# 12 bands added to 28th Annual Father's Day Bluegrass Festival line-up

The CBA's band selection committee, co-chaired by John Green and John Duncan, met in early November to select the Featured and California Showcase Bands for our 28th Annual Father's Day Weekend Bluegrass Festival. After the board of directors approved their selections, the selected bands were contacted and we now have verbal agreement with all but one band.

Committee members this year were Jerry Barush, Dan Bernstein, Kerry Blue, Tracy Bowen, Wayne Cass, Sonja Edwards, John Fox, Dorothy Gillim, Kris Hare, Elida Ickes, Michael Lewis, Allen Light, Carl Pagter, Corbin Pagter, Cliff Sargent and Rachel Walters. We think that the committee members and chairmen have made excellent selections and are grateful for their hard work.

Featured bands selected are: Blue and Lonesome (Middletown, OH); Frank Ray and Cedar Hill (Hillsboro, MO); Crooked Jades (San Francisco, CA); Kenny and Amanda Smith Band (Roanoke, VA); New Found Road (Franklin, OH); Reeltime Travelers (Johnson City, TN) and Special Consensus (Palos Park, IL).

California Showcase Bands chosen are: Bluegrass Intentions (Albany, CA); Due West (Albany, CA); High Country (Oakland, CA); Pacific Crest (Bakersfield, CA) and The BladeRunners (Tustin, CA).

These bands join our already outstanding lineup of talent, which features Blue Highway, Rhonda Vincent and the Rage, the Del McCoury Band, Doyle Lawson and Quicksilver and Dave Evans and River Bend.

CBA's Emerging Artist Band, Open Road, Kids on Bluegrass, and Cloggers West round out the slate. We are also working on the addition of an All-Star Music Camp Instructors Band to perform on the opening day of the festival.

The festival also offers workshops by the performers, a Luthier's pavilion, music, food and soft drink vendors and a four-day Children's Program. There is camping available on site with a limited number of hookups and accommodations for handicapped campers with advance reservations.

A new addition this year will be old-fashioned square dancing led by a caller and danced to live music. Cloggers West director, Terry Tucker will also demonstrate and give dance lessons. More details next month.

CBA's 28th Annual Father's Day Weekend Bluegrass Festival will be held June 12-15, 2003 at the Nevada County Fairgrounds in Grass Valley, California. Watch future issues for additional information and a band performance schedule.

## Plans are underway for 3rd Annual CBA Music Camp

Plans are taking shape for the third annual CBA Music Camp, to be held next summer from June 8th to 11th, 2003 at the Nevada County Fairgrounds in Grass Valley, just prior to the Father's Day Bluegrass Festival. This three-day camp (Sunday evening to Wednesday evening) includes instrumental instruction, elective classes, staff-led jam groups, concerts, and dancing with some of the nation's finest talent in bluegrass and old-time music. Staff and students alike have said it's one of the best music camps going.

The camp is intended for advanced beginners through intermediate students. We're often asked what we mean by "advanced beginner". We mean that regardless of what your instrument is, you should basically know how to play it before

you come to camp. We can't teach you how to play in three days. You should be able to play songs, if not up to tempo, at least not agonizingly slowly, and without a lot of stopping for chord changes, etc. Can you sit down with a friend or two and play a few songs together? If so, you're ready to come to camp. If not, keep practicing! Take some lessons, and come to camp next year.

What do we mean by "intermediate"? We mean you know how to play, you play a lot, maybe you play in a band; in any case, you're comfortable with your instrument, you understand scales, chords, and notes, you're coming to camp to learn tips and techniques from the masters. Speaking of which

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# **Editor's Corner**

Happy New Year! My best wishes for health, happiness and lots of Bluegrass music to you and your family for 2004.

As I am writing my column for this issue of the Bluegrass Breakdown, it is snowing here on Blue Mountain. We're at 3200 feet elevation in the northeastern corner of Calaveras County, and are at the tail end of a terrific storm that hit California in the middle of December. I enjoy looking out my office windows at the snow, but I am sure glad that I don't have to go out and work in

I'm keeping my fingers crossed that we don't lose power again. Our power was out for several hours on Saturday, Sunday and Monday (Dec. 14-16) and we had a short outage earlier this morning. With more than six inches of rain in three days, the ground is so saturated that there

have been power poles down and lots of problems throughout California - not just in our remote mountain region. Hopefully I'll get lucky and be able to finish this issue before we have any more outages.

Last month the Bluegrass Breakdown was late in getting to the printer. As Don wrote in his column, I had some medical problems that made keeping to deadline very difficult. I'm fine and trying to get used to life in a wheelchair with a large cast on my left leg. It is awkward and makes ordinary things much more difficult to accomplish plus it is a pain in the neck (and other parts of the anatomy)!

With any luck I'll be out of the cast soon - please keep your fingers crossed. My Orthopedist didn't give me much encouragement. Since I am nearly 60 years old, a diabetic; broke a bone in my foot (the 5th metatarsal), and tore some tendons and ligaments - his prognosis wasn't too encouraging. The good news is that it could have been much worseÖ and I have a bright red cast for Christmas.





### **CBA Board of Directors appoints** Michael Hall South Bay Area **Activities Vice President**

Michael Hall of Redwood City has been named the California Bluegrass Association's South Bay Area Activities Vice President. As the CBA's South Bay representative, Hall will replace Roger Siminoff, who has moved from Los Gatos to Arroyo Grande and has been named the CBA's South Coast Activities Coordinator.

The CBA's South Bay territory includes San Mateo, Santa Clara, and San Benito counties. Hall will work closely with the CBA's other urbanarea representatives, including Darby Brandli (East Bay Alameda & Contra Costa counties) and Linda Spalinger (Monterey Bay - Santa Cruz & Monterey counties).

In taking on the South Bay job, Hall faces a unique challenge: To bring even more bluegrass music to what is already by far - the nation's most active bluegrass area.

The South Bay Area is served by a number of strong, well-supported, and active bluegrass organizations and businesses," said Hall. "Over the past two decades, this area has developed more bluegrass festivals, concerts, jams, classes, workshops and other bluegrass music events than any other local area. One important role for me as the CBA South Bay representative will be to help these myriad groups work together to efficiently and effectively promote our music at the local level.'

