and pour crumb and Half & Half mixture over it, spreading evenly. Cook in a pre-heated 325° oven for 20 to 25 minutes.

I love this either hot or cold. When chilled and cut into squares it makes a great appetizer. Thanks, Ronnie, for this great little booklet on Asparagus cooking. I know the folks all over America will enjoy these great recipes that you've put together for them.

That's right folks, all over America! We have members in a lot of other states that receive the *Breakdown* each month. to all of our out of state members I'd like to say a great big howdy and wish you could all be here for our festival next month. Even though you won't all be able to be here, I just want you to know you're not forgotten.

And speaking of out of state members, here's a recipe that was invented and cooked for the first time up in the great state of Oregon. Mr. Lance Gordon of San Jose, California whipped this up when we were all up at Steve Waller's annual "pickin' party" in Pedee Creek, Oregon back around 1985.

Steve has a large sheep pasture down by the creek, where everyone camps and picks for 4 or 5 days every Labor Day Weekend. Lance is probably one of the top two or three Chili Cooks in this entire country without a doubt. So one Sunday he whipped up a pot of the best Chili I've ever had occasion to share and he called it:

Lance's Sheep Pasture Commemorative Chili

25 dried Pasilla Chiles

40 dried Japanese Chiles (these are small dried Chiles about 1 1/2" long)

4 lbs. lean Chuck steak

1 15-oz. can tomato sauce

Chile pepper water (reserve after you boil the chili peppers)

3 onions

10 large cloves of garlic

1 bottle Gebhardt's Chile Powder

1/4 cup ground Cumin


1 TBSP dried red pepper flakes

1 TBSP Oregano, whole

Beer (1 16-oz. size)

1 1/2 TBSP salt (or to taste)

2 tsp ground Coriander seeds



2 TBSP Paprika 1 tsp Turmeric 3 TBSP Masa Harina (corn flour) Bacon grease Vegetable oil

(A word of caution here. When cooking or handling chili peppers always wear rubber gloves. The "hot" stays on your fingers for days and will invariably end up in your eyes!)

- Cut or tear stems off the dried chiles and shake out the seeds.
 Place in a suacepan, add water to cover. Cover saucepan and boil for 45 minutes.
- While peppers are boiling, bone the meat and trip all visible fat and gristle. Cut meat into pieces the size of the end of your little finger. As you work, cover the meat to keep the yellow jackets out.
- Chop onions in a fine dice, mince the garlic. Bring one cup of beer to a boil. Place the Oregano in a tea ball and steep for 15 or 20 minutes. Drink the rest of the beer.
- By this time the peppers should be done. Carefully drain the peppers, reserving all cooking liquid. Peel the pasillas and discard the skins. Discard the Japanese chiles.
- 5. Divide the meat into four portions. Sear each portion in about 2 TBSP each bacon grease and vegetable oil. Don't cook the meat completely, just brown the outside. Place the meat in your chili pot which should hold about 6 quarts.
- 6. Saute the onions in bacon grease. Add to chili pot with pepper pulp, garlic, tomato sauce, Oregano-beer "tea" (discard Oregano), and all the spices. Stir well. Simmer for at least 2 hours, stirring occasionally and adding more pepper water as necessary to keep chili from getting too dry. Drink another beer you've done all the hard part.
- About a half-hour before you want to serve the chili, make a thick
 paste of the Masa Harina and cold water. Stir into the chili and
 continue simmering, stirring frequently.
- 8. Serve with J.D.'s corn bread and lots of beer. Don't operate any heavey equipment for at least three hours after eating!

There folks is one of the finest Chili recipes that you'll ever have occasion to fix. I guarantee that this one will get you some rave reviews from all who get to sample this culinary delight! You probably thought I'd forgotten all about this recipe didn't you Lance. I did have some trouble finding it I'll admit, but if you all could see my collection of recipes in their so called "filing" system, you'd be amazed as I am to how I ever find everything that I'm looking for. (Actually I just dump out one of the paper bags and the three that land on top are the ones that I use each month.)

Well folks, that's it for this edition of the *Bluegrass Kitchen* this month. Don't forget I'm always available to "taste test" your favorite dishes, should you like to. I know I would.

