



July 2,1919 to October 31,1992 by J. D. Rhynes

Fred suffered a fatal heart attack after several years of heart problems. He was without a doubt one of the funniest people both on and off stage that I've ever had the pleasure to know and work with. The word stranger was a word that Fred never knew in his life and he leaves behind countless thousands of friends that he made during his long career in show business. I think that the great Merle Haggard put

it better than anyone could have when he said that America has lost two of its most natural comedians in one week, that being Roger Miller and Fred Maddox. How very true.

I was saddened by the news when Rose Maddox called me on November 4th to inform me of Fred's passing, but she also wanted for all of you folks to know too. We are after all, family you know.

Personally, I would like to thank Mr. Merle Haggard for the assistance to Rose and her family during this hour of need. You're the best Merle, as a singer and as a man.

Let's all remember Fred's wife Kitty and their family in our prayers and just hope that the Lord hasn't heard all of Fred's jokes before, because I know by now that Fred's just getting warmed up and has the Angels rolling in the aisles. Atta Boy Fred!

J.D.'s Blue Grass Kitchen

Howdy, Howdy! Howdy!

As I write this column for the month of December, its the 2nd week of November and up here in the Sierras its absolutely beautiful! We've had our first good frost the other night and all of the leaves are starting to put on their festival of fall colors! The nights are chilly and the days are warm and the cold air makes the wood smoke rise. (Where've you heard that before?) I guess spring and fall are my two favorite times of the year here in the mountains.

Well being the holiday season I'd like to take this opportunity to wish you all happy holidays. A few years ago I ran a recipe for Egg Nog here in the Blue Grass Kitchen and I've had quite a few of you ask me to do it again so I'll feature it this month. Now I know this recipe makes a LOT of Egg Nog, but this is how it was given to me by my good friend Dennis Brown and I learned a long time ago you don't mess with something that works. To say that my friend liked Egg Nog would be the understatement of the year. In fact I've known him to stay in his "Christmas Mode" all year just so he could have Egg Nog every day. But that's a different story. (Honest Folks, all year!)

So, lets start off with Dennis' recipe for:

Supreme Egg Nog Supreme!

The mixins:

1 Quart Old Grandad Whiskey

1/2 pint of Rum

1 quart of Half and Half

5 dozen eggs 7 pints whipping cream

3 1/2 cups sugar

The doin:

Combine the booze, sugar, Half and Half. Mix well to dissolve sugar. Separate the eggs: whip the whites good and fold in gently. Whip the yolks, strain and add. Whip the cream and add, stirring gently. Can be kept in a cool place. Let age for at least 20 minutes and then comes the drinkin! Salud!

I told you this recipe makes a lot, but once you've tasted some of this wonderful nog, you'll never be able to stomach the commercial stuff that's sold. I guarantee it!

You know sometimes we can't see the forest for the trees! I got up early this morning knowing that I had this to write today and I needed a good nourishing, fast and easy recipe for the column. So while thinking about that I proceeded to whip up some fried rice with eggs and salsa for breakfast, a dish that I've been doing for around 20 years or so. All the time running through my mind was, what to write? Well, I polished off a big plate of rice and eggs and toast and was sitting there with my second cup of coffee when I realized that right before my very eyeballs was the answer to my question!

Mind like a steel trap folks... Rusty! Here's how to use your left over rice, or when you're cooking rice, cook enough to make this dish later. I like a lot of eggs in mine but you can add or subtract as you like. Here's how I fix Rice and Eggs.

J.D.'s Rice and Eggs

2 cups cooked rice

3 TBSP peanut oil

4 eggs, beaten

salt, pepper, Salsa, Soy Sauce

Heat a large skillet on low heat for 10 minutes. Add 1 TBSP of oil, coat skillet good. Add eggs and cook over low heat until done. Remove to a large bowl. Add 2 TBSP oil to skillet. Raise heat to high for 8-10 minutes. Add rice and turn often to coat with oil and heat good for about 10 minutes. Add eggs and cook just until they are heated good (about 2 minutes). Serve hot. Heat the salsa and soy sauce separately. (Never serve cold salsa or soy sauce.) Salt and pepper to taste.

You can't believe how fast and easy this one is to fix and let me tell you, its GOOD! You can change the total character of this dish by using different sauces with it. Its really a versatile dish that is good for anytime of the day, at any meal!

Okay folks, we're rollin' now! I've got the stacks of recipes here on the table, the coffee pot on the stove. and the warm sun streaming in through the Kitchen doors. What more do we need!