Despite the ongoing high level of activity, Hall sees some unmet needs in the threecounty area. "We need to better support our local 'public' jams (widely advertised picking events that are open to the public), which offer opportunities for fans and players to enjoy bluegrass at its most personal level - music between friends. These jams, he explained, help bring new players into active bluegrass participa-

tion and often lead to numerous spinoff private jam sessions and to the formation of new bluegrass bands. To a large degree, our public jams are the engines that drive active bluegrass player participation in the music," he said.

He also sees a need for an annual bluegrass gathering in San Mateo County, with the details yet-to-be decided. He is open to suggestions from San Mateo County residents about the nature and timing of such

Working with East Bay VP Darby Brandli, Hall has arranged for a Pine Mountain Railroad Oakland concert at Zeta Music this month. "We hope everyone in the Bay Area will come out for this show to have fun and get the new bluegrass year started right," Hall

We are adding one new class: songwriting, for musi-cians and non-musicians alike who would like to come to camp and work on composing songs and tunes. Elena Corey award-winning songwriter, beloved teacher, and one of the originators of this camp, will lead this class.

We are also bringing back the vocals class, to be led this year by one of the nation's finest vocalists, Laurie Lewis. This class will focus on vocal technique, style, and harmonies.

Changes from last year: where there are two or more teachers for one instrument, each will teach either beginning or intermediate classes for the whole three days, so that you will work with just one teacher during instrumental classes, depending on your level. You'll still be free to choose any instructor's class you want for the electives.

Also in response to student requests, we are increasing instrumental class time to three hours a day Monday and Tuesday, and two hours on Wednesday. This will give instructors more time to work with all students more intensively and individually.

Good news and bad news about the food — good news: the meals will be more varied and plentiful, supplied by one of Grass Valley's best caterers, Christopher's Catering. Bad news: it will cost more (\$75 for the three days). Good news: it's still a pretty good deal; supplying three meals a day plus snacks for \$25/day. And you are free, as always, to bring and cook your own food, and/or eat out.

Camping fees will likely be similar to last year's, about \$20 for four nights of tent camping, more for RV's, and also optional — you may camp or commute, stay with friends, or in a motel, as you choose.

More bad and good news bad news, cost of camp is going up; good news, only by \$5.00. Basic cost of camp will be \$230 this year, with meals and camping added as options at \$75 and \$20 (tents), respectively. A limited number of partial scholarships will be available for low-income students.

Also new, you'll be able to register either by mail or online. But not yet. We're still working out some details, and will be ready to start accepting registrations by February 1st. Look for a registration form in next month's Bluegrass Breakdown, or check the website (www.cbamusiccamp.org). For more information, you can call director Ingrid Noyes at 707-878-2415. # Bluegrass Folks - Rick Cornish

When asked about his child-hood, Rick Cornish's memory easily slips back to his early days at Hayward, California where he was born and raised in that rural community of mostly farmland that has since become a metropolis. His parents worked hard for a living and for the most part were not involved in music. His father was a happy man, known for his good-natured, continual whistling of tunes. This seemed to be his release and was just part of his personality.

Rick was also musical, right from the start. His parents, aware of this, arranged lessons for him on an old guitar. About three weeks into that he gave it up, as he wanted to learn it with feeling and not from notes that reminded him of ants on a page. This learning method just did not click with him, nor was it conducive to the releasing of how he felt within

Still with a desire to express himself with music, he began playing the sousaphone in high school. He avoided one on one meetings with his music teacher who thought he could read music, as he seemed to be hitting all those notes just right. One day at an unavoidable meeting alone with her, she found out the truth and that was the day he "lost the

sousaphone".

He had a job and was earning some money, so he bought a baritone ukulele, loved it and learned to play it. He says, "Since back then when I bought that, there probably has never been a day that I have not had a musical instrument in my hands". Then for high school graduation, his mom bought him a good Gibson guitar and he learned to play that.

Rick says it's no secret that later, just out of college, he and a friend who played a harmonica "played blues music and smoked a little grass once in a while". One day this friend told him he read about a bluegrass festival that was going to be at Grass Valley, "Wherever that might be".


"Well, that sounds like something we might be interested in", said Rick. "Blue, well that must mean blues music and we can play that. Grass, gosh, the festival is even named for grass and we smoke that. Now, just how good can it get?" They agreed. They packed their pup tents and headed north.

Arriving at the fairgrounds at the second CBA festival ever, they walked around to see just what was going on. It was not at all what they had expected and it seemed that people everywhere around were playing a type of music neither one of them was familiar with. They arrived at the stage just as Jake Quesenberry was coming on with his band, so they sat down on the lawn to listen.

"That band blasted into a burning version of 'Little Maggie' with Jake singing in a style I had never heard before", says Rick.

It was as if someone had hit me in the head with a brick. It absolutely changed my ground rules for life and opened up a brand new world for me. I have not missed a CBA festival since. I have met some great people I otherwise never would have known. Within a year I had switched to not only playing bluegrass, but even had my own band." In that band he played the guitar and sang. He has always sung. Then later when he needed a bass player, he gave the guitar job to another member and took the bass job. That band was "Duck Soup", a title that was later changed to "Grass Menag-

He had always wanted to learn to play the fiddle. He had tried it several times and somehow it just didn't work for him. Later, he realized that, since he is left-handed and the whole world

is designed for right-handed people, he had been trying to play it the wrong way. He then bought his own and strung it up in the left-handed position. He found that made it much easier, so he spent four and five hours a day for about five years and

learned to play it that way. Now it is his main instrument.

Rick later decided he was getting so much out of these festivals, that he felt guilty he was not putting something back into them. So, he began help

### In Memory Richard Evan Bradstreet 1954-2002

"Ranger" Rick Bradstreet, 48, of Fort Collins, died Tuesday, November 26, 2002 peacefully at his home of congestive heart failure. Rick was born September 28, 1954, in Sioux City, Iowa. He married Andrea Jean Legler, of Mission, Kansas, on May 26, 1984, in Emporia, Kansas.

Rick was a superb musician, songwriter, and entertainer. He mainly performed Bluegrass music, but also enjoyed Jazz, and other music genres. Rick won several instrumental awards including Colorado Flatpicking Champion and Rocky Mountain Dobro Player of the Year. He was a member of the Bluegrass Patriots. The band performs throughout the United States, Ireland, England, Sweden, Denmark, and Canada and has several recordings in their discography.†

He performed in several bands before joining the Patriots in 1980, including Bluegrass Feed & Seed Company, Flint Hills Drywell, and The Skunk Valley Boys. He was also a member of Cowtown Boogie, Mandomonium, and Victor Barnes. Rick was a studio session artist with many musicians and groups.