I'm gonna bag and box up all the recipes and let the gentle rain and the spring frogs sing me to sleep tonight here on Blue Ridge. Till next time, may God grant you all peace and health.

Bluegrass Reunion is a special project CD by David Grisman's Acoustic Disc recording company which reunites some of the finest pickers in the country. Grisman began this recording project with an idea of getting back together with his "old boss", the legendary Red Allen. Allen gave Grisman his first job as a bluegrass picker when he was 19 years old in 1965 with Red Allen and the Kentuckians. In addition, he brought together a group of "kindred spirits" — an eclectic group of artists (Herb Petersen, Jim Buchanan, James Kerwin, and special guest Jerry Garcia) whose musical paths have crossed before. On this CD they have come together ..."for the first time as one group — to explore their bluegrass roots".

Personnel and their instruments are: David Grisman, Mandolin, baritone and bass vocals; Red Allen, Guitar, lead, tenor, and baritone vocals; Herb Petersen, Banjo, tenor and lead vocals; Jim Buchanan, fiddles, lead and baritone vocals; James Kerwin, Bass; and Jerry Garcia, lead Guitar and lead vocals. Quite an impressive list of talent from such diverse bands as the Desert Rose Band (Petersen); Red Allen and the Kentuckians (Red Allen); Jim and Jesse (Jim Buchanan); David Grisman Quintet (Grisman and Jim Kerwin); and Grateful Dead (Jerry Garcia).

The CD features some great picking and the vocals by Red Allen stand out as something special. Allen does a particularly fine job with She's No Angel; I'm Just Here to Get My Baby Out of Jail; and Down Where the River Bends with some nice harmonies, smooth fiddle work and an excellent mandolin break by Grisman. Pigeon Roost is a very fine instrumental with a nice quick tempo.

There are a few rough spots on the disk, as might be expected from performers who have not worked together regularly. However, on the whole, it is a very enjoyable CD, and should become a collectors item for the personnel involved.

Ginger Boatwright has put together a fine, straight to the heart collection of folk and love songs, most of them her own work. She has a beautifully clear voice that fits well with these selections. With fellow musicians like Doug Dillard, Jerry Douglas, and Mark O'Connor accompanying her throughout she can't go wrong.



Most of the songs are about home and getting back to our roots like City Ties and High Ground. On My Own and Lonely and As Long As There's You are two love songs that remind us that falling in love can be both wonderful and painfully lonely. Shine Your Light is an uplifting gospel song about looking ahead to make the most of what you've been given. The only song that seems out of place here is Nashville in the Rain, which is too Country Western.

For the past 50 years Jim Eanes has been delivering solid lead singing and fine songwriting in the traditional bluegrass genre. This CD features four of his original tunes out of the over 500 he has penned. His voice is better than ever, and the smooth, polished vocals on this recording are outstanding.

Eanes has worked briefly with Flatt and Scruggs and Bill Monroe, and eventually as lead singer/leader of the Shenandoah Valley Boys from 1955-1962. He has appeared twice at the CBA Father's Day Festival, and will be a welcome performer again in 1992.

Banjoist Bobby Atkins and his son, Mark on mandolin, along with Vassar Clements and Dobro player Frank Poindexter join Eanes on this recording. Mark and Bobby also sing both lead and harmony on some of the cuts. There is especially fine three-part harmony by Eanes, Mark Atkins and Jones on the Don't Sell the Land. Crimes of the Heart and Home in the Southland are two prison blues songs that feature Bobby Atkins singing lead. On Poison Love Atkins and Eanes trade lead vocals in the lovely love-struck melody, with Atkins switching to baritone in the chorus.

Overall this is a very fine recording which should please fans of Jim Eanes and Bobby Atkins, and the fiddling of Vassar Clements. It is a good mix of slow, mid-tempo and fast tunes which provides for enjoyable listening. The CD is available from Rural Rhythm Records, Box A, Arcadia, CA 91066.

Take You To The Sky is a CD packed full of energy and talented Newgrass musicians. The opening cut Northern Rail sets the pace for this contemporary hard-driving collection of old and new Bluegrass sounds.