One of my favorite things to set down to on a cool fall day is a good hot bowl of homemade soup. Here's one of my favorite soup recipes, a standard of Mexican Cuisine -"Sopah de Queso" or Cheese Soup.



Cheese Soup

1 onion, minced 8 green Chiles, cleaned and diced

3 fresh, peeled tomatoes 3 raw potatoes, diced

1 clove garlic or

8 cups water 1 tsp salt 1 tsp lard

1 lb. Longhorn Cheese.

shredded

1/3 tsp garlic powder

Fry the onion lightly in the lard. Add the chiles and tomatoe and cook for a short while. Add the water, salt, potatoes, and garlic. Simmer until the potatoes are done (about 30 minutes). Add the cheese; stir rapidly and serve. Top with chopped, fresh Cilantro. Absolutely magnificent soup!

Here's a recipe that I learned from my father about 40 years or more ago. My dad grew up in Arkansas where as a young man he used to fish the lakes and rivers of Northern and Central Arkansas. There he used to catch a lot of big Carp and here's how they used to fix Carp back in Arkansas. Dad said the most important thing is to have a good piece of Oak plank about 2" thick and about a foot wide and three feet long. Here then is how to fix:

Planked Carp

1 fresh Carp (5 to 10 lbs.) 4 bay leaves 3 tsp salt 1/4 cup soy sauce 2 cups dry white wine 4 TBSP oregano 1/2 cup Apply Cider vinegar 1/2 cup oil 2 onions, minced 10 cups water

Clean the fish and scale. Mix all the ingredients in a large pan. Marinate the fish over night. To cook, build a large fire of Oak or other hardwood. Take some clean nails and fasten the fish to a hardwood plank, Oak preferably, that you've rubbed down good with bacon grease. Prop the Planked Carp in front of a good hot fire and cook until the fish is done. When the Carp is done remove from plank, throw the fish away and serve the plank!

As you have no doubt figured out by how, that last one is a joke, folks. My dad has been telling this one as long as I can remember and I just had to share it with you all in hopes of putting a smile on your

During this next year I will be working hard to plan activities for the CBA membership and ask that members support our concerts, campouts and the annual meeting by their attendance.



Continued Travels of a Bluegrass Junkie

It's the last trip of the year for us as winter is just around the corner, so we plan a three week stay "back East" - the first week in North Carolina, the second week in Nashville, Tennessee, and the third and last week in Owensboro, Kentucky at the IBMA Trade Show and FanFest. a great way to end the festival season for us.

Wednesday September 9, we flew to Knoxville, Tennessee and were greeted by my traveling buddy, Jim Schoggins, and his wife Ellen, who were already camped on Grandfather Mountain in North Eastern North Carolina.

We had reservations at a motel 2 miles from the gate to the Raymond Fairchild First Annual Grandfather Mountain Bluegrass Festival, put on by Arnold Banker and his crew from Peaceful Valley, New York - as only Arnold can do, complete with another 50'x200' tent to sit under and be out of the weather, rain or shine, and it didn't take long to get both!

Thursday started out good and lucky for us there was an hour off for "dinner break". While we were in a restaurant in Linville, it rained 3 inches in one hour and the rest of the evening was cool enough for long underwear and winter coats. but the next 2 days the weather was beautiful and Raymond Fairchild can be proud that he helped put on one of the best festivals of the year with a star-studded lineup!

The sign says: "Grandfather Mountain, Highest Mountain in the Blue Ridge. You are on the most rugged mountain in Eastern America, Be Careful."

It is one of the most beautiful places I have visited, complete with a mile-high swinging bridge, Mildred the Bear Environmental Habitat and has everything from deer to bear, with the Bald Eagle and Mountain Cougar for good measure.

It hosts the gathering of the Clans with their games and music. Also "singing on the Mountain Convention" with gospel music since 1924, and Dr. Billy Graham spoke to the largest crowd ever assembled in North Carolina, over 150,000 people.

We hated to leave after the festival was over, but leave it we did, and headed for a week in Nashville before going to Owensoboro, Kentucky.







December Member of the Month

Our Member of the Month for December 1992 is Sonja Shell, longtime banjo player for Sidesaddle. Sidesaddle is a group member of CBA, and Sonja has been with the band for eight and a half years.

Beyond face recognition, my first acquaintance of Sonja came early in 1990, a few months after the infamous Loma Prieta earthquake. Sonja had given me directions to her home in the Redwood Estates area, and the damaged roads and precariously perched boulders made the drive to meet her a bit more exciting. The area around Sonja's place still showed signs of significant trauma, but Sonja was outside talking to a cat when I arrived. She told me it had arrived in the neighborhood shortly after the earthquake, and she had been caring for it. That's when I got the first clue of what a generous-hearted person Sonja is.