His passion and respect for music and musicians led him to be one of the most sought after guitar teachers in the state.

He was always a friendly presence and was well respected among his peers in the bluegrass scene. Frank made friends in fifty states and many foreign countries. Everyone was always happy to see Frank and his big beautiful smile.

Among Frank's other credits are mixing the house sound for the NPR program "E-Town" for two years, and co-writing (with Pete Wernick) one of Hot Rize's popular tunes, "Frank's Blues". His hobbies included woodworking and golf.

Frank grew up in the Denver area, played guitar and sang in the folk scene there in the early 70's. For several years he lived in the little mountain town of Gold Hill, near Boulder, where he was often called by his nickname "Blue". In 1974 he started work as a guitar repairman at the Denver Folklore Center alongside Rick Kirby and Nick Forster. He started working with Hot Rize in 1980. His attention to detail and his public relations skills

helped Hot Rize go a lot farther as a band. He was essentially a fifth member of the group.

Frank is survived by his parents Bill and Fran Edmonson; his brothers Ray and Steve; and his sister, Phil.

### CBA Member News Notes... Bob Thomas recovering from major surgery

One of the nicest and most loved men currently involved in Bluegrass music and the California Bluegrass Association, Bob Thomas, underwent a Thymectomy (removal of the Thymus gland) on December 2 at UC Davis Medical Center. Bob is a CBA board member and Sacramento Area Activities Vice President, and a talented guitar player and singer.

Bob has a little known disease called Myasthenia Gravis. The most common form of the disease is a chronic autoimmune neuromuscular disorder that is characterized by fluctuating weakness of the voluntary muscle groups. According to the Myasthenia Gravis Foundation of America's website, "MG may affect any muscle that is under voluntary control. Certain muscles are more frequently involved and these include the ones that control eye movements, eyelids, chewing, swallowing, coughing and facial expression.

In Bob's case, his eyes have been most affected. If you have seen him wearing an eye patch during the last year or so, it is because of the effects of this disease. One of the treatments commonly used to try to put the disease into remission is a Thymectomy. Bob says that he has been able to detect a little difference in the effects of MG since his surgery.

He was able to come home from the hospital on Thursday,





Stone Creek is a Northern California Bluegrass band, which performs a mixture of progressive, traditional and original tunes. They performed at the first two CBA Veteran's Day Bluegrass Festivals in Woodland, California. The band has recently released their first CD which will be available



For those of us who don't know what "Sacred Harp Singing" is, CBA member Jeff O'Toole sent the following description:

"The origins of this uniquely American music predate our nation. The base material in the form of hymns and folk tunes floated over the Atlantic with the early settlers. Here they were transformed into 3 and 4 part songs, to be sung a cappella, with each part miraculously melodious. This new music was spread to a musically illiterate population via singing schools and itinerant singing masters who were often the composers of the songs.'



"The harmonies achieved conventions, but rarely 'performed.' Everyone who comes can composers were so rich and delightful as to border on the sinful. In fact, that was exactly masters who followed and essentially exterminated this native music in the Northeast and Midwest where it had become established. In the deep South, however, it found a more enduring home."

"Either because of its 'illegitimate harmonies' or because of its 'folk theology,' shape note music has seldom found its way

Since last appearing at a RBA show in January, 2002, Peter Rowan (1-18-03) has released several albums, including "Reggaebilly" (with Jerry Douglas, Stuart Duncan, and the cream of Jamaica's reggae musicians), "High Lonesome Cowboy" (with Don Edwards, Tony Rice, and Norman Blake), "Old & In the Gray" (with David Grisman, Vassar Clements, and Herb Pedersen), and "Crazy People" (Caribbeanflavored swing with his brothers Lorin & Chris, plus many of Nashville's finest). Whew!! In addition, Peter produced an album for Billy & Bryn Bright (who played with him at a previous RBA concert), and performed with a wide variety of musicians in a wide variety of musical settings. Whatever the context, Peter Rowan's music is distinctive and powerful, and has garnered him a large and devoted audience of fans around

For all his stylistic experimentations and changes, it is with bluegrass that Peter has made some of his most memorable music. He was a member of Bill Monroe & the Bluegrass Boys (and co-wrote the classic "Walls Of Time" with the "father of bluegrass"), Old & In the Way (with Jerry Garcia, David Grisman, and Vassar Clements), and Muleskinner (with Grisman, Clarence White, and Bill Keith), and has collaborated extensively with Ricky Skaggs, Nashville Bluegrass Band, Jerry Douglas, and Tony Rice, among many others.

Among his many notable releases is "Bluegrass Boy," a heartfelt and moving tribute to Bill Monroe, and some of the best bluegrass of the past decade. Of the album, Peter says, "I like to think that the music on Bluegrass Boy is not safe bluegrass." Peter Rowan and his hard-driving bluegrass band will provide an adventurous — and memorable — evening of music, and RBA is pleased to welcome him back for what's become an annual concert.

The Dry Branch Fire Squad (2-15-03) has been playing "aggressively traditional" bluegrass since 1976, releasing over 20 albums (most for Rounder), and spicing their performances with the witty stories, satirical observations, and down-home philosophies of founder/leader Ron Thomason.

Bluegrass Unlimited calls him "a national treasure, for his brilliant on-stage humor, his abiding commitment to taking his intelligence ever deeper into the sources and meaning of the music, and the intensity of his singing. # My Dad's Music

Every Friday night my father's friends would start showing up, carrying guitars, banjos, fiddles and mandolins. I used to cringe as I heard the tuning up downstairs in our family room. I knew what was coming and I dreaded it. Within an hour or so, I'd hear the strains of "Foggy Mountain Breakdown," "Dueling Banjos," and "Orange Blossom Special" floating up the stairs.
To me it was Hillbilly Music!

It was hard enough to endure weekly episodes of Hee-Haw or The Grand Ole Opry, but these jam sessions lasted all night. Sometimes Dad would be on the guitar, sometimes banjo, or his fiddle or even the harmonica. He played them all. I remember thinking that as soon as I was old enough, I would leave home and never have to hear that awful cater-waulin' sound again. To my young years, the music was ignorant and uneducated, and it embarrassed me that my father played it. I suppose that's why I hardly ever had friends over while they played their bluegrass.