Theres a little bit of everything here from country love song *The Roseville Fair*, to a 90's version of *Bouree/Borealis Blues* by J.S. Bach arranged by Bill Henry, and a tale of woe and being caught up in that *Home Brew Fever*. *T for Texas* gives us a chance to hear Taylor Armerding stretch his vocal range to the max. He can hold a note and go from baritone to tenor with ease. He plays the mandolin with as much dexterity.

Winterhawk features a brief cameo by Peter Rowan who also wrote the liner notes. Alison Krauss and Mat Glaser also are featured both well known, accomplished fiddlers.

Recorded back in 1975, and rereleased on CD, Pistol Packin' Mama features some outstanding musicians, including the legendary fiddler, Chubby Wise. Other outstanding musicians on the recording are: Frank Wakefield, David Nelson, and Don Reno.

If you were fortunate enough to hear Chubby Wise at last the CBA Festival last June, you know that he is still in top form. This recording offers him many chances to shine with his fiddle, particularly on his own tune Wise Special and Here to Get My Baby Out of Jail. Don Reno's banjo-playing is sharp and inno-

vative, and Frank Wakefield does a great job on Mandolin Monroestyle.

Radio Flyer is a group of four talented musicians and song writers based in Springfield, Missouri. *Old Strings New Strings* is a fun, easy listening collection of Bluegrass and Gospel tunes. Personnel on the recording are: Dudley Murphy, Guitar; David Wilson, Mandolin and Fiddle; Steve Duede, Bass; and Roger Matthews, Banjo.

The liner notes aren't specific about who sings lead but I assume the singer is the writer. Six of the songs are their own compositions and it's only natural that with the name Radio Flyer that a song about a *Little Red Wagon* would be included. It's a fun song we can all relate to about growing up and watching with envy

our own kids playing with that Little Red Wagon.

This CD is a good mixture of traditional Bluegrass and Gospel songs with plenty of harmonizing. A fine example is We Shall Rise, done acapella. My favorite cuts are Second Derivative, and Last Cold Whiskey. Both give Roger Matthews a chance to show off his banjo picking style. I think he's great. All members are equally talented and play and sing well together with plenty of rhythm and spark. I go along with the theme of this CD that the simple things in life are best. Roger Bellow, "The Drifting Troubadour", was born and grew up playing bluegrass music in Chicago, Illinois. He credits his mother's enthusiasm for the Barn Dance with sparking his interest in music at an early age. Bellow has been involved with country, folk, and bluegrass music since his early teens. He began his musical career as a member of the Cas Walker Show while he was a student at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. During the late 60s and early 70s Roger won mandolin and fiddle contests at the Folk Festival of the Smokies in Cosby, Tennessee.

After his graduation from the university, he returned to Chicago where he did some session work for Patsy Montana, Kenny Baker and Josh Graves. His varied musical career has taken him from Chicago to South Africa, and then on to Charleston, South Carolina where he first formed the Drifting Troubadours. He has been a staff member of the August Heritage Center where he teaches guitar for their annual Swing Weekend, and for the past four

years he has been very much involved with radio. On WBHH-FM, Beaufort, South Carolina, Roger has a Saturday morning radio program. He has "..tried to recreate the old radio days with this program." Roger also researches and hosts a weekly hour program on WSCI-FM, Charleston. His most recent venture is to open Town and Country Music in Pleasant, South Carolina. The store offers individual instruction on bluegrass instru-



ments as well as related musical instruments and supplies. It would be difficult to find an instrument that Bellow does not play, or a part of the music business he has not been involved with, he is truly a versatile performer and musician.

Bellow's latest CD recording, On the Road to Prosperity, features some wonderful old songs with a country flavor. It was recorded in Nashville with the assistance of two legendary performers — Don Helms on steel and Gordon Terry on fiddle. Helms was the steel man for Hank Williams' band in the 40's and 50's and Terry was a member of Bill Monroe's Blue Grass Boys and the Grand Ole Opry. In addition, Melba Montgomery does three duets with Roger on the recording.