Sonja started playing music - the cello - when she was 8 years old, and took lessons for 7 years. Her mother, who often accompanied her on the piano, hoped that Sonja would become a professional classical cellist. When Sonja was 15, one of her friends influenced her to take up the banjo. "She was always

trying to be better than me, in all our games, so I started playing banjo out of rivalry." Sonja says. But the motivation soon changed as Sonja could see how much fun playing banjo is. She delighted in its ringing, joyful sounds. She started taking banjo lessons in Redlands, at Caleb's Guitars, and then became a student of Craig Smith.

Sonja's father took the family to festivals and music clubs. One club Sonja remembers, Penny University in San Bernadino hired many bluegrass groups. Sonja saw Stewart Duncan perform there. Then when Sonja was 17, she moved North to attend college (World College West), and began meeting a whole new set of musical friends. As soon as she was able to, Sonja got a job as a waitress at the late bluegrass venue, Paul's Saloon, in San Francisco. Gradually she began shuffling her hours around to enable her to participate in the Monday evening jams. Sonja spoke fondly of High Country, and noted that both Butch (Waller) and Larry (Cohea) were encouraging and supportive of her early efforts. She bought her first good banjo, a Gold Star from the 5th String, which was then located near Paul's. (See last month's M.O.M. Larry Bowen's story.)

Sonja said that she had no idea that someday she would be able to support herself playing banjo — it was just great fun, and she was getting to meet a lot of wonderful people. She met Vern Williams, Lost Highway, Old Friends, Pat Enright, and many other people who went on to become famous. Although performing still brought out nervousness in Sonja, she soon became a member of a group, "The Pick of the Litter", and began playing places like the Red Vest Pizza Parlor. Additionally, Sonja spent many days while she lived in San Francisco as a street musician along Fisherman's wharf — sometimes with friends, sometimes alone.

Sonja had filled in on banjo with Sidesaddle one time, and then over a year later, she received a phone call asking her if she would like to join the band. Serendipity and hard work and luck all came together for Sonja, as she joined Sidesaddle, moved to the mountains near Saratoga, and began playing the banjo full time.

Although Sonja had early been attracted to modern stylings, and

had taken one month of lessons from Tony Trishka, she found, as she progressed in skill, that her appreciation for traditional music increased commensurately. She was having so much fun, she hardly noticed she was developing musically. Over the years, however, she developed a professional repertoire of skills, a veritable cedar-chest of licks to choose from. "I try to fit the playing to the song" Sonja said, alluding to her treatment of a ballad that I had labeled "sensitive".

"Umm, Sidesaddle plays a wide variety of music - not all bluegrass, and I can't just play straight-out-bluegrass style on everything, but what I love most is a good rolling banjo sound in a traditional bluegrass song."

When asked about her favorite memories with Sidesaddle, Sonja had trouble choosing just one or two, and said she always just loved to be playing. I asked her about traveling, and recording, and she readily agreed that those were highlights by any reckoning. "I remember the first time I played at Grass Valley" she reminisced. "That, to me, was very special. It meant I'd really been accepted as a professional, and the reception we got was worth all the hours of practice."

Sonja now plays in several configurations: with Sidesaddle, with Mountain Creatures, with John Fuller, Kari Larson and Bob Kolb, particularly. She also has a few banjo students, and loves teaching and producing a recital once a year. At the end of 1992, Sonja will officially retire from Sidesaddle - although they'll have a hard time replacing her and will probably ask her to help them out often. She is philosophical about leaving Sidesaddle - some regrets, yes, but life moves on, and her life is moving ahead at cruising speed.

I asked Sonja for her thoughts for the future of bluegrass, and she seemed overall, pretty mellow. She says there's always room for improvement, but the most wonderful feature of bluegrass is that it is fun - everyone can participate, and she just wants to keep actively supporting traditional music by playing, attending concerts, buying CDs and promoting such fine organizations as the CBA, who make it possible for a lot of people to enjoy bluegrass.

Another Blue Christmas for Dave Evans

I can't believe that two and one-half years have elapsed since I first wrote of Dave Evan's plight in the July, 1990 issue of B luegrass Breakdown. I'll bet my favorite banjo that Dave is painfully aware of the passage of time, as he sits in his cell in the Ohio Penitentiary nearing the third anniversary of his imprisonment. As some of the Breakdown's newest readers may not know, Dave Evans was sentenced to a flexible ten to eighteen year term in prison for shooting into a house trailer and parked automobile. While a very serious violation of law, there was significant provocation, no one was in fact injured, and Dave had no priors according to his family. No one would question a reasonable sentence for the violations, but the sentence handed down appears arbitrary and stunningly severe, when one considers that murderers and rapists have often received less stringent punishment. Dave will not, I am advised, be eligible for parole until December, 1995 — three years from now. Ordinarily, parole is not granted in Ohio at first eligibility.