Years later, I did move out and began my own journeys. While I was living overseas, my father died unexpectedly and the music stopped for good.

That was some years ago and while I have often thought of my father since then, I haven't felt his presence so strongly as when I've gone to a bluegrass jam with my friends. Being surrounded by the sounds of the music he so loved, brought back a flood of memories: how his fingers flew



# NCBS 2003 Professional Band Workshop set for Feb. 28 - March 2 at Brookdale

Dr. Pete Wernick, author of the bluegrass industry bible "How To Make A Band Work," will teach the 2003 Northern California Bluegrass Society Professional Band Workshop February 28 - March 2 at the Brookdale Lodge near Santa Cruz. The workshop will address professional bluegrass bands at every level from newly organized units to expert local, regional and touring bands. Whole bands are encouraged to attend, but band membership is not required. Individuals may enroll and be organized into bluegrass bands for the weekend workshop. Enrollment is very limited to allow individual attention. Advance registration is strongly recommended.

The NCBS Professional Band Workshop will kick off a weeklong celebration of bluegrass music instruction and fun at Brookdale. Dr. Wernick will present his "How To Jam" workshop at the Brookdale March 4-6. This workshop has, to date, only been offered each year before the Merlegrass Festival in North Carolina, where it is always a sellout. The March Brookdale Bluegrass Festival, presented by Eric & Barbara Burman and sponsored by NCBS, will follow on March 7-9. This twice-yearly event has become the best "cabin fever" festival in California.

The fourth NCBS Professional Band Workshop held since 1993 is a unique effort to bring Wernick's bluegrass band consulting practice to Northern California bands at a reasonable cost. Numerous now-famous professional bands have sought "Dr. Banjo's" advice in

preparation for their move to the top level of bluegrass professionalism. These private lessons are expensive; NCBS hopes to aid California bands in their quest for achievement at a more reasonable cost using a group setting. "Since many bands face common performance problems," Wernick explained, "having several bands study together can be a very effective way for all of the bands to advance their skills. They can learn from each other."

The sessions will also include opportunities for bands to work with the instructor individually, so that each band's unique assets can be emphasized. The idea is to move each band up to the "next level" beyond where the group stands at the beginning of the teaching sessions. Individuals who plan to join a bluegrass band or who play in a band whose members cannot all attend the workshop will be paired with others to form workshop bands. All workshop bands will be invited to perform for "graduation" at the Brookdale Bluegrass Festival the next weekend. If the bands agree, their performance can record for use as a demo or as a live album.

Existing bluegrass bands can register by February 15 for the workshop for only \$100 per member if all band members attend the workshop. Advance registration by February 15 for individuals is \$110. Registration after February 15 will cost \$125 per person.

Pete Wernick is an accomplished nationally recognized bluegrass music teacher, hosting several acclaimed banjo workshops around the country each year. He was a key creative, marketing and performance force behind the success of his band Hot Rize, the first western US bluegrass band to tour and achieve national dominance in the previously "Southern" genre. He was a founder and long-time first president of the International Bluegrass Music Association, which, under his leadership, completely transformed the national professional bluegrass landscape. More than any other single individual, he has created the opportunity for numerous bluegrass musicians to earn a living playing bluegrass full-time.

Wernick holds a PhD degree in Sociology from Columbia University. In recent years, he has taken a substantial amount of time away from performing to focus on teaching bands and individual musicians the fine art of bluegrass performance, so that others can follow in the professional field. His warm, empathetic, and astute advice has inspired many of today's top bluegrass musicians, as well as the thousands of aspiring musicians he has taught in recent years. In California, he most recently taught banjo students at the CBA's 2002 music camp held before the Father's Day Festival in Grass Valley.

# I Hear Ya Knockin', Opportunity, Come On In

It is great that traditional music is finally getting long-over-due recognition. Since 'THE MOVIE', bluegrass and oldtimey musicare ubiquitous. Bluegrass is used as background music under an increasing number of commercial messages which broadcast over radio and TV. Other occupations are appraising traditional music for its usefulness to them: e.g. aerobic exercise teachers now often use bluegrass tapes as rhythm background, and old-timey string band dance tunes are being used by psychotherapists to help strangers be-come acquainted in encounter groups without undue embarrassment or stress.

Bluegrass chat-and information lines proliferate on the Net. We note increased inclusion of traditional music in electronic classification and retrieval bases and music libraries; we see increased sales of traditional acoustic recorded music in mainstream outlets. The recording industry is taking notice of the moneymaking opportunities in traditional acoustic music. The list goes on-wonderful!

of 'dream scenarios' with our music filling additional niches. There are still a few voids left, so perhaps enterprising folks can use such to promote and preserve our music. Your vision may include ideas I'm not noticing. I'll tell you of a few empty spots that I see. Perhaps they can be springboards for your own flights of

We'd all like to see mainstream media pay homage to our favorite music—and really 'get it.' We'd all like to see traditional music honored and respectednot 'used' as a passing meal ticket for folks indifferent to its survival, but our harping on such things won't help matters.

What will? Making information we have access to available to brand new 'converts' to traditional music could help. The Internet is a great tool; we could use it even more. But my thoughts rush to the nostalgic, and I'm fond of tangible, warmfuzzy things-like books. In fact, here are a few ideas for books I hope someone will write and

As most of us already know, All of us, though, can think paper coverage of folk, bluegrass, gospel, old-timey, Celtic, Cajun and other such traditional music events is ominously scant in the mainstream culture. That's why our own publications routinely list such things—it's hard to find them elsewhere. Why not create a book of such listings (of re-occurring events) available to the general public—folks who are now just catching on to the beauty that is bluegrass. A short, artistically pure book, with enticing pictures, would suffice nicely.

Back in 1996, Joel Selvin compiled and published a book called "San Francisco: the Musical History tour." It was a work of art. It acted as a guide to over 200 of the S.F. Bay's nightspots and sites where musical watermarks and memories (that influenced generations of music listeners) have been made. Although some of these listings are obsolete, most are still current. Many of these listings are about commercial music, e.g. rock, grunge, thrash, hip-hop, etc. venues. Traditional music is absent from this book.