Personnel on the CD are: Roger Bellow, Guitar, Mandolin, Fiddle, Bass, Dobro, Banjo, and vocals; Gordon Terry, Fiddle; Don Helms, Steel Guitar; Bob Sachs, Mandolin and vocals; Melba Montgomery, vocals and Guitar; John Lilly, Guitar; David Ball, Bass; Al Osteen, Banjo; Duke Roberts, Electric Guitar; Beek Webb, Mandolin and vocals; and Vollie McKenzie, Bass. The instruments are played by various people on almost every cut.

I really enjoy this recording and all of the songs on it. One of my particular favorites in Are You Teasing Me? with Melba Montgomery and John Lilly doing the vocals. It is a fine rendition of the old tune, with some great harmony work. There She Goes is another favorite. The steel guitar work on Don Helms really shines on this one.

There isn't a bad cut on the whole CD. If you enjoy easy listening, old-time country music, this CD is a good one to purchase. It is available from Flying Fish, Inc., 1303 West Schubert, Chicago, IL 60614.

Drive By Night is a nice mellow Sunday morning reading the newspaper type of CD. From the beginning all the songs blend together for a pleasant listening experience. Performers are Jim Muller, Guitar, lead vocals; Jim Rohrer, Mandolin, and bass vocals; Sharon Horovitch, Bass, tenor vocals; Dave Dick, Banjo, baritone vocals; and special guest Ray Legere on fiddle.

Lead singer Jim Muller has a real folksy singalong voice. By

the second time I played it I found myself humming and singing along like I'd heard it hundreds of times.

The Gospel selections are inspirational and well arranged. The title cut, *Drive By Night*, is a lively instrumental written by David Dick who is a natural on the banjo. I like *By the Side of the Road* because sometimes it seems like we spend a lot of our lives by the side of the road, not too sure where to go and what's ahead for us. a *Stairway to Heaven* is another example of an important quality in a Bluegrass group, perfect harmony.

Southern Rail is a group that sounds like they enjoy playing together, and should continue. They are based in Watertown, Massachusetts. I recommend this CD if you like the traditional folk variety of Bluegrass. I'm glad there are so many groups out there like this who will ensure that this music will live on. The CD is available from Turquoise Records, Inc., P.O. Box 947, Whitesburg, Kentucky 41858.

Stoney Lonesome, the fine Minnesota based bluegrass band, does an outstanding job on their latest CD recording, *Lonesome Tonight*. Kate MacKenzie's lead vocals are as outstanding as ever, and the harmonies and instrumental virtuosity of the other band members help make this a wonderful recording.

Bands members are: Kate MacKenzie, Guitar and lead vocals; Kevin Barnes, banjo and bass vocals; Chris Kaiser, Mandolin, Fiddle and harmony vocals; Brian Wicklund, Fiddle and vocals; and Patty Shove, Bass. All of them are great musicians, and each one shines as an individual while blending into a unit which produces some very fine vocal harmonies and instrumental blends.

Some of the material on the recording is original, and Chris Kaiser's Santa Maria Breakdown gives him an opportunity to display his hot, flatpicking guitar style as the fiddle and the banjo add to the action. Kate's vocals range from the powerful, rich and distinctive sound on Only a Matter of Time, to the sweet Where the Wild, Wild Flowers Grow, and the last tune on the recording, Early which is low and misty.


All told, I would highly recommend this CD to anyone who likes great Bluegrass music. If you had an opportunity to see Stoney Lonesome at last year's CBA Festival, or their recent appearances in Berkeley and Sacramento, you will really enjoy this CD. The 250 acre festival site on the Nevada County Fairgrounds in Grass Valley will have performers on stage from 13 different states.

Nationally touring bands who are slated to appear are: The Johnson Mountain Boys; the Larry Stephenson Band; the Del McCoury Band; Illrd Tyme Out; Bill Grant and Delia Bell. Joining them are: Rose Maddox, Jim Eanes, Carl Story, 97th Regimental String Band, Country Ham, 2nd Time Around, New Tradition, Ric-O-Chet, Tenbrooks, Bluegrass Patriots, RC Express, the Sand Mountain Boys, the Gillis Brothers, and the Silver State Stompers.