Dave Evans is a bluegrass banjo picker, having played with Larry Sparks in the 1970's before forming his own band "Riverbend" around 1978. His powerful, emotive voice and distinctive song stylings are featured on two Vetco and 5 Rebel releases issued between 1979-85. For a detailed discography, refer to the July 1990 Bluegrass Breakdown or write to the writer directly or in care of the Breakdown editor. Incidentally, the two Vetco LP's (1979 and 1980) will be reissued in the next few months on CD.

All appeals with the Ohio State Courts have been exhausted.

Within the past week, a long-time friend of Dave's, Chet DeLong, called requesting assistance in raising funds to pay for counsel to review the trial transcript and appellate record to advise if good grounds exist for a petition for a writ of habeas corpus in federal court. Mr. DeLong is a retired police officer from the city of Columbus, and is a bluegrass picker (with a band named "Plum Grass"), festival promoter and fan.

As you enjoy this holiday season, I ask each of you to think of Dave Evans in his prison cell. A member of the bluegrass community needs our help. Please send the CBA a check for whatever you can afford (no amount is too small — dollars add up fast), made out to the California Bluegrass Association, for the Dave Evans Fund. We will assemble whatever is collected and send it along to Chet DeLong. 





The Freight and Salvage...

Acoustic Music's Heaven on Earth

There are times in everyone's lives when they go to a place, whether it be a theatre, cafe, or museum, when you walk in and feel and immediate sense of belonging and you want to go back again and again. That's how I felt the first time I went to the Freight and Salvage in Berkeley, California, and I have gone back again and again.


For those of you who have never visited the Freight let me give you an idea of what to look forward to. Located at 1111 Addison Street, just of San Pablo, it is a very inconspicuous light blue building with a flower box filled with various blooms in the front. The sign on the top of the facade has the name and logo of a freight train. Its been at this locale for five years. Because it is a residential area there is limited parking, so come early or car pool it. The box office is open during all shows, 3-5 p.m. Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday, and noon to 3 p.m. on Saturday. You'll save a dollar by buying in advance and there is priority seating at 7:30 p.m. for advance ticket buyers.

When you walk in the lobby the bulletin board gives information on future acts and flyers about events happening in the Bay Area. There is a sign-up sheet to get on the mailing list for the Freight's monthly calendar as well.

Once you give your ticket and have your hand stamped, it can be a struggle to walk by the coffee and dessert counter without indulging. They offer various tempting baked items. (I recommend the lemon bars.) Drinks include coffee, tea, bottled water and juices.

One of the things you'll notice about the Freight is the decor. I call it early garage. It reminds me of some of friends' garages, including mine. It has a real open, homey, comfortable look. They recently installed a new ventilation system and the sound system is the best in the business, Meyers Sound, located in Berkeley. They employ 15-20 people and have numerous volunteers.

And now about the music. I don't know of anywhere else you can go to see such a wide variety of talented music makers. Just looking at the October schedule there is: Bluegrass, acapella, blues, doo wop, cajun, Klezmer, folk and celtic. They really try to cover all aspects of traditional acoustic music. Not much soliciting is done by the staff for bookings. Most groups call and book themselves. If



anything, it can be a learning experience. I learned that Klezmer is traditional Yiddish music.

A little history about the Freight and Salvage. It was once a used furniture store in their old location. They kept the name out of convenience. They became a non-profit organization in 1983 and are able to meet 80 to 85% of their obligations through ticket sales and concessions. The rest is funded through government agencies such as the California Arts Council and private groups like the Rex Foundation. All donations are tax deductible and much appreciated.

They have a showline you can call to get updates or changes in the programs (510) 548-1761. Tuesday is open mike night with the first Tuesday of the month featuring the best acts from previous nights.

I can't think of any reason not to visit the Freight and Salvage if you enjoy this kind of music and like a relaxed atmosphere. There's something there for every one. The more people realize how dedicated the staff are to keeping this music available to the public, hopefully it won't ever be taken for granted. That way I'll know it will always be there when I need a dose of live Bluegrass. And all the great musicians out there will always have a place to perform now and in the future. I can't wait to go back again and again.