Now that bluegrass and traditional acoustic music are be-

coming visible in the radar screen of the public consciousness, we could accept the roles of 'guides' to further enlighten folks to the richness of our musical heritage via both memorable past and current performance venues. I believe a publisher would jump on a similar book compiled specifically about bluegrass, gospel and old-timey music 'nests' for the area or the state. Our newsletters preach to the choir; it's time to reach the rest of the world. I see a hazy title through the fog even now, "The Musical Ghosts of Paul's Saloon."

Even a broader place-connection work would be interesting. Someone could compile a book about places on the West coast where bluegrass first emerged and was nurtured; focusing on geographical areas that cradled transplanted bluegrass personalities. I envision a coffee-table type beautiful book that pleases the tangible senses while it regales readers with the story of the rise of bluegrass in California. Yes, we could list web sites as additional references, and run tour busses past the Freight &

A book entitled, "A guide to Music Festivals in America," published back in 1979 out of Cambridge, Massachusetts, lists quite a few interesting festivals, but it neglects to mention most bluegrass, old-timey and gospel festivals. It needs updating and broadening in its inclusion criteria, or a parallel volume for just traditional music could be written. Bluegrass Unlimited offers a special edition in the spring of each year, listing festivals, which are primarily bluegrass, and a folky national magazine offers periodic coverage of folk festivals, but isn't a comprehensive, up to date book length volume listing and describing traditional music festivals long overdue? That would be a great book.

A similar opportunity exists to broaden existing music reference books which give little attention to bluegrass and old-timey musicians. We could use a "Bluegrass Who's Who" with alphabetically listed encyclopedicentries for musicians. People who start as side-personnel for our well-known bandleaders of

# STUDIO INSIDER

Welcome to January!

I hope you had a fun holiday season, and took advantage of the opportunity to play lots of music with family and friends. And I hope that your musical dreams all come true in 2003! My dream now, as I write this column in mid December, is that the contractor will have our house finished enough by next week that we can be living in it and cooking meals by Christmas. I don't think we can fit a turkey into the little oven in the 19-foot trailer we've called home since summer!

#### Doings at the studio

ADATs are humming away in the background as I write, playing a pristine 8 track digital recording of Neil Hogan's acoustic guitar concert from last Friday night at San Jose's Fiddling Cricket concert series. Pro Tools HD3 is running on the big computer system, recording the eight discrete tracks from the ADAT over an optical cable, loading all that digital audio directly to hard drive. In the

ten later form their own bands. It would be interesting to have a handy reference work to document the course of our musicians' careers.

For ourselves, we could use a handy (electronic form) reference guide to musicians' services—everything from folks who re-hair fiddle bows to places to get CDs duplicated en masse. Some of us keep such information and we could pool that—put it on our web site, to be updated periodically and/or publish a "Musician's Yellow Pages."

As you can easily see from this short list, opportunities abound for promoting and preserving our music while creating durable books. You probably can think of some I didn't list. I hope this small listing suggests other charming and original ideas to you, for you to offer your own contribution toward promoting and preserving traditional music.

"If you see a niche, fill it," say the mavens of success. Are you ready to scratch that creative itch and find your own opportunity to help promote our music in the New Year? May the music you preserve nourish and refresh you.

control room, where I'm writing this column on my laptop, I can glance up from time to time and check out the audio wave forms on the monitor. My session log from the concert tells me that this ADAT tape will run 54 minutes and 30 seconds, so I told ProTools to stop recording when it hits 55 minutes. That way, if I get called out of the control room or get busy with a phone call when the ADAT tape finishes, the computer won't sit there blindly recording silence until somebody shuts if off.

I really like automated gear. Especially when it works! And I really like ProTools. It always works. I've had my share of ADAT disasters, and like all professionals who use this risky format, I have to own and maintain several more machines than I actually need to use at any one time. The economies of scale have made computer systems and peripherals immeasurably more reliable than ADATs, which are really just glorified, converted S-VHS video decks.

ADATs were truly revolutionary, bringing digital recording to thousands of professional and home studios over the last ten years. However, the economics of the personal computer industry, the rapidly advancing sophistication of digital audio workstations (of which Pro Tools is the acknowledged industry leader), and the relatively small and easy task of maintaining computer based systems all combine to make the hassles of dealing with ADAT machines and the tragedy of machine-eaten tapes not really worth dealing with.

We keep a full rack of ADATs here in the machine room, mostly so that when clients bring in projects they recorded on ADAT, we can load the audio directly to hard drive and then work quickly and reliably in ProTools.

For Neil's concert, I needed eight tracks to record his guitar, a harp, flute, vocals and the announce mic. It was relatively quick and easy to take two ADATs (one for the job and another as spare) from our rack in the machine room and put them in a portable rig for the job. And all went smoothly (except the rain-soaked loadin, during the biggest storm system to hit California in several years.)

I got off easy this time, considering the multitude of things

that can go wrong with ADATs. However, my next live recording job will be done with ProTools, not with ADAT s.

But timing is everything! In about two weeks, the annual MacWorld show will be held in San Francisco. Apple always releases new products at that show, as well as at the show in July in New York. I thought about using Neil's concert as the impetus to buy a nifty and portable new ProTools rig, which I previewed at the AES show in October in Los Angeles. It's called the 002 system, and it includes a digital mixer/ audio interface with four mic preamps and an eight-fader control surface dedicated to running ProTools LE. It communicates with a computer over firewire, and can work in tandem with a suitably equipped Mac laptop.

Since my Mac laptop doesn't include a firewire port, I'll have to buy a new one to go along with the 002 system, and two weeks before MacWorld isn't a good time to buy a new computer! But my decision is made. It's just a matter of tim-

Oops — it's time to load another ADAT tape from Neil's concert into the machine and dump it into ProTools. Multitasking is fun! (Not)

# Another old format for home recording... 78 RPM records!

I recently spent an afternoon helping a singer dig some old memories and 60-year old performances from the dusty grooves of his own 78 records. Carl Dimeff, of Gilroy, wanted me to make his old 78's into a CD. In the 1940's, there was a commercially available home recording system that used 78 RPM blank discs and a recording/playback device that worked much like a record player/cutting lathe. You would place a blank 10-inch disk on the turntable, sing/play into its microphone, and the "needle" would actually cut grooves into a soft, pre-grooved plastic substance that was coated onto the plastic or aluminum disk. The fidelity was shaky, and there was lots of surface noise, but you could record yourself! And computers didn't even exist yet.