Pictured on these pages are three bands which are new to most CBA members and, in fact, to California. New Tradition, a Nashville based Bluegrass quartet, has appeared on the Grand Ol' Opry, the Nashville Now TV show, and were named the Bluegrass Band of the Year in 1990 by SPGMA. They have three recordings

which will be available at the festival. The Sand Mountain Boys is a traditional Bluegrass Band from Albertville, Alabana, comprised of veteran musicians who present traditional bluegrass music and their own material. They were voted the 1991 Best Bluegrass Band at the SPGMA Awards in Nashville. Ric-O-Chet, from Boone, North Carolina, is a four-piece band made up of Steve Lewis, Eric Ellis, Jim Trivette, and David Pendley. They play a combination of Bluegrass and traditional stic music.

Pictured on Page 1 of this issue are the members of the 97th Regimental String Band from Madeira Beach, Florida. They play "Good-Time Music" which is not exactly folk, or bluegrass, or country, but a combination of all these styles, rooted in the popular songs of 19th Century America. The three-member group usually dresses in Civil War uniform, but they may appear in the guise of salty sailors, minstrals, or Irish immigrants. In any guise, their shows are characterized by all the spirit, sentimentality, energy, and exhuberance that audiences seem to love.

Camping for the festival will open on Monday, June 15, for early birds who want a chance to relax, jam with friends, and enjoy all of the attractions in the Grass Valley and Nevada City area. There are lots of museums, parks, lakes and streams to explore all within easy driving distance of the fairgrounds.

Entertainment Coordinator, Lenny Walker is busy planning another great children's program for the festival. He has a great group of volunteers who helped him last year, and some new folks to make the program even bigger and better. We hope to have advance details in the

May or June issue of the Breakdown so you can plan your children's activities.

Be sure to bring lawn chairs or blankets for seating, lots of sun screen or hats, and plenty of cool, comfortable clothes. You may need a light jacket or sweater for evening picking, as the temperatures can drop to the 50s or so, and be a little chilly. We ask that you reserve your bicycle use for before or after the festival, since there

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

Kingman Festival to Honor Arizona Fiddler

On May 2nd and 3rd, the Kingman Area Chamber of Commerce, Budweiser and KZZZ/ KAAA Radio will sponsor the second annual Carl Grady Old Time Country Bluegrass Festival in Kingman Arizona.

17th Annual CBA Festival Rules and Regulations

In an attempt to inform CBA members and any first-time festival attendees and facilitate the enjoyment of the California Bluegrass Association 17th Annual Festival, the following rules and regulations will be in effect during the June 18-21 Festival:

•NO ALCOHOL or display of public drunkenness and disturbance is permitted in the audience area. Persons who interfere with the enjoyment of the rest of the audience will be asked to leave the area.
•NO DRUG USE will be permitted on the site.

•NO DUMPING TRASH ON THE GROUNDS - Help maintain the cleanliness of the grounds and restrooms. Deposit all trash in available bins and recyclable containers in appropriate bins.

•NO LOUD RADIOS OR TAPE PLAYERS are permitted. You did come here to enjoy the music on stage and in jams, didn't you?
•BICYCLE RIDING will be prohibited on the festival grounds from Thursday morning at 8:00 a.m. until Sunday after the music on stage stops except for festival volunteer workers. This is a new rule and is due to an injury accident which occured at the 1991 festival.

 MOTORCYCLES - Only California Street Legal motorcycles are allowed on the fairgrounds.

•NO OPEN CAMPFIRES - Keep a close watch on camp stoves, barbeques, lanterns, etc. Make sure they are completely out when not in use.

•NO PETS will be knowingly admitted to the fairgrounds. Festival attendees who are found to have pets on the fairgrounds outside of their vehicles or RVs will be asked to leave.

•NO ROPING OFF AREAS - except by festival officials.

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•NO SOLICITING, DEMONSTRATIONS OR UN-AUTHROIZED CONCECESSIONS - for a variety of reasons, including cleanliness of the fairgrounds, avoidance of congestion, security, and crowd control, and the fulfillment of the CBA's contractual commitments, no ticket holder is authorized to sell merchandise or carry on any commercial enterprise at the festival without a concessionaire's permit obtained prior to the start of the festival in accordance with the rules and procedures of the CBA. No ticket holder is authorized to distribute literature, leaflets, flyers, circulate petitions, picket or carry signs, or set up booths or tables in connection therewith without the express written permission of the Board of Directors of the California Bluegrass Association.

•NO USING THE WATER DITCH - through the fairgrounds for wading, drinking, washing, trash disposal, or any other purpose. This ditch is a part of the fresh water system for the town of Grass Valley. There will be no camping permitted above the water ditch on the far side of the parking lot.

•NO VIDEOTAPING OF STAGE PERFORMANCES - is permitted without specific written permission from the artist being taped.

•CONSERVE WATER AND ELECTRICITY - Campers and RVs may draw electrical power only from designated outlets. Water faucets and connections are scarce and should be shared. •KEEP YOUR GENERATOR USE MINIMAL - if you must run a generator on your RV to charge your battery or whatever, please keep the time minimal. No generators at all during musical performances.

•PICK UP CHAIRS, BLANKETS AND TARPS - after the evening performances in the audience area.

Your ticket entitles you to enter the fairgrounds and participate in all musical performances on the date or dates covered by the ticket. Camping fees are included in all three-day tickets, and is available for day ticket holders for the day of their ticket and until 9:00 a.m. of the next day. You will be banded when your ticket is taken at the front gate, or for early arrivals, at your campsite. Please DO NOT REMOVE YOUR ID BAND - no replacements will be made unless you purchase another ticket. All festival attendees need to be banded, including children. Security personnel will be checking for ID bands and will ask unbanded persons to leave the fairgrounds.

If you have a handicapping condition which will require special camping or parking facilities, please contact Don Denison and he will do his best to accommodate you needs.

The CBA information booth will be located at the Security table behind the stage, and will be in radio contact with the festival coordinator or security personnel at all times.



Denver Duke Reappears on the Bluegrass Scene as Johnny Eagle Feather

An inquiry in the March issue of *Bluegrass Unlimited*, and several letters prompted me to write about Johnny Eagle Feather, a new member of the CBA, of Anderson, California. Johnny Eagle Feather, aka Denver/Dennis Duke, is living in Northern California and working with his band the Flaming Arrows. Johnny wrote to me about his band, and their recent recordings, and offered the band for Gospel and Bluegrass Bookings.

He also let me know that Elmwood Music Company has recently released some of his past hits, including two Hank Williams songs, and a tune titled, It Takes Six Men to Carry a Man to His Grave, But Only One Woman to Put Him There. The tape is available by mail from Elmwood at P.O. Box 2246, Providence, RI 02905.

In response to a reader's inquiry, *Bluegrass Unlimited* writer Walter V. Saunders talked to Howard Vokes of New Kensington, Pennsylvania, who helped him locate Duke (Eagle Feather), and "helped fill in some of the holes in the Denver Duke and Jeffery Null odyssey".

Denver Duke was born in 1922 near Savannah, Tennessee. His parents moved to Michigan when he was a month old. According to Duke, he was a victim of acute child abuse, beaten by his

drunken father and disowned by his paternal grandparents because his mother was a Cherokee Indian. Eagle Feather says "It was cold and hard to be a half-breed back in those days — I'm half Cherokee. Now I'm proud of my heritage".

When he was sixteen, Duke ran away from home, taking a few belongings and an old guitar. He found a refuge in a town almost 300 miles away, in what turned out to be the local brothel. He recalls, "I was there until almost eighteen, playing and singing for the customers in the smoke filled parlor. It's terrible to say, but it was a house of prostitution that promoted my career, I got my start there."

When he decided to go out on his own, Duke "hit the road doing radio shows. Before the Jeffery Null days, I had been on WLS National Barn Dance in Chicago several times as a guest artist." He also worked with Smokey Fred Cole at the Renfro Valley Barn Dance in Kentucky. He hid his Indian heritage at this time because ..."I thought at that time it would ruin my chance to be successful."

Duke met Jeffrey Null in 1950 when they lived in the same trailer court in Cicero, Illinois. The two began performing as a duo, billing themselves as Denver Duke and Jeffery Null, the Hardin County Boys. They recorded a couple releases for Balkan Records in Chicago, Illinois. It was at this time that their work came to the attention of Howard Vokes. Their recording of Vokes' song, Hank Williams, That Alabama Boy, on the Blue Hen label, was an immediate regional hit and earned them a guest appearance on the Grand Ole Opry.