Since the cutting "needle" had to exert tons of pressure on the disk in order to cut its grooves, the record player/recorder had to have a second

spindle, offset by about an inch from the spindle in the middle of the disk, to keep the disk from slipping on the turntable as the recording progressed.

You can still see records occasionally at flea markets and antique stores that have these two holes in the middle, one offset by about an inch. If you see one, get it and take it home, and if you have a record player that does 78's, you might be in for a real (albeit voyeuristic) treat! A couple of years ago, another client brought in her 78's for me to make into a CD. We discovered that one of them had been recorded by her father during FDR's famous radio speech to the nation after Pearl Harbor had been bombed. It was riveting to listen to that speech come over the sound system in the studio, and to reflect on the immense changes that have happened since that

### (Old format?) Speaking of ADATs...

The rest of the world still uses ADATs. While working on Heather Bridger's project, "Spain in my Heart," we have had to send music to Spain, Nicaragua, Massachusetts, and New York, so singers in these locations could add parts to several tunes. The studio in Nicaragua wanted us to send ADATs. They use them there, and don't have computers.

So we made a reference mix of acoustic guitar, bass, and a scratch vocal, and printed it to two tracks of an ADAT. We put the scratch (or guide) vocal on just one of the channels, and the guitar and bass onto two channels, so the musicians could work with the guide vocal to learn the tune, and then mute that track and work with their own singer while sync'ing to our bass and guitar. It worked great!

One of the studios in Spain also needed an ADAT for singer Eliseo Parra to work with, so we sent the same format to them. Another studio in Santiago de Compostela wanted ProTools files to work with, so we prepared them a basic track of guitars and guide vocal to work with. We saved it in several different ProTools formats, so that the Spanish studio would be able to work with it regardless of their software version. We loaded all the data (yes, music becomes data too!) onto a CDR and sent it off to Spain.



We should get a CDR from the studio this week with Uxia's vocal parts. And the postage for sending a CDR to Spain is really cheap! If we all had fast internet connections, we could have sent the files to them over the internet and gotten them back within minutes of them finishing their session. How cool that will be when we all have high-speed connection to the internet.

Time to go load another ADAT to ProTools! See you next month.

# BLUEGRASS BREAKDOWN

# The Clawhammer Banjo Revival

Most of us are aware that after a couple of generations of decline, interest in 5-string banjo was revived in the 1940s and 50s by Pete Seeger, Earl Scruggs and their disciples. But how did clawhammer banjo specifically become established in that revival as the major style associated with old-time music? After all, by the dawn of the recording era what might be termed "pure" clawhammer was only one of a constellation of playing styles circulating among southern rural banjoists. What had happened was this: in the years following the American Civil War, a three-finger based method known as classic banjo had virtually superseded clawhammer (then known as "stroke style") in the United States, and various rural players had begun to partially incorporate or borrow wholesale various elements of this new style. When collectors and scholars began to look at rural banjo playing in earnest then, they found not only clawhammer — but two-finger picking, three-finger picking, thumb-lead, finger-lead and up-pick clawhammer (what Seeger calls the basic strum), not to mention dozens of variants and hybrids of the above.

As I pondered this question, it occurred to me that I could actually take the bull by the horns and call some of the banjoists and other musicians who had been active in early days of the banjo revival (my own involvement dates only to about 1970). Figuring that the New Lost City Ramblers might have played some role here, I started with Tom Paley. He suggested that I get in touch with Stu Jamieson. Meanwhile, a Boston area banjo picker named Ed Britt suggested I sound out Hank Schwartz, Frank Hamilton and Bob Flesher, and I also contacted Bertram Levy and Alan Jabbour, both of whom played in the old Hollow Rock String Band, which pretty much launched the string band revival movement in the mid-60s.

The picture that emerged was fascinating, and revealed quite a bit of information, which is not widely known, and which is also contrary to what has become the accepted wisdom. This could easily make a full-length article or even a book, but on this occasion I'll just offer a few major themes that have emerged, with the caveat that some

conclusions may not hold up as new information emerges.

To begin with, the major source for the style we call clawhammer in the early stages of the urban folk revival was a banjoist from the town of Allen in Floyd County, Kentucky named Rufus Crisp. Pete Seeger in fact credits Crisp with teaching him to "frail," but apparently it was Stu Jamieson who was Crisp's major disciple and the main revivalist exponent of the downpicking style through the 1940s. Jamieson was extremely active in the 1940s and 50s in both New York City and California, and taught Rufus' style to quite a number of students, including Woody Wachtel (who also studied directly with Crisp) and Al Hjerpe. In turn, Wachtel in New York and Hjerpe in California were extremely active teachers of "down-picking": Hjerpe taught Ry Cooder to play clawhammer, and Wachtel taught Hank Schwartz, who later recorded on the seminal Old Time Banjo Project album.

Interestingly, Jamieson, who did a considerable amount of collecting and field recording in Appalachia in the late 1930s through the mid 40s, claims that neither frailing†nor clawhammer were then the common names for our downpicking style. The term "frailing," is apparently an urban-based misunderstanding of "flailing," which is itself an analogy to the motion employed to thresh grain. The term "clawhammer" was indeed sometimes applied to downpicking, but it was also used in parts of the South to describe certain forms of 3-finger picking (Jamieson's maternal grandfather, Wm. Wallace Simpson of White Co., Tennessee played banjo and referred to his own 3finger style as "clawhammer"). Jamieson notes that Crisp himself referred to the style as "flogging," and that other players called it "rapping". Alan Jabbour notes that among upper South banjoists and fiddlers in the 60s he heard the term "knocking" most often, but that "thumping" and "flailing" were also cur-

As an indication of how confused the nomenclature was at one time, in 1965 a Chica-

goan named John Carbo published a guide to 3-finger picking called "How to Play 5-String Bluegrass Banjo, Clawhammer Style". It was the late 1960s when "clawhammer" permanently entered the revival lexicon in association with downpicking. Two books which may have had a hand in this were John Burke's "Old-Time Fiddle Tunes for Banjo" and Art Rosenbaum's "Old-Time Mountain Banjo."


Paley claims that he learned to frail as an extension of the Pete Seeger style. In other words, the Seeger basic strum was an uppick movement followed by a brush-thumb. Paley notes that he was merely instructed to substitute a down-stroke for an uppick, and that he later taught his own students — Roger Sprung and Joe Hirsch are two who come immediately to mind — to proceed similarly.

It is very likely that quite a number of other players from that era learned in exactly this manner.

Paley also notes that the music of the New Lost City Ramblers did not particularly emphasize "frailing." He himself and fellow band member John Cohen both used the style on a few numbers, but if any banjo style could be said to particularly feature in the Ramblers' recordings according to Paley, it would be 3-finger picking a la Charlie Poole.

It should be emphasized that once the art of down-picking was launched in the revival, a number of other 'models' were available on Library of Congress and other field and commercial recordings. Paley singles out Clarence "Tom" Ashley as being particularly influential: Ashley was presented in concert in New York City about 1960 and also appeared at a Newport Folk Festival around the same time. Similarly, Frank Hamilton mentions Hobart Smith, and several sources bring up Wade Ward.

I mentioned in my last column that collectors of banjo music in the 1930s and 40s had found a wealth of banjo styles, and that this variety was very well represented in the early stages of the revival. In fact many pickers who learned during the 40s, 50s and early 60s prided them-

selves on mastering a variety of styles and substyles. When I interviewed Art Rosenbaum, for example, his take on the matter was that focusing on just one banjo-picking style was in fact short-sighted or even

"wrong headed" (see his book, "Old-Time Mountain Banjo" for a sampling of some of the styles he learned).

Frank Hamilton notes that in the mid-to late 50s, frailing in the revival was seen primarily as a song-accompaniment style. He notes that when he helped found the Old Town School of Folk Music in Chicago in 1957, the two banjo teachers, Fleming Brown and the aforementioned John Carbo both taught frailing.

The period in the revival when clawhammer began to eclipse all other old time styles was roughly the mid-1960s. One factor involved here is that by this time the balance of power among styles in the South was changing, under pressure from a general fascination with the then relatively new Scruggsstyle. Alan Jabbour makes the point that at the fiddlers' contests he went to during that period in Virginia and North

Carolina, you would see lots of Scruggs-pickers and a fair amount of down-pickers. What you no longer saw so much was the old time fingerpickers, because most of them had either made the transition to bluegrass, or presumably been intimidated into silence by the high levels of sound-volume and speed that the new style permitted.

And it was to these very contests in the mid 60s, of which Galax and Union Grove were only the most famous, that scores of young urban, collegeeducated pickers began to flock in search of musical inspiration. What they saw at that time, was mostly clawhammer associated with old-time music, and 3finger picking associated with bluegrass music. Apparently this perspective was cemented when the Union Grove Contest elected to categorize all bands as old-time vs. bluegrass according to the playing style of the banjoist. In other words, any band with a clawhammer player was classified as "old time," and any band with a fingerpicking player was counted as bluegrass, regardless of their respective rep Continued on B-2

### The Clawhammer revival

Continued from B-1 ertoires or performance styles.

By the late 60s, a new generation of revival old-time banjo pickers had focused on the styles of a few banjoists from the Mt. Airy/Round Peak, North Carolina region, which (not entirely coincidentally), was right in the heart of the area where all these fiddlers' conventions were taking place. One of the first newgeneration players who modeled his style on the Round-Peak banjoists was Tommy Thompson, who was then playing with Hollow Rock, and who later was banjoist for the Red Clay Ramblers.

Banjo player and builder Bob Flesher was on the scene as the process was unfolding:

When I went to Galax Old Fiddler's Convention in 1969, I had a small tape recorder and I recorded every banjo player that moved. Kyle Creed was the only person playing anything remotely resembling the Round Peak style. Other contemporary banjo players from the Northeast who camped out on Tommy Jarrell's front porch added Fred Cockerham's "chuck" to Kyle Creed's style to "invent" [what we now call] the Round Peak style.

I was selling banjo parts for Liberty banjo Co. at a festival in West Virginia one time, and Kyle Creed was taking a nap under my table. When he awoke he heard someone playing the new "Round Peak" style. He said, 'Everywhere I go I hear

myself playing'

In the early 70s, quite a number of revivalist banjo pickers made pilgrimages to Galax/ Round Peak and learned the banjo styles of Kyle Creed and Fred Cockerham. One of the most influential such "pilgrims" was Ray Alden of New York City, who was later to produce a number of seminal banjo recordings involving Round Peak and Round-Peak influenced musicians. As this Creed/ Cockerham style spread and was adopted by newcomers to the banjo-revival, a myth spread with it, namely that this very style had once been widespread throughout much of the South, and that it was in fact the only truly "traditional" way to play old-time banjo.

There's one more piece of the puzzle that needs to be sorted out more fully, namely just why the revival focused so heavily on Creed and Cockerham. One factor certainly was that Creed for one was an extremely visible presence at the '60s fiddlers' conventions, and that he was

particularly open to sharing his musical expertise with the newcomers. In effect, he became the "un-" or "anti-Scruggs" for those who were drawn to oldtime music instead of bluegrass. Tom Paley puts it this way: "I think the readiness of

[the Round Peak players] to teach outsiders about their music was the main thing. And the music does have a drive and verve that's very attractive. It also has a sound of authenticity that was just what a lot of the city converts were looking for. By that, I mean that, though it can be pretty intricate, it doesn't sound over-polished like Bluegrass and contest-style fiddling

This column probably raises as many questions as it provides answers, but hopefully it will get us all thinking more about the traditions from which we draw our music. I look forward to hearing from others who lived through the early days of the banjo revival, and who might have additional facts or insights to add.

# J.D.'s Bluegrass Kitchen

Howdy, Howdy, Howdy!

Here we go with a new year again folks! When I was a little bitty redneck they seemed to jes' crawl by, but since I've passed my 60th birthday some four years and nine months ago, they seem to be moving at "warp speed"! (Don't beam me up Scotty I'm having too much fun!)

I remember a conversation between Keith Little and myself when I turned 41, back in March of 1979. Keith was 24 at the time and he said to me, "Boy, J.D. you're really getting old!" Whereupon I replied, "Son, you're gonna be my age before you know it, and it'll seem like two weeks!'

Well, here two years ago Keith and I were visiting during the IBMA week in Louisville and I reminded him of our conversation back in 1979. I said, "Keith, aren't you going to be 45 this December? Where did 21 years go? Seems like two weeks ago when I turned 41 doesn't it?"