While they were in Nashville for the Opry appearance, Vokes convinced Mercury Records to sign the duo. Backed by Jimmy Hall and the Black Mountain Boys, Duke and Null recorded *Hank Williams Isn't Dead* (another Vokes song), and *Rock and Roll Blues*. The record was released in September of 1956, and was played heavily on country radio.

Duke and Null made appearances on the Grand Ole Opry, WSM's Midnight Jamboree, the WNOX Tennessee Barn Dance, the Louisiana Hayride, and the WWVA World's Original Jamboree in Wheeling, West Virginia. A second single, All Washed Up With You, an original by Duke and Null also received lots of airplay. They later recorded for Starday with country backup.

For the next several years, Denver Duke and Jeffrey Null carried a schedule of touring, radio, TV and personal appearances. Howard Vokes had to drop out as their manager in 1958 because their hectic schedule conflicted with his own musical career. Vokes recalls that "they carried a band at times. On some dates, they were backed by my Country Boys band, especially around Cleveland, Ohio, where they were very popular. Other times, they were backed by house bands — either country or bluegrass."

Around 1960, Duke and Null moved to the West Coast where they worked for a time, recorded for Heart and Soul Records in Hollywood, and then eventually split up. Null is believed to have died about three years ago in Southern California.

Since the Jeffrey Null days, Duke has had a program on WCPC, Houston, Mississippi, the "Farm and Home Hour". He also used to be on television in Bakersfield, California, with the Jimmy Thomas Western Jamboree. He also recorded for Heart and Soul Records in the 1970s using the name Dennis Duke.

Now seventy years old, Duke has decided to stop denying his American heritage, and uses the name of Johnny Eagle Feather. Johnny wrote to tell me that his maternal grandfather, Chief Eagle Feather, was a performer in Hegon Beck and Wallace Circus, riding a horse and playing a guitar. He continued "...such beautiful singing and what a whistler! He was making all the bird calls." The circus also featured Buffalo Bill Cody and Annie Oakley. He remembers that ..."I was a small boy, a ound 10 years old when Grand pa showed me chords on a guitar." "I'll never forget it... it was an old


How to Speak Basic Bluegrass

If you've just started hanging around in bluegrass jam, you may have noticed that pickers speak a language of their own. A guitarist might turn to a banjo player and say, "Let's Pick! Kick it off." The banjo player might inquire, "What tempo?" to which the guitarist might reply, "Burn It!" It doesn't take long to figure out that the guitarist wants the banjo player to play the introduction to the next tune at a fast pace.

Let's look at a few other sayings heard around local jams...



Has anyone ever tried to each you a new song by calling out numbers? "Starts on the one, goes right to a four, then one-fiveone." Why don't they just give you the chords? Well, in a bluegrass jam, the guitar, banjo, and Dobro may be using capos while the mandolin, fiddle, and bass are probably not. This means that the two groups may be playing the chords using different positions. Then, the singer may change keys a few times trying to find one that works. In the end, the easiest way for all these folks to communicate is by using numbers to describe the relative differences between the chords.

These numbers are written as roman numerals. The I chord is the home or tonic chord. It is always the same as the key you are in, and it is almost always the last chord of the song. In bluegrass, you will mostly encounter the I (one) chord, the IV (four) chord, and the V (five) chord. In the key of G, the I chord is G, the IV is C, and the V is D.

The II (two) chord is used in many songs. Listen for it in "Life's



Martin Guitar he used." "Oh what I'd give to have a tape of him, but I don't believe they had tape recorders those days.'

His current band, the Flaming Arrows, consists of Johnny on rhythm guitar and lead vocals, Jim West on bass, Rex Duplisea, mandolin and vocals, and Frank Petty, violin and vocals. They have been recording an album-length tape titled I'm Not Lonesome Anymore, which includes gospel songs penned by Johnny, Howard Vokes, and one co-authored by Johnny and Jeffery Null.

Several Denver Duke and Jeffery Null LPs have been released over the years, including one on the Mountain label, and several on the Heart and Soul label, all of which are currently out of print. A 1980 foreign release, Folk-Variety FV 12023 Hank Williams Isn't Dead, reissues their Mercury and Blue Hen recordings and is still available from Folk-Variety Records, Postfach 1190142, 2800 Bremen, Germany. Also, several mail-order firms, such as County Sales, P.O. Box 191, Floyd, VA 24091 and Old Homestead Records, Box 100, Brighton, MI 48116, have a few copies left.

Railway to Heaven." The bVII (flatted seven) chord can be heard in "Old Joe Clark."

What if someone tells you to go to the relative minor? Simple: play the minor of the VI (six) chord. The most famous relative minor chord in bluegrass is the Em chord in "Foggy Mountain Breakdown."

"Here's the 'B' part..."

OK, say a guy is showing you a new instrumental tune. "It's real simple," he says, "in the key of G, just three chords, and it goes AABA. Here's the A part..." You don't hear any A or B chords in the song - what's he talking about?

In vocal music we can describe parts of the song with the terms verse, chorus, or bridge, but with instrumental tunes we often use letters. In a song that goes AABA you would play the first part through twice, play the second part, then repeat the first part again. Then the next picker would take his or her break, playing the A part twice again, then the B part, then the A part.

"It starts with a single vamp..."

Or a double vamp. A vamp is a repetitive lick played over a single chord. A bluegrass musician sometimes uses a vamp (daaa d-da, daaa, da-da) or a double vamp (twice as long) to kick off a song before launching into the melody. This lets the others get the tempo. Have a fiddler show you one.

"Get the tenor ... "

The speaker is asking you to sing a particular harmony part. You may remember the terms tenor and baritone from church singing or school choral groups. Men with higher voices were tenors, and men with lower voices were baritones. But in bluegrass, these words have specific meanings that are a little different. Tenor and baritone refer to the two common types of harmony lines, no matter how high or low they are sung.

The tenor part is usually made up of the first note higher than the lead (melody) that forms a pleasing chord. The baritone part is usually made up of the closest harmony note below the lead. In bluegrass, these parts each have a distinctive sound.

There are other ways to stack harmonies besides putting the lead in the middle. In a high-baritone trio, someone may sing the notes that make up the baritone part, but one octave higher than normal. The baritone singer would then actually be singing higher

than the tenor. In a high-lead trio, the tenor part is sung an octave below normal.

In bluegrass, harmony singers are generally not supposed to hit the exact same note at any one time. Trios go to great lengths to avoid singing *unisons*. Thus when someone tells you, "You're twinning me" or "You're doubling," you know it's time to work on the harmony parts.

"You want one?"

The speaker wants to know if you are going to take a break on the tune. If you nod yes, the next time the song comes around to the beginning, you'll be expected to play a solo while the other musicians play back-up. This is often indicated by simply looking at a person and raising the eyebrows expectantly. The same person will probably give you a nod when it's your turn to take a break.

"Back him up!"

If someone tells you this, the jammers are probably desperate for you to stop noodling when others are taking breaks, and they want you to know that you are in danger of becoming a jambuster. As a general rule, it is impolite to play the melody along with some-

one who is taking a solo, as it tends to drown out or confuse the soloist. If in doubt, play the chords. This is also called playing straight chops or chunking.

Reading the signs

Some messages are non-verbal, and these are far from universal. In some jams, a raised foot means, "here comes the ending of the song." Or, the picker may telegraph the upcoming ending by raising his or her chin, eyebrows, and instrument neck, bringing them all back down as the song ends. Any kind of whirling motion may indicate a turn-around. This usually means repeating the last

line of the chorus instrumentally instead of taking a break, or to vocally end the song.

Whoa! Just look at the time!

Made popular at festivals by L.A. musician Tom Corbett, this phrase is usually accompanied by a vigorous tapping of wristwatches, much head-shaking, and placing of instruments in their cases. Usually heard when you have unpacked your new bass saxophone and suggested the group jam on a Broadway show-tune in F# minor. Try this one and you'll learn the meaning of the term Bluegrass Police.