He answered, "You're right, J.D. But you know 45 doesn't seem that old when you get there!" Heck - 65 doesn't seem that old until you try to do some of the things you did at 45! (Like walk, run, or lay down without hurt-

But be that as it may, I ain't ready to quit, so let the years roll! We're just getting started, so cinch 'er down tight and let 'em buck! Well, it's the second week of December as I write this month's column, and it looks like we're finally gonna get some winter weather. I've got a big pot of real Cowboy Coffee on the stove, so come on in here where its nice and warm, pour yourself a big mug of "good to go" and we'll palaver over some vittle fixins!

During the Veterans' Day Festival in Woodland this year a gentleman who is a member of our fine organization asked me if I would feature some recipes for biscuits and gravy. I informed him that he had just stepped into "my office"! The two things that I love best after God, Country and family are Biscuits and Gravy!

A big plate full of biscuits and gravy will bring out the "redneck" in just about anybody! Daddy always said, "You show me someone who don't like biscuits and gravy and I'll show you someone who ain't worth knowing".

Pretty much everybody I know is worth knowing, 'cause I know they sure like my biscuits and gravy!

Here are two of my all time favorite recipes for biscuits. I featured this first one back in June of 2002, but here it is again. These come out so light and fluffy I call 'em Angel Biscuits.

### **Angel Biscuits**

5 cups flour

3/4 cup shortening 1 TBSP baking soda

3 TBSP sugar

3 TBSP baking powder

2 cups buttermilk

1 cake or package of yeast dissolved in 1/2 cup of water Mix dry stuff. Cut in short-

ening. Mix in buttermilk and yeast. Turn out and knead some. Roll out and cut biscuits. Cover and let rise for 15-20 minutes in a warm place. Bake at 400f F until nice and brown.

These make the lightest biscuits you'll ever have! They are absolutely heavenly with butter and homemade Apple Butter on 'em too! This recipe is great for company because it makes a lot of biscuits!

I can't remember where I got this next recipe for biscuits. I think I cut it out of a newspaper some 10-12 years ago. I usually write the origin of each recipe in the corner of the card, but I failed to do so on this one. But, wherever it came from, I'm glad I've got it to share here with you folks. Since the recipe came from North Carolina, I know that John Murphy will probably lay claim to it, but he only wishes he could make biscuits this good!

### North Carolina **Buttermilk Biscuits**

3 cups flour 1 tsp. Salt 1 TBSP baking powder 1/2 tsp. Baking soda 1/4 cup shortening 1 1/4 cup buttermilk 1 egg white, beaten

Mix dry stuff together. Cut in shortening. Mix in buttermilk. Turn out on a floured surface and knead lightly. Roll out 1/2" thick, cut and place on a lightly greased pan or skillet. Punch tops with a fork lightly and brush with egg white. Bake at 450f F for 8-12 minutes or until golden brown.

Now there is some real North Carolina redneck, gourmet eatin'!

John Murphy comes from North Carolina and when he was about 18 or 20 years old, someone asked him if he was a gourmet. John said, "Heck no! I'm a Baptist! My whole family is, you know that!" That's telling 'em John!

I've been interested in fixing vittles all of my life, so as a result I've read and collected recipes and cookbooks from all over the world. French cooking is acknowledged to be some of the finest there is by a lot of folks,



and that includes this ol' redneck.

The one thing that the French stress in all of their cooking is that "the sauce" is what makes the meal. And of course, they're right. What the sauce is to French cooking "Gravy" is to Redneck Vittles! You can whip up the finest, highest, tastiest biscuits in the world, but if you pour thin, watery gravy on 'em, I'd hate to be in your boots!

The perfect gravy is nice and thick and velvety smooth (with no lumps in it), with a rich, creamy taste. My favorite is made with some of the grease and "the leavins" in the skillet from frying chicken. Chicken gravy is hard to beat!

Here are two of my favorite Grave recipes of all time. This first one is one that I've cooked over a campfire more times than I can remember. I know for a fact whenever I'd cook this for the boys in our hunting camp I never wanted for firewood or water! They'd fetch all I needed. All I had to do was fix 'em some biscuits and gravy.

### Deer Camp Gravy

3 or 4 TBSP bacon drippings or lard

4 or 5 TBSP flour

1 - 12-oz can evaporated milk, plus 1/2 can water

Salt and pepper to taste Heat the drippings in a heavy cast iron skillet over the fire. Stir in the flour and cook until browned nicely. Add milk and water; cook, stirring with a

spatula, constantly or until thick-

ened to suit. Season with salt

and pepper to taste. Serve rat

You take about four Buttermilk Biscuits; tear 'em up just right. Then slather some of this 'redneck sauce" over 'em, and son you have pure "Manna" from heaven! I'd be willing to bet that this is what the Lord fed the Israelites on those 40 years they wandered in the wilderness. That's why they were so healthy! The Lord fed 'em on Biscuits and Gravy!

This next recipe for gravy is probably the best doggone gravy

recipe that you'll ever taste! It is the creation of Mr. Grady Spears, the author of the cookbook "A Cowboy in the Kitchen". It is reprinted her with his permission. This has got to be my favorite cookbook of all time and I use it constantly. I'll tell you folks how to get a copy, but first, here's how to make some:

### **Cracked Pepper Gravy**

1/4 cup unsalted butter
5 TBSP flour
2 1/2 cups milk
1 1/2 tsp kosher salt
4 tsp. Cracked pepper\*
\*Crack each peppercorn into 8
to 10 pieces

Melt the butter in a heavy saucepan or skillet. When the foam goes down, whisk in the flour. Continually whisk until the flour cooks, becoming a fragrant, light brown. Slowly add the milk, continuing to whisk to keep lumps from forming. Season with salt and pepper. Simmer gravy for 10 minutes to cook and reduce. Serve not. Makes about 3 cups.

Now this is real Cowboy Chuck! This is what Grady calls his jazzed up version of old-fashioned Cream Gravy.

Grady is not only the author of "A Cowboy in the Kitchen"; he also has three restaurants named "Reata" in Alpine, and Fort Worth, Texas and the newest one in Beverly Hills, California. I talked with him on the phone a year or so ago to ask permission to use a couple of his recipes here in my column. He graciously said "sure, use any of 'em you want to, and if you're ever in Beverly Hills drop in to the Reata and say howdy!" I told him I didn't know if they'd let this ol' redneck in there. He assured me that if they let him in (being an ol' cowboy), that I was more than welcome! What a guy.
